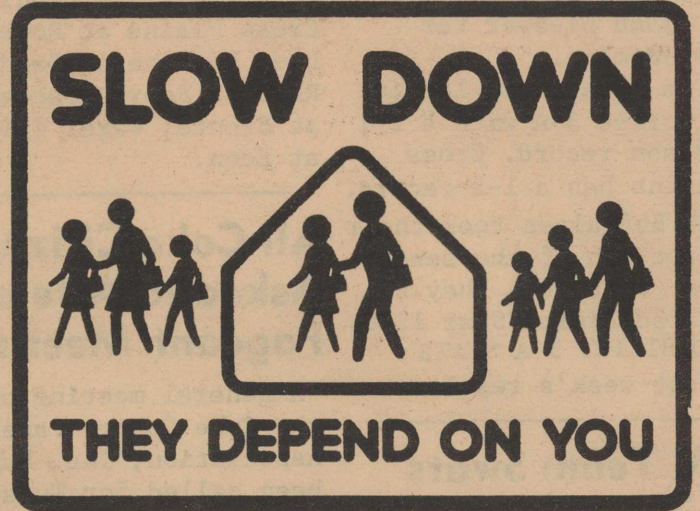

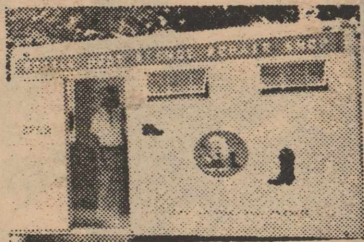

SGT. WOODS TAKING PART IN AMPHIBIOUS TEAM WORK EXERCISE

Marine Staff Sgt. James L. Woods, son of Anna Bell Woods of Robert Lee, is participating in exercise "Team Work 80."

He is a member of Headquarters, 4th Marine Amphibious Unit, based in Norfolk, Va., and embarked aboard the amphibious command ship USS Mt. Whitney.

The exercise, being conducted in the North Atlantic, English Channel, and the North and Norwegian Seas, involves more than 60,000 personnel, 170 ships and 400 aircraft from Canada, Denmark, Germany, the Netherlands, Norway, Portugal, the United Kingdom and the United States. It is designed to demonstrate and improve the capability of the NATO Alliance to reinforce and resupply shipping from North America across the Atlantic and from the U.K. to northern European ports. The ships will defend against simulated attacks from surface ships, submarines and aircraft.

The field training phase of the exercise involves an amphibious landing in Central Norway by 16,800 troops from the Netherlands, Norway, the United Kingdom and the United States. Aircraft providing cover to the ships and infantry will be operating from bases in Germany, Iceland, Norway, the U.K. and the United States.

Woods joined the Marine Corps in April, 1970.

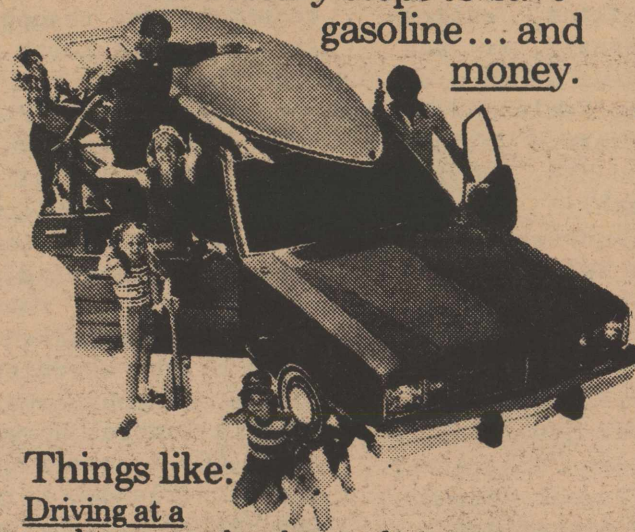

Robert Lee Steers Slaughter Forsan Buffaloes, 20-0, in Non District Tilt

The R.L. Steers out powered the Forsan Buffaloes 20-6 last Friday to gain their second victory in three outings. The Steers raked up 262 yards total offense to Forsans 195 yards. The Steers penetrated three times and let Forsan penetrate once.

FIRST QUARTER

Forsan returned the opening kick off to their own 23, but only gained four yards as the Steer defense denied a first down to them. The Buffs then punted to their own 37 without a return. From there Joel Percifull powered to the 34 and Mando Sanchez ran 18 yards for a Steer first down at the Forsan 16. After a 10 yard pass to William Henderson the Steers were pushed back 6 yards to the Forsan 17. From there Sophomore kicker Jamie Sawyer took a bad snap 17 yards for the TD, PAT was good. Sawyer then kicked off to the Forsan 23 and Forsan lost ground to their own 19. The Steers pushed Forsan back to their own 13 and forced them to punt to the Buffalo 39 with no return. Percifull took the ball for 5 yards and Graves Parks for 4 more before Sanchez picked up 3 and a Steer first down. Backup quarterback Eddie Hood ran for an additional 5 yards and Percifull raced 23 yards for a Steer TD, PAT failed, and the Steers led 13-0.

Sawyer kicked off out of the end zone and the Buffs took over at the 20. A couple of 1st downs put the Buffaloes at the Steer 45, but a tough Steer defense pushed them back 4 yards and forced them to punt to the Steer 10. Parks ran 30 yards for another 1st down and Hood passed 5 yards to Scott Long to end the 1st quarter at 13-0.

SECOND QUARTER

The Steers opened the 2nd quarter with a 15 yard penalty putting them at their own 30. Parks ran 7 yards, but Forsan forced the Steers to punt for the 1st time to the Forsan 34. The Steers pushed Forsan back and Kyle Gibbs intercepted a pass to the Forsan 29 yard line. Percifull ran 7 yards and Parks lost 1 before the Steers drew a 5 yard penalty for offsides. Quarterback Quint Anthony threw an incomplete pass and the Steers

were charged with a 5 yard penalty for delay of game and Anthony punted to the Forsan 16.

After a couple of 1st downs the Buffaloes punted to the Steer 23 and Parks returned it to the 39. From there the Steers couldn't move the ball at all and punted to the Buffalo 42. The Steers held Forsan at the 40 and made them punt. Parks sprinted 14 yards for a Steer 1st down and Percifull followed with 4 carries for 20 yards and two 1st downs. Anthony threw an incomplete pass and then fumbled at the 50 yard line. The Buffaloes had a drive going but it ended at the Steer 23 as time ran out. The score remained 13-0.

THIRD QUARTER

Forsan received the 2nd half kick off at the 10 yard line and returned to the 22. They made three 1st downs, but the Steers held on downs at their 33. Forsan held the Steers at the 36 and they punted to the Forsan 38. The Steers held at the Forsan 44 and they punted to the Steer 5. Parks fumbled at the 28 and Forsan scored from the 2nd yard line, the PAT was blocked and the score was 13-6.

Percifull received the kick off at the 23 and returned it to the 34. Parks gained 1 yard and Hood got 7 before Percifull took off for 7 and a first down. Mando Sanchez lost 5 yards and Anthony connected with Steven Ray for a 36 yard gain for a first down as the quarter ended.

FOURTH QUARTER

Sanchez opened up for 10 yards and a first down to start the 4th quarter. Percifull gained 7 more and Parks added 8 to put the Steers at the 1 yard line. Anthony lost 3 yards and Sanchez took it in from 4 yards out for the Steers 3rd TD, PAT was good. The Steers led 20-6 and put the game out of the Buffaloes reach. Sawyer kicked off to the 23 yard line for no return. Forsan moved the ball 17 yards for a 1st down. Forsan was penalized to the 25 yard line and the Steers held them at the 21. Forsan punted to the Steer 47 for no return.

Percifull powered his way through for 11 yards

on 2 carries and a 1st down. Parks took off for 11 yards and Forsan was penalized 15 yards to the 14. Sanchez was stopped at the line of scrimmage. The Steers were penalized back 15 and had to punt to the Forsan 22.

The Buffs drove to midfield but the Steers held on downs. Percifull ran for 3 yards but was sent back 5 on a penalty Parks drove forward 2 but Forsan held at midfield and blocked the punt to the Steer 36.

Sanchez intercepted a pass at the Steer 15 and returned it to the Forsan 30 but a penalty put the ball at the Steer 41. Parks rushed for 7 yards and Jose Saucedo added 2 as the game ended and the Steers defeated the Buffs 20-6.

Mosquito Breeding Places a Menace

Recent rains have brought a mosquito problem to many Texas communities. Standing water from these showers makes an excellent breeding place for mosquitoes.

Mosquitoes can lay eggs wherever standing water is available for a week or longer. Old tires, tin cans, birdbaths, roadside ditches, rain gutters, temporary water containers and swampy places all can hold enough water to provide breeding sites for mosquitoes.

If mosquitoes are a problem, the first thing to do is eliminate their breeding sites.

Empty out old tires and place them where they cannot collect additional water. Flatten and discard tin cans. Change the water in birdbaths every week. Clean out rain gutters, remove temporary water containers and see that rain barrels and water storage tubs are tightly covered. Drain standing water from ditches and swampy areas.

If there is standing water that serves as a breeding site but cannot be drained or eliminated, treatment with a larvicide will be necessary.

One of the most effective larvicides is No. 2 diesel oil with a biodegradable spreader, applied at the rate of six ounces per 100 square feet of surface.

Abate, malathion or Dursban applied to standing water at rates indicated on their labels also are effective larvicides. Labels should be read carefully to determine the hazards these insecticides pose to persons applying them and to fish and animals that may use the water.

Control of adult mosquitoes offers the most immediate relief. Inside the home, aerosol bombs containing pyrethrin offer quick knockdown of adult mosquitoes. The killing effect of pyrethrin is very shortlived, so frequent application will be necessary to control adult mosquitoes inside the house. The "pest strip" offers effective indoor control for long periods. One pest strip for each average size room is necessary to control mosquitoes, according to the entomologists.

Persons who are active

where mosquitoes are a problem should use repellents. These repellents will protect you from biting mosquitoes for from one to three hours, depending upon your type of activity.

Adult mosquitoes around the home can best be controlled by space or residual treatments of insecticides such as malathion, Dibrom, methoxychlor, or Dursban. Space treatments, generally fogs, have very little residual activity and require repeating at frequent intervals. Space treatment should be done during the cool hours of the night or early morning and when wind velocity is less than five miles an hour.

Residual treatment applied as mists or sprays to the resting sites of adult mosqui-

toes gives longer-lasting control than space treatments. These should be applied to vegetation, eaves of roofs, under porches and similar shaded areas where adult mosquitoes rest by day.

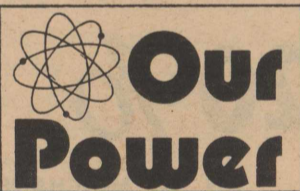

FINDING FUEL

Producing electricity without burning fuel may soon be possible, thanks to research efforts going on today.



We may soon be able to run power plants on batteries.

The energy would come from a fuel cell, which works like a storage battery, producing electricity from a chemical reaction. Fuel cells are efficient and non-polluting and cost less than coal to use.

Unfortunately, present fuel cells are small. As many as 400 would be needed to produce only 50 kilowatts.

Experts at Edison Electric Institute, the association of America's investor-owned electric utility companies, predict, however, that commercial-sized fuel cell-powered generators will be in use in the near future.
