Total number of housing units in Coke County was reported to be 2101.

These figures are subject to computer checking in the Census Bureau office in Dallas and again in Washington before they become official.

since then and most of them have had several. Several reasons were given as to how WTU has been able to manage without a rate increase during the past several years of double- ical residential electdigit inflation. Chief among these was the timing of WTU's power plant construction. Its newest and largest station was completed in the mid-1970s and provided generation reserves sufficient not only to last for several years but to allow profitable energy sales to other companies.

The company also cited its reputation as a conservative company with firm control of its expenditures.

However, the WTU manager said, the company can no longer absorb the effects of inflation without risking a dangerous decline in its financial condition. Of necessity, the company is entering into a multi-year construction program which will include a new coalfired power plant and several high voltage transmission line projects.

The proposed rates were based on detailed analyses of each customer rate class, including studies of their energy usage patterns, the investment required to serve them, and the cost of operation applicable to those customers.

The company's rate structure, which now has over 125 rates for many types and classes, year. would be reduced to less The cost of fuel has than 30 rates. The effect of the increase on the different custom- \$1.96 this past summer. er classes would vary according to present relative rates of return from each class.

For example, the typric bill would increase by about 10 per cent. Although customer bills have risen substantially in the creases have been the result of more usage and higher fuel costs. The city also has the option of denying the request and ceding future jurisdiction to the Public Utility Comission.

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

Cross Plains Buffaloes Slip By Steers at Homecoming

The Cross Plains Buff- Cross Plains took aloes made a shambles of the 1980 Steer Homecoming football game last Friday, as they won the game 6-0. Neither team was too impressive on the field as the Buffs had 144 yards total offense to the Steers' 75. Each team completed 3 of 7 passes and were about equal in penalties. The big factor was the weather. It rained throughout most of the game and the question was, "who can hold onto the football." Unfortunately the Steers fumbled three times and they did only once.

FIRST QUARTER The Steers opened it up by kicking off to the Buffalo 25, and Cross Plains fumbled on the return at the 27. Armando Sanchez fumbled on the Buffalo 17 and the Steer defense held them off. The Buffs punted to the Steer 43 for no return. Joel Percifull ran up the middle for five yards, Sanchez gained one yard and Eddie Hood lost one as the Steers were forced to punt. They fumbled the snap and Cross Plains recov-ered at the Steer 32. Cross Plains received a penalty for 15 yards which put them on the Steer 47.

They were unable to move the ball and the Steers took over at their own 23 yard line. Graves Parks gained 2 yards and Sanchez lost 1 on two plays and the Steers had to punt to the Cross Plains 17 with the help of a clipping penalty. At the end of the first quarter the

score was 0-0. SECOND QUARTER The Steers pushed the Buffs to 3rd down and 15 yards and a offensive pass interference moved the ball back 6 more yards. The Steers recieved the Buffs' punt at the Buffalo 42 yard line. From there Percifull muscled his way through for 13 yards and a Steer first down. Sanchez gained 0 yards and Parks gained 4 and Jose Saucedo got 1 before the Buffaloes held on downs and took over at the Buffalo 21. The Steers held the Buffs and received the punt at the RL 22, then received a penalty for 5 yards.

But then Cross Plains was forced to punt to the Steer 15. From there neither team threatened and just punted back and forth. The final score was 6-0.





Texas drivers are learning to live with 55 mph limit

COLLEGE STATION — Some Texas drivers are slowly learning to live with the 55 mph speed limit, perhaps in time to save the state some federal highway money, says a Texas A&M University researcher.

Many drivers still exceed 55 mph "but overall we are getting closer to the 55 mph mark," said Dr. Quinn Brackett, research specialist with the Texas Transportation Institute at Texas A&M.

"Several factors contribute to the better showing," explained Brackett. He cited the price of gasoline; smaller, more energyefficient cars which people tend to drive more conservatively, and public awareness of the effect of high-speed driving on fuel conservation and safety.

"Increased emphasis by enforcement agencies is also important," Brackett said.


Car care protects investment

COLLEGE STATION — An automobile has become too valuable an investment to ignore its maintenance needs, says an automotive specialist at the Texas Transportation Institute.

Service station attendants who once spotted danger signs and recommended action are not seeing as many cars today and warning signs that repairs are needed often go unnoticed, says Rick Tonda of the transportation institute at Texas A&M University.

Tonda recommends that a car owner shop around and find an inspection station that does a thorough job.

The rest of the year, the owner who has no automotive skills should either seek expert checks and pay for them or learn to watch for extreme wear and possible failures, Tonda advices
