ABSENTEE VOTE HEAVY County Clerk Mrs. Win-Tuesday afternoon that she has had 99 absentee ballots voted in her office or mailed to those who requested them. This number is unusually heavy for Coke County, she said. Friday (today) is the last day to vote absentee in the clerk's office and the last day for mail ballots to be postmarked. Ronald Reagan and George Bush for president and vice president are the first names listed on the ballot. Jimmy Carter and Walter Mondale are in the Democratic column; Ed Clark and David Koch in the Libertarian column; and John B. Anderson and Milton S. Eisenhower in the Independent column. Patrick Lucy, not Eisenhower, is Anderson's running mate. Eisenhower's name was certified before Anderson selected Lucy.

The second race on the ballot is of interest to Coke County voters, since it is for 21st District U.S. Representative. Incumbent candidate, Republican Tom Loeffler, is opposed by Democrat Joe Sullivan and Libertarian William Rice. Two railroad commissioners will be elected this year. Republican Henry C. (Hank) Grover is running against Democrat Buddy Temple for a full term. For unexpired term, the incumbent, James E. "Jim" Nugent is opposed by Republican H.J. "Doc" Blanchard and Libertarian David Hutzelman. For associate justice, Supreme Court, place 1, Republican Jim Brady is running against James P. "Jim" Wallace. For place 4, Republican incumbent Will Garwood is Continued on Page 7



Either Sex Deer Okay in County

Deer hunters in 23 Texas counties, including Coke will not need antlerless deer permits to harvest a doe this fall, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Wildlife biologists some 40 counties where anterless deer could be taken without special permits because of the high deer populations, good fawn crops and relatively light or moderate hunting pressure. However, county commissioners' courts in 17 counties rejected the

proposal.

Charles Winkler, big game program director for the department, said another factor in the decision to remove the requirement for antlerless deer permits is the traditionally low utilization of the permits by landowners and hunters.

Counties where antlerless permits are not required to harvest an antlerless deer are: Burnet, Blanco, Williamson, Bell, McCulloch, Menard, Schleicher, Mills, Mitchell, Nolan, Sterling, Coke, Irion, Tom Green, Concho, Bexar, Atascosa, Terrell, Pecos and Jeff Davis.




