RL SALES TAX REBATE INCREASES 35 PCT.

Business has been good in Robert Lee this year, according to the report from the office of the state comptroller. The city has registered a 35 per cent gain over 1979 in the amount of revenue received from the one per cent sales tax levy.

According to a press release from the office of Comptroller Bob Bullock, the city realized an increase during the last reporting period of \$642,099, from \$3816.16 in 1979 to \$4458.25.

Payments made to the city in 1980 have amounted to \$25,427.19, compared to the 1979 payments of \$18,756.30, which figures out to the 35 per cent increase.

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said that payments to cities of Texas of \$80.1 million brought they year's total up to better than a half billion dollars.

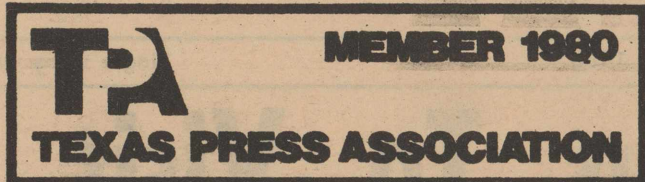

Tom Loeffler Receives 76% of Vote

Incumbent U.S. Congressman Tom Loeffler (R-Hunt) swept all 32 counties in the 21st Congressional District, winning reelection to a second term with 76 per cent of the vote in an area that usually votes for Democrats.

With all of the counties complete, Loeffler received 185,791 votes, out of a total of 245,483

cast. The following are his remarks: "We have come a long way in two short years. We have shown what can be done with hard work and dedication to a set of ideals most Americans -- and most Texans -- share.

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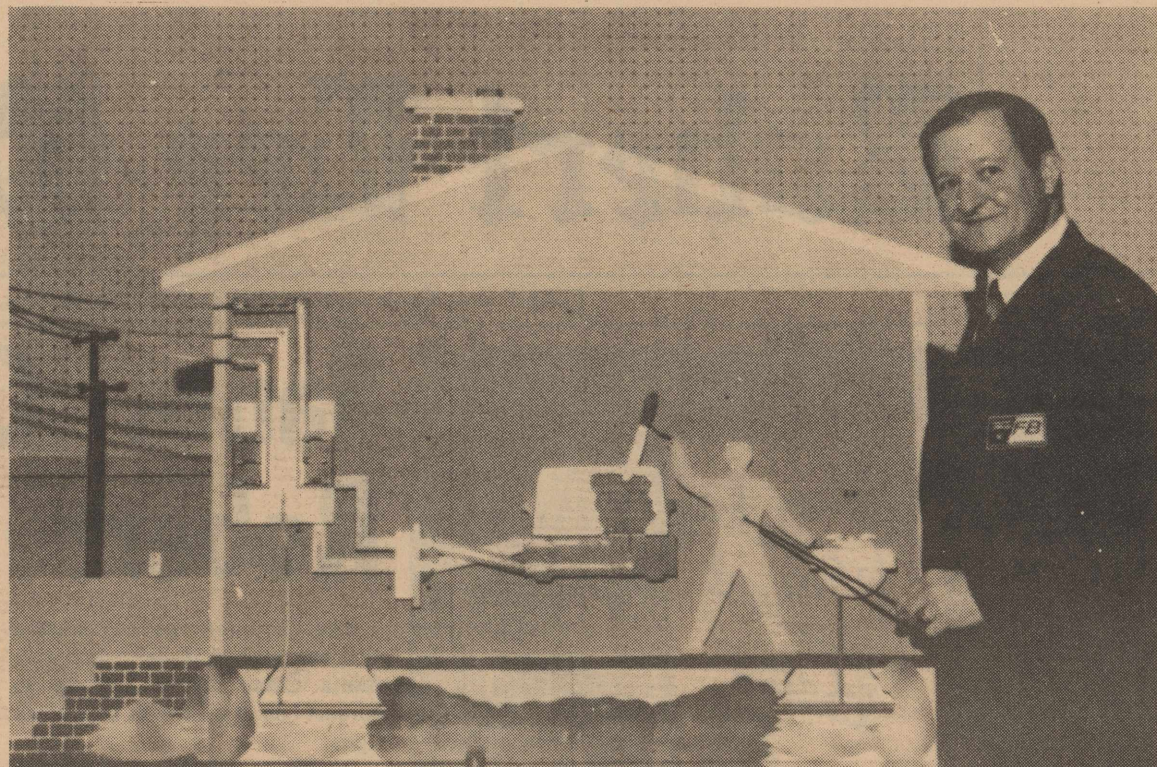

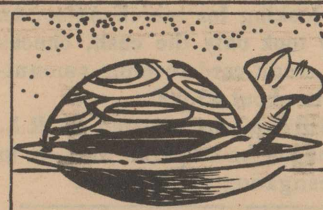

SCHOOL PROGRAMS ON ELECTRIC SHOCK

Sudden-death hazards were animated by Joe L. Smetana, Waco safety director for the Texas Farm Bureau as part of a graphic electric shock prevention demonstration held Nov. 13, at Bronte and Robert Lee Schools.

The average modern home has 120-volt or 240-volt, 60-cycle alternating household electrical current with a capacity of over 100 amperes. Electricity is constantly seeking ground. Unfortunately the human body can complete the electrical circuit. Medical authorities agree that if the amount of current required to light a 15-watt bulb, which is only 1/10 of an ampere, should flow through your heart, death might result in just one second. Most homes have a number of 15, 20, 30 and 40 ampere circuits, protected with either plug-type fuses or circuit breakers for fire prevention. Fuses or circuit breakers will not prevent electric shock.

Smetana achieved the animated effect of electric shock to the human body, via arm-to-arm and arm-to-feet with the use of a special plastic figure representing man - the "misuser" of electricity. The plastic man, several simulated household appliances and portable power tools have special wiring and bulbs that actually light up - producing the animation.

With each sequence of accident producing events, both inside and outside the "danger house", Smetana offered prevention and protective methods such as: (1) make sure the entire electrical system is grounded; (2) ground all major appliances; (3) maintain and don't break off the 3-prong plug; (4) attach the grounding "pig tail" wire on adaptors; (5) use "double insulated" portable power tools; (6) use ground fault interrupters; (7) disconnect electric power before servicing or cleaning; (8) be extra cautious of electric service and power lines when moving equipment, aluminum ladders and pipes; (9) beware of overhead power lines when putting up or taking down TV or Base CB antennas; (10) flying kites and model airplanes near electric wires is dangerous; (11) when vehicles collide with electric power poles, electrically charged wires fall - causing severe shock hazard until the power is turned off. Do not attempt to get out of the energized vehicle unless it is involved in fire. If you must get out, open the door wide, make sure there are no down wires and then jump free of the energized vehicles.
