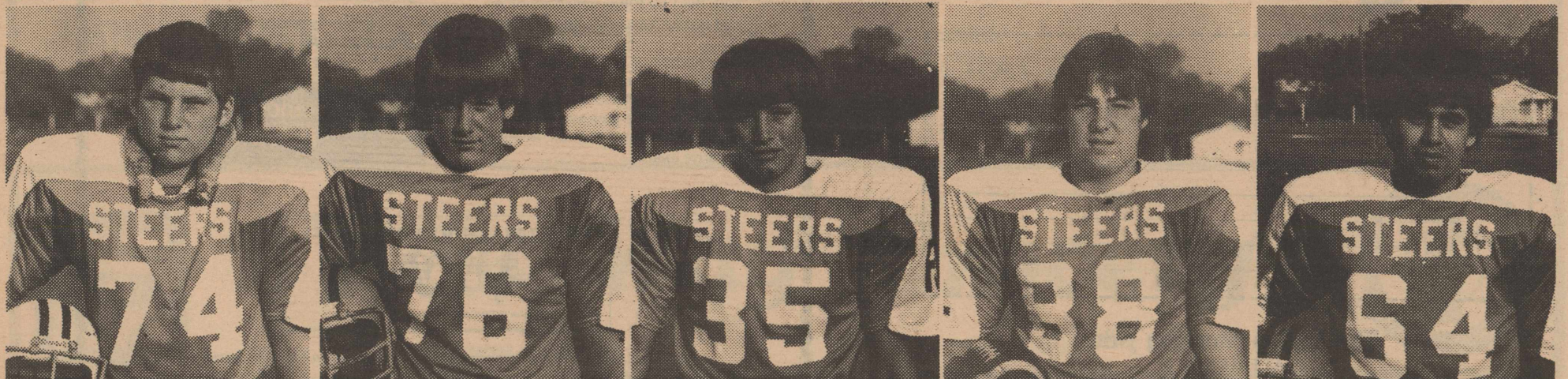
Since 1977 the club has headed the fund raising for these decorations and have purchased 54 of the trees.

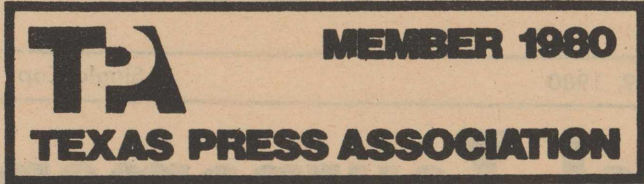

Watch Out for Those January Blues

Oh, you better watch out
Or you might just cry
You better be prepared
I'm tellin' you why

Jan-u-ary blues maaay appear.

The December holiday season is often followed by a period of depression known as the January blues, says Cindy Wilson, a family life education specialist.

This depression period often occurs because of the heightened amount of activities most people enjoy during the season and because of a variety of other factors, the specialist says. Taking a few steps to prevent or at least soften the January blues can be very effective, she adds.

Mrs. Wilson is on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Here are her suggestions for preventing or softening the January blues: Plan ahead to avoid commitments to too many activities during the December holiday period.

Stay within your budget during the season rather than incurring heavy debts to keep up with the Joneses, or to have a "happy" holiday period. Material possessions do not mean the holiday season will be a happy one. Avoid going into debt.

Be realistic in your travel plans. Too much travel during a short period of time is not only dangerous to your health but can tax everyone's relationships when the travelers are weary.

Be aware of and work to avoid

stirring up old conflicts within the family or between friends.

If unable to be with family or friends who live some distance away, make arrangements to be with nearby friends. This can help avoid the feelings of loneliness and depression. However, if you are one who chooses to be cheerfully alone during the holidays, don't feel pressured into joining others.

Realize that some people have particular problems during this period of the year. Perhaps a loved one is sadly missed, or perhaps memories of holidays gone by bring out inappropriate behaviors. Accept these people and their problems and work toward helping them enjoy the holidays. Be cautious yourself in your behaviors and reactions during the holidays.

If you travel during the holiday season, plan at least one day back at home prior to returning to work and school to recuperate from travel and the holidays. This will ease you and the family back into their regular routine and allow some transition time.

Remember, by preventing the January blues, you can work toward having a truly happy New Year.

INCLUDE LANDSCAPING COST WITH HOME

When building a new home, be sure to include landscaping costs, notes a landscape horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. An average landscape budget should be 10 to 20 percent of the cost of the house and lot. Ideally, plan the home and landscape as a unit before construction begins.

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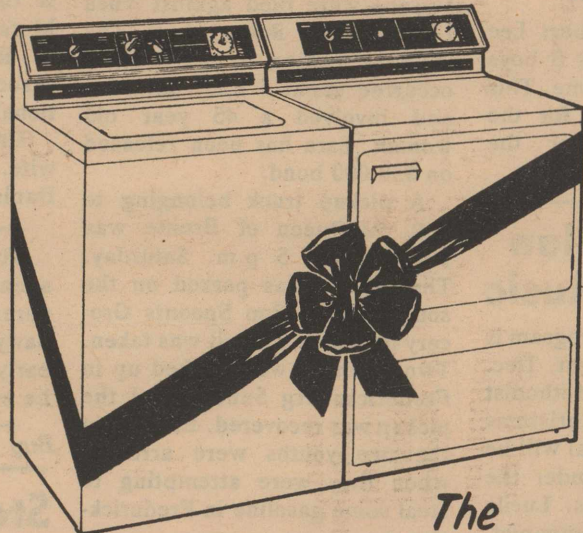
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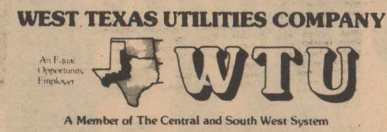

West Coke Ambulance Personnel Attend Seminar at Angelo State

Five members of the West Coke County Ambulance Service attended the West Texas Emergency Medical Care Seminar held at Angelo State University Dec. 13. Those attending were Gene Hinnard, Juanita Schnabel, Joe and JoAnn Harrison, Dorothea Helen Wright and Lou Wright.

Topics covered included taking the blood pressure and learning from it the patient's condition, the use of military anti-shock trousers, triage at the scene of mass casualties and many others. Dr. C.H. Gregory, director of the Texas Department of Health EMS Division, also spoke to the group.

EMERGENCY HINT FOR THIS WEEK: The busy housewife often gets into trouble when she is cleaning in the bathroom. She may quickly put some drain cleaner (such as Drano) in the drain and then while she is waiting for the time to elapse for her to rinse it out, starts scrubbing at the basin with a cleanser (such as Comet, Bab-O, etc.). When she adds water and rinses the cleanser down the drain, she is in effect forming phosgene gas (one of the gases used to cause such tremendous lung damage during World War I). Just remember...don't mix cleansers. You NEVER know what you might be doing. Should you begin to smell an acrid odor and your eyes begin to water, get OUT of the room at once and allow the gas which was formed to disappear. Safety is using ONLY one PRODUCT at a time.

MEDIC XIII, the EMS Instructors' Association based in San Angelo met last Saturday following the seminar. Members from Coke County include Louis Lee, Bronte, and Dorothea Helen and Lou Wright, Robert Lee. The group had helped sponsor the seminar. At the meeting, new officers for 1981 were elected and Lou Wright was again chosen to serve as secretary.

One of the primary goals of the group during 1981 will be to see if there is enough interest in the 13 county Concho Valley area to form an Association of ECAs, EMTs, and Paramedics. This would probably be a chapter of the Texas Association of EMTs. If you are interested or know someone who is, please have them contact Louis Lee in Bronte or Dorothea Helen Wright in Robert Lee. By forming this chapter (and it is hoped to have an organizational meeting in February), persons in this area who are involved in the delivery of emergency medical care will begin to have a voice in setting priorities and policies.

Dr. Richards was head of the business department at Angelo State University from 1974 until 1979 when he returned to full time teaching.

Survivors include his wife, a son and his parents.

IMPROVE POND FISHING

Texas ponds could produce much more fish if they were constructed properly, points out a fisheries specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. A drain pipe is one of the most important features of a pond to allow partial or complete harvesting of fish. A four-inch diameter drainpipe is sufficient for ponds less than an acre in size. A conventional spillway is also important to prevent damage to the pond dam during extreme flooding. It should be above the normal water level of the drainpipe.

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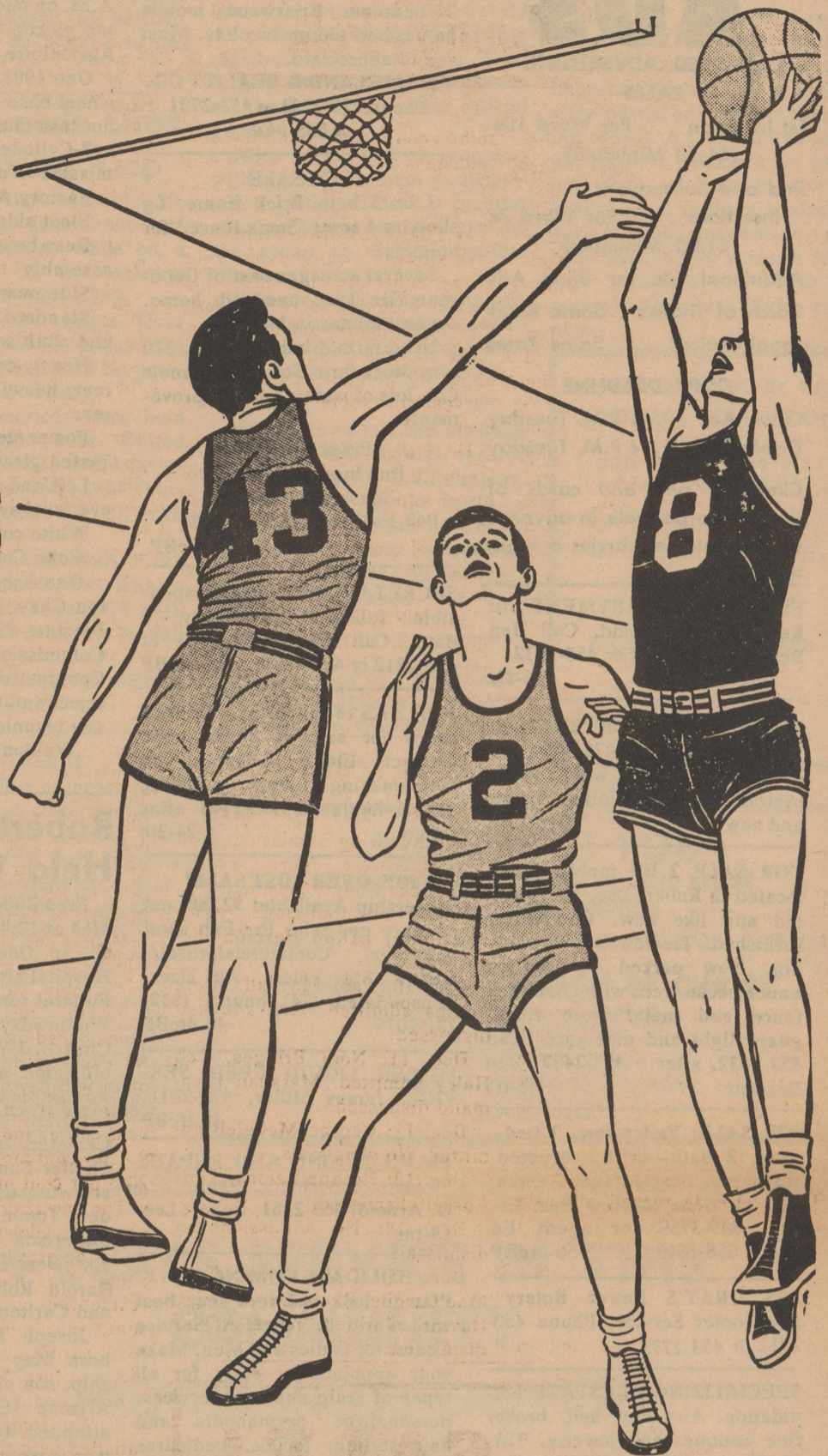

Commission Grants Raise In WTU Rates

The Public Utility Commission of Texas has approved a settlement agreement which authorizes West Texas Utilities Company to raise its rates, effective Dec. 15.

The agreement was reached by WTU and a number of intervenors, including 15 cities in its service area, after several days of negotiations. Stipulations in the settlement were based almost entirely on recommendations of the PUC staff.

The compromise agreement will amount to an average increase of 6.2 per cent in WTU's rates, compared to the 8.27 per cent requested in an application filed by WTU September 30. The amount allowed is almost the same as the company's only previous rate increase which was implemented in 1973.

The increase in annual revenue will amount to \$9,547,192, compared to the \$12,729,691 the Company had requested.

The new rates will go into effect automatically in unincorporated areas and in 26 cities which had denied the increase and had their cases appealed to the PUC. The other 55 incorporated cities in the WTU service area had suspended action on the rates and are expected to approve the PUC's decision.

Robert Lee is one of the towns which ceded jurisdiction to PUC.

The new rates will vary for different customer classifications, based on cost of operations for each class. Residential customer will pay 6.6 per cent more, commercial customers 1.1 per cent more, industrial customers 9.4 per cent more and municipals 20.8 per cent more.

The new residential rate is 4.54 cents per kilowatt hour, compared to the present average of 4.26 cents. This means the average residential customer, who presently used 702 kilowatt hours per month, will see his bill increase from \$29.94 to \$31.90.

Bob Boone, local manager, said the company is generally satisfied with the outcome of the rate case, although the settlement is for considerably less than has been sought.

"We are pleased that WTU and our customers were able to settle on a friendly basis without getting involved in a lengthy and costly hearing," he said.

Bridges on 208 To Be Widened

Construction has begun on widening drainage structures on State Highway 208 in Coke County.

Kidwell Construction Company of Dallas is the contractor on the project between 9.4 miles west of Robert Lee and 4.2 miles east of the Sterling County line.

"The bridges will be widened from the present 24 foot to 40 foot roadway width," said Gerald G. Lackey, supervising resident engineer for the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

The structures will be widened on one side at a time. Barricades, warning signs and when necessary flagmen will be used to direct traffic where the contractor is working.

The work will be completed by the fall of 1981.

Motorists should exercise caution and watch for men and equipment in the construction area.

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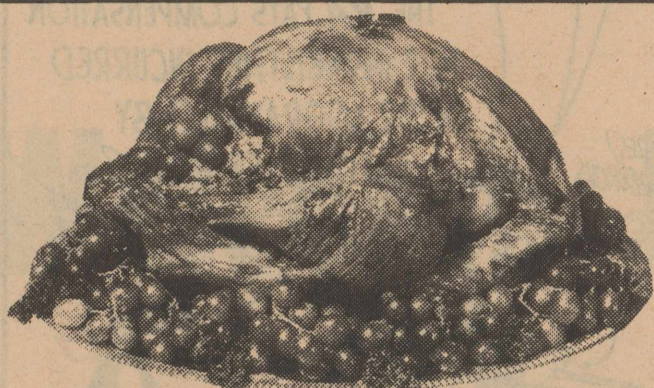
