

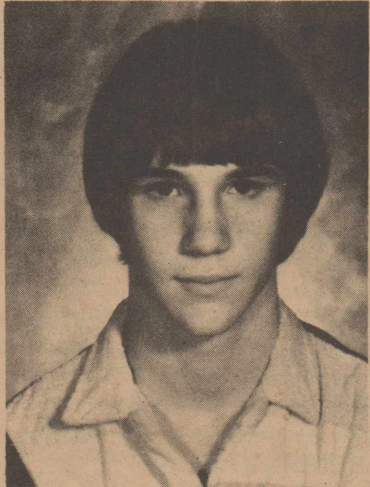

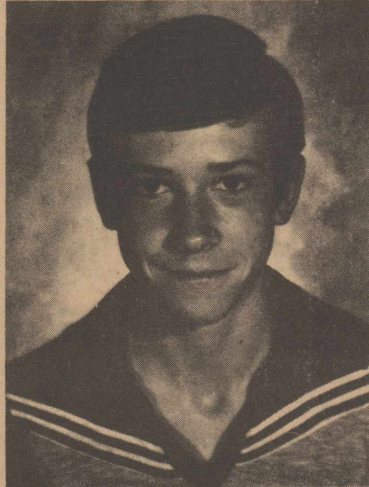

## Hayrick Lodge Managers Of Terry Cemetery

The Management of the Terry Memorial cemetery, located twelve miles west of Robert Lee, has been recently transferred from Pauline Coalson Barron and Juanita Barger, to the Hayrick Lodge No. 698. Ralph Walker, secretary, has been designated as the one to handle this business.

Mrs. Pauline Barron stated that her aunt, Mrs. Leola Reed Cummings, deeded this cemetery to Coke County, and that the property belonged to the people living here. She also stated that any needed work on private graves or on grounds could be taken care of by money left in a trust fund set up by Mrs. Cummings and that contact should be made with Ralph Walker.

This old cemetery, encircled by a substantial fence, located on the Rev. John Reed ranch and now owned by Wilbern Millican, has some historical significance. It had its beginning with the death of Isaac Reed, the 17 year old son of the Rev. Reed. His was the first grave placed in the northeast corner of the ranch and is marked April 14, 1898. This young boy was the grandson of the Preacher Isaac Reed who, according to a marker two miles north of Nacogdoches, Texas, organized the first Protestant church in Texas in 1835. Today it is called The Old North Baptist Church.

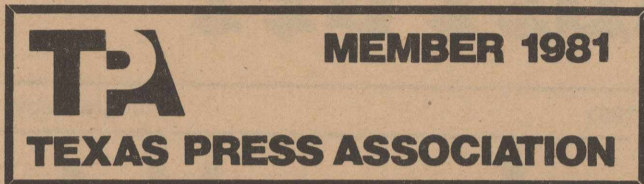

**Reports from Washington**

The Russian Bear's Grip?

From the start of the Polish crisis, the specter of a Soviet invasion has loomed on the horizon. But just what is in the mind of the Soviets regarding Poland no one knows for certain. Meanwhile, the high tempo of Soviet military activity continues. This could be an attempt to press Polish leaders to crack down on the Solidarity labor movement, to coerce the labor leaders themselves, or simply to continue large-scale military maneuvers. A lot of what happens is consistent with their usual pattern of coercion and intimidation.

One development is clear, however. The Reagan Administration has put virtually the whole range of its bilateral relations with the Soviet Union, including arms-control talks and arms-building restraints, into focus. It has put Moscow on notice that an invasion would kick off an accelerated campaign of diplomatic encirclement, including especially the Chinese.

A Soviet invasion would produce new restrictions worldwide on the whole Soviet bloc's access to foreign goods, technology and credits. An invasion would, furthermore, contribute to tendencies already evident in the Administration to find places outside Poland where the Soviet position is exposed.

Regardless of the ultimate outcome in Poland, the long-established Brezhnev Doctrine — never explicitly acknowledged by the United States — is in decline. It has been "respected" for a number of years by Western nations because frequently it was focused on Soviet bloc countries. It is now a matter of history what Russia did to East Germany in 1953, Hungary two years later and Czechoslovakia in 1968 with little more than *pro forma* protests by the West.

What we are now saying to Russia is that we will no longer acquiesce in Eastern and Central Europe while the Communist influence is expanded militarily.

The days of multilateral acceptance or tolerance of Soviet aggression appear to be on the wane in Western Europe as well. This could lead eventually to a more benign world or, on the other hand, in the worst case it could trigger a major confrontation.

Look at the world map: The Soviets must now deploy at least 44 divisions on a hostile Chinese border, rather than enjoy the domination of another time. The Russians have been ejected from Egypt and lost Indonesia. Afghanistan, Ethiopia, Angola, and Cuba are constant financial and strategic drains on the Soviet economy. A crackdown in Poland could mean virtual global isolation and lead to what the Russians fear most — encirclement by NATO, Japan and possibly even China.

To complicate Russian policies further, however, is that they can expect to have more "discipline" problems like Poland. Virtually all the communist parties in free Europe have asserted their independence of Moscow and now the Soviets may have to face the prospect of having its own Warsaw Pact allies turn on them.

'This may well be the most excruciating dilemma faced by the Soviet Union since the end of World War II. In making its final decision, the Russians must choose between preserving its political domain at any cost or deciding to pursue a less ambitious policy of world domination. They may even have to promote detente and disarmament as a matter of national policy!

The United States posture in this test of nerves is necessary — and long overdue. We have sat too long on the international sidelines and watched Moscow expand its influence around the globe. If the Soviets do invade Poland, it will not be because the United States turned its back.

Walls of Forsan and Troy Walls of Westbrook; three daughters, Lois Hurley of Henderson, Helen Mathers of Silver and Joy Spradlin of Grand Prairie; one sister, Bessie Walker of Robert Lee; 19 grandchildren and 13 great-grandchildren.

KCTV Building New TV Tower

Construction of a new tower and transmitter facility, scheduled to begin in May, will virtually double the coverage area of KCTV channel 8 of San Angelo.

When operational in September, the \$1.5 million facility will improve the station's signal in its current five-county area while expanding coverage into all or parts of 12 other counties.

"This facility has been in the planning stage several years," said Gil Schneider, KCTV General Manager. "We are proud that before long we will be able to provide the finest in viewing and service to a much greater part of Central West Texas."

Schneider explained that the facility will consist of a 1,400-foot tower located 24 miles southeast of San Angelo. A 95-foot antenna will be located on top of the tower with the transmitter housed at the base of the structure.

Effective radiated power of the proposed installation will be 316,000 watts, seven times the cur-

rent power. KCTV presently telecasts from a 446-foot tower located at its studio site at 2800 Armstrong.

"Viewers in all directions from San Angelo will be able to receive significantly stronger signals," Schneider said.

Besides providing clearer viewing in Coke, Concho, Runnels, Sterling, and Tom Green Counties, the new facility will expand KCTV's coverage to include Brown, Coleman, Kimble, Mason, McCulloch, Menard, and Sutton Counties. In addition, portions of Crockett, Nolan, San Saba, Schleicher, and Taylor Counties will be receiving the new signal.



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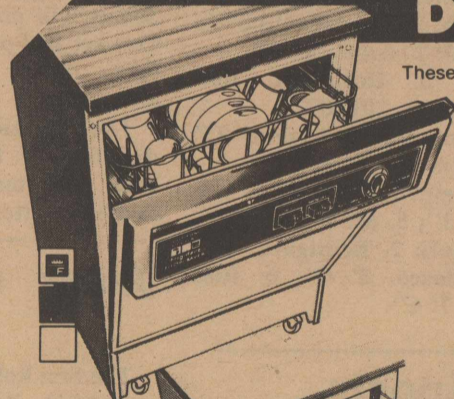

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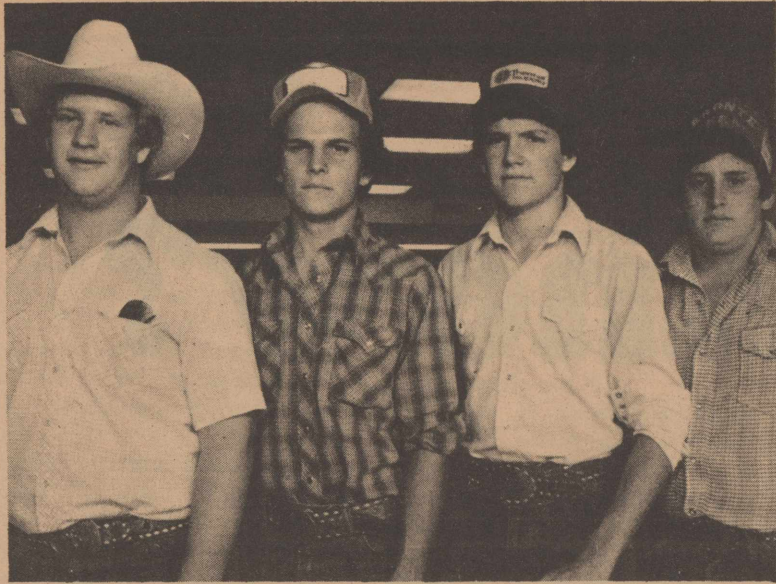

**Fructose As A Sweetner**

Fructose offers food manufacturers an alternative to standard sweeteners.

It's also known as fruit sugar or levulose.

Honey contains about 40 percent fructose while most fruits contain about five percent.

Fructose is approximately one-third sweeter than sucrose or table sugar.

However, the relative sweetness of fructose depends on the type of food to which it is added.

Fructose is sweetest when the temperature is decreased and acidity is increased.

Because it is sweeter than sucrose, less is required for an equivalent amount of sweetness. Thus fewer calories are added than with sucrose.

Absorbed slowly from the gastrointestinal tract, fructose can be converted by the liver to glucose for utilization as energy.

Therefore, it is important that diabetics calculate foods sweetened with fructose into the diet.

Fructose will probably not significantly change the incidence of dental cavities or tooth decay. Bacteria in the oral cavity can utilize fructose just as they do sucrose.

## Jerry Lackey's Country Folk

Sheep numbers in the United States show gains for the second year. The sheep census indicates nearly 13 million sheep accounted for which is about a two percent increase over one year ago.

Two percent really doesn't sound like much of an increase perhaps. But if one stops and thinks back to when we recorded a decrease of five and six percent annually, it is significant.

I was in Denver, Colo. when the American Sheep Producers Council unveiled the Blueprint for Progress challenge. What the Blueprint set out to do was encourage folks with small acreages of even 5 or ten acres to raise a few head of sheep. By doing so, they would increase their income in several ways from shearing twice a year and marketing lambs.

Our main thrust was in the midwest and east where people had jobs in cities but commuted to a ranchette home. Focus on this type of lifestyle would increase the sheep numbers overall.

A statement issued by Don Meike of Wyoming, chairman of the National Wool Growers Association, shows the Blueprint is working. "We expect a modest gain in sheep numbers based on the apparent retention of ewe lambs last year," he explained.

Meike believes the increase is due to the economics surrounding the movement during the past couple of years and the general widespread interest in sheep husbandry nationwide.

South Dakota registered the largest increase, moving from 550,000 stock ewes to 615,000. That makes the state fourth in the nation in sheep numbers. Texas is still ranked number one followed by California and Wyoming. They all showed gains as well. Nebraska showed the largest percentage increase, boosting their numbers by 28 percent to 115,000 of stock.

NWGA and ASPC officials

expect another modest increase next year. Meike added that the plunging lamb market during the fall of 1980 may have "shaken some people out."

"There is something funny about the whole market situation," Meike continued. "We've seen the producers price drop nearly 40 percent with no substantial price change in the retail sector at all. We've seen a lamb sale one week at less than half of what the carcass would sell for a few days later."

Well, where sheepmen maybe loosing on the lamb market, they will make up in federal incentive payments on wool they sold in 1980. The U.S. Department of Agriculture released figures which show growers will receive about \$36 million. This compares with \$32 million paid last year on 1979 marketings.

The current shorn wool support price is \$1.23 per pound but the 1980 national average market price for shorn wool was 88.1 cents a pound, a difference of 34.9 cents. Producer payments are determined by multiplying the payment rate (39.6 per cent) times the net dollar return received from wool sales.

Producers will receive \$1.40 per hundredweight in federal payments for unshorn lambs they sold or slaughtered in 1980. This payment is to compensate growers for wool on live lambs they marketed.

When payments are computed, 2½ cents a pound from wool payments and 12½ cents per hundredweight from lamb payments will be deducted. This money will be forwarded to the ASPC to finance advertising, sales promotion and related market development activities.

This brings us back to where we started: The Blueprint to increase sheep numbers. The Blueprint campaign is financed through the ASPC, so through advertising and promotion the growers nationwide are looking after their industry.

## Commissioners Hold Interviews For Custodian

Coke County Commissioners' Court had a full day of work when a regular meeting was held Monday. After going through their regular agenda, the commissioners spent considerable time interviewing applicants for a custodian for the courthouse.

In other action the commissioners:

- \* Voted to approve the sale of two lots in Robert Lee that were in judgment to Dot Stallings of Robert Lee. She paid expenses against the property and costs of transferring the property.

- \* Were informed by letter that hospital insurance on county officials and employees was being increased by 20 per cent.

- \* Approved hunting, trapping and fishing regulations 1981-82.

- \* Acted on a request of General Telephone Co. to bury a telephone cable across a road in Precinct 2.

- \* Heard a request from Howard County commissioners to support House Bill 602 which would repeal Senate Bill 621 passed two years ago to set up single appraisal districts in Texas Counties. The commissioners discussed the matter and tabled action, saying they need more time to study it.

- \* Ratified county depository contracts with both banks in Coke County.

- \* Accepted a plat presented by A.F. Hammonds in the Winfield Scott Survey. No county roads are located in the area.

- \* Paid bills.

- \* Interviewed nine applicants for the custodian position.

Funeral services were held in Robert Lee Thursday at 2 p.m. the First United Methodist Church, for Mrs. Willie Bell Clark. The Rev. John Reynolds officiated the services, with burial following in Robert Lee Cemetery.

Mrs. Clark, 82, died after a long illness Tuesday in Purple Hills Nursing Home in Bandera where she had been a resident for two months.

Born Nov. 4, 1898, in Stockdale, Willie Helm Bell was the daughter of Elizabeth Hall and William Helm Bell. She moved to Robert Lee as a young child, as the Bell family was prominent in helping settle early Coke County. One of nine daughters, who grew up together and attended Robert Lee Schools, she was long active in community affairs. A life-long Methodist, she was also a member of United Methodist Women's Circle and the Order of the Eastern Star.

Willie Bell and Freeman Clark were married in Robert Lee on May 30, 1920. He preceded her in death July 1, 1977.
