Robert Lee Baptist Church has seven active deacons who serve on a rotating basis. John Stephens is superintendent of the Sunday school.

DEDICATION PROGRAM

The Rev. Roy Epperson, who has been pastor of the church for almost eight years, will give the dedication sermon at the 11 a.m. worship service. Also included will be special music and a reading of the history of the church.

An open house, from 2 until 4 p.m. will provide an opportunity for everyone to look over the new building. Refreshments will be served, Epperson said, "and we hope all our members as well as all our friends from other churches will join us during this open house.'

"We're proud of it," Epperson said, "and we invite all the townspeople and friends of the area to come and share our joy."

The pastor added, "We are thankful to our people for the sacrifices they have made, but we know the Lord has blessed us in Akron, Colo. to Silver. They are this undertaking and thank Him residing on the Robert Walker for helping all of us see this ranch. Mrs. Price is the former successful conclusion of our go-

The Robert Lee Baptist Church was organized July 26, 1904, with 14 charter members. Two years later the membership still numbered 14, and expenditures for he year totaled \$675.

Services began with preaching once a month, progressed in 1922 to half-time, and finally in 1935 advanced to full-time.

The church has had 27 pastors. It has ordained three ministers and 18 deacons and has recognized 21 deacons moving into the membership.

The first building at the corner of Chadbourne and West 11th was completed in 1907. concrete porch was added in 1927, and Sunday school rooms were partitioned off in 1930. This building was dismantled in 1937 to make way for a new one.

The first service held in the new building was on Easter Sunday, 1938. The education annex was added in 1949 and the nursery building in 1953, during the oil boom years of peak attendance. Highest Sunday school attendance on record was 286 in April 1955.

The new two-story educational building was completed in September 1969, and the new sanctuary completed in July 1981 brings the history up to date.

Revival Will **Highlight The Opening Week**

A revival meeting will be held at Robert Lee Baptist Church during the first week after the dedication of its new sanctuary. The special services will be held from Aug. 3 through Aug. 9.

The pastor, the Rev. Roy Epperson, said, "We could think of no better way to open up our new sanctuary than by having a revival meeting." He said, "It was the most appropriate way we could think of to put the new building into use for the Lord and the people of this community."

Dr. Henry Kin Keade, who has been pastor of the First Baptist Church in Irving for almost 30 years, will be the preacher for the special services. He will be remembered by many Robert Lee persons, as he held a revival here in 1975.

Robert Cuellar, minister of music at the South San Antonio Mexican Baptist Church, will be leading the music. He is a former pastor at Bethel Mission in Robert Lee in 1973-74, and known to many local people.

Morning services will be held next week, Tuesday through Friday, at 10 q'clock. Evening services will be held Monday through Friday at 8 o'clock. Sunday services will be at 11 a.m. and 7 p.m.

A nursery will be provided for those who have young children.


Epperson said, "Everyone is welcome to attend any and all of these services. The church issues you a special invitation to take part in them."

Time To Set Up Jury Wheel; Some Can Request Exemptions

Laws of the State of Texas provide for the setting up of a new jury wheel for each county between Aug. 1 and 15 each year. Officials of the county who reconstitute the new jury wheel are the tax collector, sheriff and county and district clerk.

Names of all registered voters in the county are deposited in the jury wheel.

However, there are some registered voters who may request a permanent exemption from jury duty and, if found eligible, their names will be removed from the

County Judge D.W. Sims said that persons who are eligible for a permanent exemption from jury service are (1) those who are 65 years of age or over and (2) those who have a permanent physical or mental disability which makes them incompetent to serve.

Judge Sims said that since a large number of Coke County citizens are over 65 and do not wish to serve as jurors, it would be more convenient for them and the county to have their names removed from the list.

A person who wishes to have his name removed from the jury list must file a sworn statement that he is eligible for an exemption and file it with the sheriff, tax assessor or county clerk. Forms are available at the office the county judge or they may be picked up at the Robert Lee Observer and Bronte Enterprise

Judge Sims said there are other reasons for exemption from jury service, but they are not necessarily reasons for a permanent exemption. Most common cause for excusing a prospective juror is the provision that a female who has custody of a child or children under 10 years of age

A person who does not meet the following qualifications is not eligible for jury service:

1. He must be a citizen of the state and of the county in which he is to serve and qualified under the constitution and laws to vote in said county.

2. He must be of sound mind and good moral character.

3. He must be able to read and write, except as otherwise proivded in the law.

4. He must not have served as a juror for six days during the preceding six months in the District Court, or during the preceding three months in the County Court.

5. He must not have been convicted of a felony.

6. He must not be under indictment for other legal accusation of theft or of any felony.

Judge Sims said some of the above-listed provisions may or may not give a prospective juror a permanent exemption.

He added that the primary interest of county officials is to remove names of those persons from the jury list who do not want to serve and are over 65 years of age or have a permanent physical or mental disability. "I emphasize that only those persons wishing not to serve should file for an exemption," Judge Sims

Carrying names of these persons on the list adds expense and unnecessary work for the county and inconvenience to the persons involved.

The judge emphasized, however, that there is no way county officials can remove a name from the jury list without a request and sworn statement.

Reports from Washington

THE VOTING RIGHTS ACT

The Voting Rights Act will not expire until 1982 but already battle lines are being drawn on this emotional and complex issue. I expect interest will mount as the months progress

It seems to me that now is the time to begin a review of the Voting Rights Act and ask the questions that must be asked — so we can ensure that the actions taken by the Congress will be the

President Reagan has requested a review of the Act from the Attorney General and has asked several tough questions of his

— He asked for a review of the history of the Voting Rights Act. - He asked the Attorney General to outline current and likely abuses of the Act.

He questioned the effectiveness of the Justice Department in enforcing the Voting Rights Act as now written.

He asked for suggested changes in the Act, as well as possible extensions of the Act to cover other voting abuses.

The President wants the Justice Department to answer these questions, review all aspects of the Voting Rights Act and report back to him by October 1. I, for one, will be very interested in the Justice Department findings.

For the time being it is important, I think, to understand what the issues are and to raise the questions that must be answered before we can proceed.

The Voting Rights Act was passed in 1965 in response to the widespread violence over civil rights during the Kennedy/Johnson years. Initially, the Act affected those states in which less than 50 percent of its eligible voters registered or voted in the 1964 election. Seven Southern states were covered by the Act; Texas was not among them.

In 1975, the Voting Rights Act was reauthorized and expanded to cover "language minorities." Because of our large Hispanic population, Texas was brought under the Voting Rights Act along

with other regions of the Southwest.

Simply stated, the Act seeks to assure that the right of citizens to vote is not denied or abridged on account of race or color in any Federal, state or local election.

One of the main provisions of the Act forbids the use of literacy tests as criteria for voter registration. It also authorizes the Attorney General to send in Federal examiners to register voters and ensure that all qualified citizens have access to the electoral

The 1975 amendments to the Voting Rights Act provide for bilingual ballots and other voting materials in areas where there is a "language minority" population of more than 5 percent.

Then there is the "preclearance" rule which requires every state or locality covered by the Voting Rights Act to get advance approval from the Justice Department for any changes in election procedures.

What effect have the provisions of the Voting Rights Act had

More than 400,000 minority voters have registered in the state of Texas since the Act went into effect in 1976 and minority turnout in the 1980 Presidential election was the highest ever. The Justice Department has blocked 128 election plans in the state in

the last six years to protect minority voting rights.

On the other hand, 16,000 political subdivisions in the state of Texas must, for example, file separately with the Justice Department for every simple change in a polling place or a water district boundary line, creating a huge paper bureaucracy at both the state and Federal levels.

Where are we going now?

The House Judiciary Committee is in the process of holding hearings on the Voting Rights Act both in Washington and in areas around the country. One of the Committee's more conservative members, Congressman Henry Hyde of Illinois, has stated that he was deeply concerned by the reports of continued abuse which the Committee has heard. Based on these hearings, Congressman Hyde has now reversed his position and favors extension of the Act with amendments rather than outright repeal.

If the Act is amended, what form should the amendments take? Should all 50 states be covered rather than just most of the South and pinpointed regions of the rest of the country

Should the preclearance requirement be dropped or just limited to those cases most likely to cause discrimination such as annexations or major redistricting?
Should there be a "bail out" provision which would allow

localities to apply for exemption from the preclearance

The Voting Rights Act issue is a tough one — we don't have all the answers. We must look at the successes and failures of the Act and consider all the options as rationally and dispassionately as we can. But the real issue here is not whether the rights which the Voting Rights Act seeks to protect are worthy of protection but whether this particular Act is the best means of guaranteeing that

right. We all hope the Attorney General's report on October I will begin to give us the answers. We will then need to make wise

Malathion Is Safe Insecticide

We have been hearing quite a bit about the Mediterranean fruit fly lately and the aerial usage of malathion to control the Mediterranean fly. The reaction of the people is normal, but this case is unwarranted.

All chemicals must be respected for what they are and must be handled correctly. Missuse. overdosage, careless use of many chemicals can cause problems. Household items such as bleaches, table salt, medicines and many more, can be harmful when improperly used.

Despite the public uproar in California about the use of malathion to control Mediterranean fruit flies, the material has proven track record of being safe and free of health hazards.

'Malathion has been with us a long time--since the early 1950s-and is one of the most commonly used insecticides by farmers, homeowners and gardeners," points out Dr. Phil Hamman, entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. Hamman says he has been innundated with telephone calls since the California controversy from people wanting to know about the safety of malathion.

Tests sponsored by the National Cancer Institute have shown malathion to be both non-carcinogenic (not causing cancer) and non-mutagenic (not causing genetic changes).

According to Dr. Bill Plapp, research toxicologist with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, malathion is one of the least dangerous insecticides in use today

Malathion is routinely used by many homeowners and gardeners go control insects and mites on trees, shrubs, houseplants, flowers and vegetables. It is also used to control external parasites on pets. It is 1/65 as toxic as vapona, the material used in dog collars.

Another major use of malathion in Texas has been for mosquito control programs. Malathion is used almost exclusively to rid urban and suburban areas of disease-carrying mosquitoes. In 1966-67 and again in 1971, vast areas of Texas, including major cities such as Dallas, Houston and Corpus Chrisi, were serially sprayed with malathion to control outbreaks of St. Louis encephalitis and Venezuelan equine encephalomyelitis, diseases spread by mosquitoes.

The entomologist points out that in all of these uses of malathion, there has been no record of problems involving human health.

Of course, Hamman cautions users of malathion as well as other insecticides to follow commonsense precautions for safe and effective results. This means following directions on the product label, avoiding any unnecessary contact with the insecticide, and washing your hands after use. He also suggests scrubbing sprayed fruits or vegetables before cooking or eating.

Special emphasis is given by professions in the field on the training and motivation of the disadvantaged and handicapped. All sessions provided an opportunity for homemaking educators to integrate new knowledge and instructional techniques into classroom discourse.

The more than 11,400 Texans currently certified as private pesticide applicators in the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) Vernon and Odessa districts will be receiving recertification forms soon, Commissioner Reagan V. Brown has reported.

The TDA Odessa district includes the following counties: Andrews, Martin, Howard, Mitchell, Nolan, Taylor, Runnels, Concho, Menard, Sutton, Schleicher, Tom Green, Coke, Sterling, Irion, Crockett, Reagan, Glasscock, Midland, Upton, Crane, Ector, Winkler, Ward, Loving, Reeves, Culberson, Hudspeth, El Paso, Jeff Davis, Presiio, Brewster, Pecos, and Terrell.

The recertification program will continue through the summer, and all 116,000 private applicators in the state will be recertified, Brown said.

"TDA has been certifying applicators for five years," noted Brown. "We're sending renewal notices to applicators to update files with current addresses, and delete persons that are inactive, deceased or no longer farming. In addition, the current list will enable us to send these applicators timely information and keep them up to date on current

"Commercial and non-commercial applicators are not included, as they are required by law to have their licenses renewed annually."
