Judge Sims called the meeting after the Coke County Commissioners Court voted Monday, Aug. 31, to object to the valuations. The commissioners presented a challenge petition to tax office officials after it was determined that a meeting of the board of equalization on Aug. 26 when the tax roll was approved, was in violation of the Open Meetings Law. Consequently, the board of equalization set another hearing for last night (Thursday).

A high point in the meeting which brought cheers from the crowd was when Mayor James A. Tidwell of Bronte went to the microphone and announced he had just come from a meeting of the Bronte City Council, and the council members had voted for the City of Bronte to join Coke County in opposing the valuations.

Mayor Robert Vaughan of Robert Lee spoke briefly and stated his ideas of how the new valuations would affect taxes paid to the City of Robert Lee.

Judge Sims emphasized that he needs all the support he can get from citizens if the county's objections are to carry any weight with the appraisers and the board of equalization.

Two petitions were circulated among the crowd and signed by a great many of those present. The first one asked that valuations in the county be decreased by 30 per cent across the board and the second asked that the appraisal district office be closed and its functions be returned to the courthouse.

Judge Sims asked all those present to be on hand Thursday at 7 p.m. at the appraisal office and to bring somebody with them. Sims said a large crowd at the Thursday night meeting would lend more weight to the objections being made by the county.



Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to authorize cities, towns and other taxing units to grant exemptions from ad valorem taxes on an unproductive, underdeveloped or blighted area in order to encourage its development. The amend-ment would also allow the legislature to authorize a city or town to issue bonds or notes to finance this development and to pledge future increases in ad valorem tax revenues from the property in such areas to repay these bonds or notes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize cities, towns, and other taxing units to encourage the improvement, development, or redevelopment of certain areas through property tax relief and the issuance of bonds and notes.'

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 117 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize a person to receive a patent to land from the Commissioner of the General Land Office under certain conditions. Application for the patent must be made within five years from approval of the amendment. The land must be surveyed, public free school land not previously patentable. The person must have a properly recorded deed to the land, which he acquired without knowledge of the patent defect and which title he and his predecessors in interest have held for at least 50 years. The person and his predecessors in interest must have continuously claimed the land and paid the taxes for at least 50 years.

This amendment does not apply to beach land, submerged land, or islands. An applicant may not use this provision to resolve a boundary dispute. This amendment will not apply to land which has been determined to be state-owned by a court of competent jurisdiction or that has a productive state mineral lease on the effective date of the amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the commissioner of the General Land Office to issue patents for certain public free school fund land held in good faith under color of title for at least 50 years as of November 15, 1981."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 38 proposes a constitutional amendment that would enable the legislature to grant to a state finance management committee the authority to state funds. constitutionally dedicated to specific purposes would not be subject to committee management. The committee would be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House of Representatives, Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, Chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, Chairman of the Senate State Affairs Committee, and the Chairman of the House of Representatives Ways and Means Committee.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to grant to a state finance management committee the power to manage the expenditure of certain appropriated funds."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would provide that one-half of the surplus tax revenues

above the spending limit provided by Article VIII, Section 22, of the Texas Constitution would be placed in a Water Assistance Fund to be used as provided by law, including projects for water development and conservation, water quality en-hancement, and flood control purposes or any combination of these pur-

The amendment also provides \$500,000,000 of the general credit of the state to guarantee bonds issued in commercial markets by local political subdivisions, including cities, counties, and special districts. The amendment allows amounts to be established to decrease or retire state debt, which is defined as that debt secured by the full faith and credit of the state. The amendment would raise the interest that could be paid on authorized, but unissued, bonds guaranteed by the full faith and credit of the state from 6% to 12%.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the use of a portion of the excess revenues of the state for water development, water conservation, water quality enhancement, and flood control purposes; authorizing the use of the state's credit, not to exceed five hundred million dollars, to guarantee the bonds of cities, counties, towns, and other units of local government in the financing of projects for such purposes; increasing the interest rate that may be paid on previously approved, but unissued, state bonds; and authorizing a program to retire state bonds."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 49 proposes a constitutional amendment that would exempt livestock and poultry from taxation. Currently, farm products in the hands of the producer and family supplies for home and farm use are exempt.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide for the inclusion of livestock and poultry with farm products as exempt from taxation."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 81 authorizes the governing body of a county, city, school district or other political subdivisions to exempt from taxation a portion of the market value of a residence homestead. The portion exempted may be as much as 40% for 1982-1984; 30% for 1985-1987; and 20% for 1988 and after. The amount of an exemption may not be less than \$5,000 unless the legislature by general prescribes law other monetary restrictions on the amount of the exemption. An eligible adult is allowed to receive other applicable exemptions provided by law. An exception is made where ad valorem tax has previously been pledged for the payment of deht.

The amendment further directs the legislature to require that notice be given to property owners of a reasonable estimate of tax on their property in certain situations.

The proposed amendment will appear on the hallot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing a political subdivision to provide property tax relief for owners of residence homesteads and changing certain property tax admini-strative procedures."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Veterans' Land Board to issue and sell an additional \$250,-000,000 in bonds increasing the Veterans' Land Fund's total bond issuance authorization from \$700,000,000 to \$950,000,-The amendment would increase the maximum interest payable by the state on these bonds from 6% to 10%, permit an even higher rate, if specified by the legislature.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of additional bonds to finance the veterans' land program and to increase the maximum interest rate allowable on veterans' land fund bonds."

Museum, Jail Needs On Agenda Funeral Held As Commissioners Court Meets Friday For

Jails were among the main items of discussion at the Monday morning meeting of the Coke County Commissioners' Court. Needs of the old county jail at Robert Lee which has been designated as a museum and needs of the small two-cell jail at Bronte to bring up its standards were talked by the commissioners.

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Diane Luckett, secretary of the Coke County Historical Commission met with the court and discussed some of the future needs of the commission to develop the old jail into an attractive museum. Mrs. Luckett said the most pressing needs are a fence around the area back of the building and the construction of a shed to house old farm implements and other large items which cannot be placed in the building.

Mrs. Luckett also called attention to the centennial of Coke County which is coming up in 1989--a little more than seven years away--but she said now would be a good time to start thinking about the observance of the county's 100th birthday.

Judge D. W. Sims and Sheriff Marshall Millican gave a report of their recent trip to Austin where they learned that the twocell holding jail at Bronte is going to be closed Dec. 31, unless standards are met.

The commissioners authorized Sheriff Millican to contact Joe Slater of Austin, jail standards inspector, and ask him to meet with the commissioners to discuss the matter. Judge Sims said the court needs some answers before voting to spend county money on the jail. "What we're wondering," the judge said, "is, even if we do comply with requirements, will we stay in compliance. He noted that jail standards seem to fluctuate and the court needs assurance that funds spent for improvements will not be wasted.

In other business the com-

missioners:

*Studied an application from General Telephone asking for permission to bury some cable across county roads in Precinct 3. They tabled any action until Commissioner Finis Millican can discuss the matter with GTE

*Took no action on a request from the National Association of Counties that they consider adopting a deferred compensation program, which would allow county officials and employees to set aside part of their income and not pay taxes on it until the money is used for retire-Judge Sims said the commissioners didn't seem too interested in participating since Coke County already has a retirement program.

*Heard a request from the YMCA of San Angelo for permission to use the old Rec Hall at Robert Lee for conducting a physical fitness program. The commissioners decided for Judge Sims to invite Kate Nelson, director of the program, to meet with them next Monday to discuss the matter

further.

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*Set fees for the sheriff to charge for various services, such as serving citations. They set the fees to be the same as Dallas County uses. The commissioners are cooperating in a program which has been undertaken to standardize sheriffs' fees in all Texas counties.

*Authorized name change on checks of the veterans service officer. Stanley Parker of San Angelo is the new officer serving Coke County.

*Authorized payment of bills.


