CATTLE.

Moderate Supply of Sceers Met Slow Demand at Weak Prices

Following the liberal showing of cattle 23. that was made yesterday at the central markets with a rather large Tuesday run at the same points, there was an easier turn to the market of today. Weather was severely cold and buyers were in no hurry to get into operation. When they did begin to move around they bid weak and 10c lower prices on all medium and common steers than yesterday. Offerings included a limited showing of fairly good medium to strong weight dressed beef steers but nothing on strictly choice to prime order and the bulk of steers were of no better than medium quality, light to medium weight. The stagnated condition of the feeder trade was sharply reflected in the market for fleshy steers weighing around Maxwell Spayde & Co, and under 1,000 pounds. Bulk of steers at hand sold within a range of \$3.75@4.40 but with fairly good weights going at \$4.60/a4.80 while strictly good heavy steers sold up to \$5.40 and the market on these was fully steady to strong. SOUTH ST. JOSEPH LEADS

Kansas City Drovers Telegram, Monday: Hogs are selling 10c higher at Kansas City than at any of the other western markets and not because the quality is better, or the weights are more desirable nor on account of the inadequate supply. 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
