RUSSIAN DISPATCHES HAVE STOPPED

St. Petersburg Now Believes a Demonstration Was Undertaken to Distract People at Home from the Present Situation.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 30.—Instead of confirmation of Saturday night's report that Gen. Kuropatkin had broken through the Japanese left there came Lieut. Gen. Sakharoff's official admission that the Russians had been compelled to retire from Sandepas on account of their inability to carry a re-attack.

The Russian Slave of Moscow publishes an interview with Prince Hilkoft, the minister of communications, in which he states that the double tracking of the Siberian railway is impossible for the purposes of the present war but that minor improvements, especially the construction of sidings, will bring up the carrying capacity of the road to the equivalent of 22 trains each way daily.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 30.—Telegraphic advices received here from the Japanese Manchurian headquarters say: "Our detachments occupied Lushanbo yesterday and war-wise engineer attacked by a superior force of the enemy last night. We entirely repulsed the enemy."

St. Petersburg, Jan. 30.—Evidence is accumulating that Emperor Nicholas, throughout the present crisis, has acted largely upon the advice of Grand Duke Sergius, who is the most reactionary member of the imperial family, the head of what is dominated the war party, and whom the general stigmatize as Russia's evil genius.

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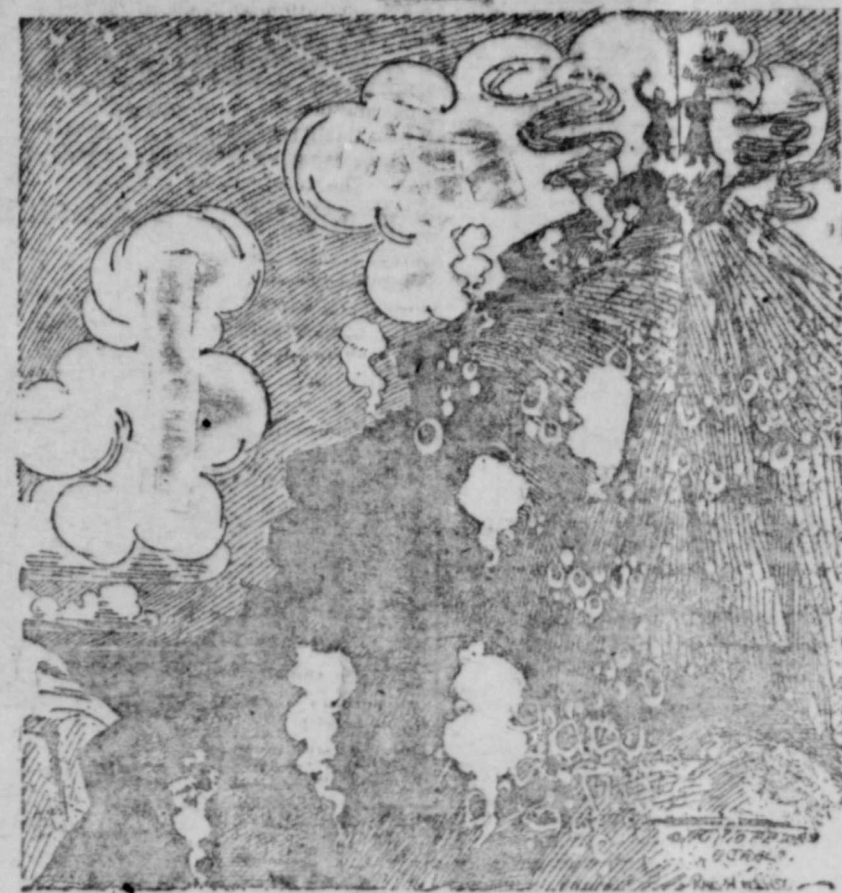
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WANTED TO STAY THERE

He stated that he was hopeful the United States senatorial deadlock would be broken this week, and that he would remain in the capital until the successor to Senator Cockrell had been elected.

Los Angeles, Cal., Jan. 30.—Roy Knabenshue, the aeronaut, made a successful flight in Capt. Baldwin's airship, the California Arrow, at Chutes park. Knabenshue was in flight about 45 minutes, during which time he circled within a radius of about one mile of the park, executing all sorts of maneuvers with the big aerial craft, returning finally and landing within the enclosure of the baseball grounds, from which he had started.

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OMAHA'S BIG FIRE.

Half Block of Business Houses in Wholesale District Destroyed.

LOSS ALMOST COVERED BY INSURANCE

Heroic Work of Firemen Saved City from Even Greater Conflagration—\$500,000 May Not Cover Extent of Damage.

Omaha, Neb., Jan. 30.—The fire which started Saturday at midnight in the wholesale district of this city was the most destructive in the history of Omaha. The total loss will exceed \$500,000 and by some it has been placed considerably higher.

A half block was burned over, but the immense buildings contained great jobbing stocks, which is responsible for the enormous loss. The buildings themselves were valued at to exceed \$200,000 and were owned by the Mercer and Millard estates.

DEATH RATE OF INFANTS.

It is increasing in spite of the best efforts of modern science.

In spite of the increase in the pasteurization of milk, in spite of the fact that in some circles of society there is a growing knowledge about the care of infants, the death rate of those under two years old over the country, says the Philadelphia Inquirer, is so large as to cause great alarm.

"If 100 mothers of sound health would agree to submit the entire care of their infants to one direction I warrant that not one of the children would, if properly brought into the world, die of summer disease."

This is an astonishing statement, but it can be practically verified by nearly every practitioner whose experience with the children has been large. It seems strange that though the human race is thousands of years old, there is so little knowledge on the part of mothers as to the proper care of infants.

It is because every mother depends on herself for instruction or the poor experience of others to help her children through the critical portion of the year.

These days physicians are doing their best to inform mothers that the use of raw milk in summer time is dangerous—almost criminal.

Especially is this the case in that portion of the city where children never get fresh milk. Little milk is served in this city that is not 24 hours old and since much of it is not kept on ice the process of souring begins soon.

This process is effected by the extraordinary development of bacteria, which affect the intestines of children and bring on that long list of summer complaints.

Wherever there is intelligent care taken of children and wise supervision is exercised there is no more fear of dysentery in the summer time than there is of smallpox.

Yet many thousands of children die every summer because of neglect. There is no mother in this city so poor that she cannot send a postal card to the board of health for its instructions on the subject and to follow them out only costs less than the ordinary practice, but is sure to result in benefit to the infant.

The difficulty in impressing mothers is the fact that they assert that they know more about children than any doctor who ever lived and insist upon practices which are certain to bring disease and probably death.

It is time to start a school of instruction for mothers.

LOVE THE ROAR OF TRAINS For This Reason Many People Insist on Living Close to Railroad Roads.

"There are any number of people in this city who go out of their way to get houses near a railroad," said a prominent real estate man who was discussing the vagaries of house hunters, to a writer for the Philadelphia Record.

"I took me a long time to find that out, but since I have discovered that certain types of people like the bustle and confusion and even the smell of the railroad I have enlarged my list of houses bordering on railroad roads.

"Sometimes it's an old railroad man who comes to me to ask for a little house that overlooks the tracks where the iron giants go puffing and pulling and steaming all day and night; and sometimes it's a father of a family who wants a house near a railroad so that his children will grow so accustomed to the trains that they will have no desire to run out to shoot Indians or anything else.

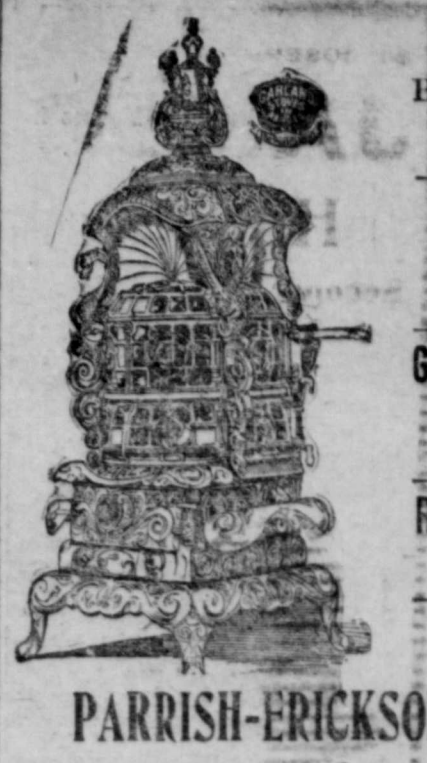
The Missouri Press association plans an excursion to the Portland exposition following its summer meeting at Kansas City.
