INDIANS LIKE CONVENTIONS

Tribes of Southwest Oklahoma Getting White Man's Habit of Frequent Meetings.

Guthrie, O. T .- It is stated that the recent visit to Quanah Parker by two of the noted chiefs of the territory portends that several of the tribes of southwest Oklahoma are to make preparations for another big pow-wow, such as was held at Cache last fall. The chiefs spent several days with Parker, though nothing is known of the conference that was held.

. The Daily Oklahoman says that ordinarily these pow-wows are decennial, but the Indian appears to have caught the convention habit of the white man and thinks he finds much enjoyment in the gatherings. The fact that they attract hundreds of people tempts the Indian to desire their frequency. Indians have also learned a good deal of ostentation from the white man, and at these meetings they have the best opportunity to make a display of their rich garbs, their arrow shooting, their horseback riding, and their war dances. The occasions have become extremely rare when they may carry out some of the maneuvirs that belong in character to the days of yore, but the Indians are clamoring for a frequency of such doings,

Quanah Parker's place is the most detirable spot in the territory for the convening of the Indians. It is easily accessible to Comanches, Kiowas, Apaches and Cheyennes. The very fact of meeting with the great chief of the Comanches adds to the anticipation of every Indian. Parker is the biggest man among all the tribes of the southwest in the estimation of the Indians. The white blood that flows in his veins gives him executive ability and makes him the master and dictator in all their councils.






