## **NEBRASKA MAN TALKS ALFALFA**

large and the demand was compara- basis. Buyers did not discriminate Declares It the Greatest Thing That Ever Happened the Western Farmer--Has 150 Acres in the Legume.

> "Say, those old buckeyes and hoosiers and suckers back east will be sending out to our Nebraska farms and buying alfalfa meal for hog medicine before many years. I was back in Illinois on a visit sometime ago and when I went to telling the folks about hay-feeding my hogs on alfalfa they all thought I was dopy. But there is no pipe dream about it, my hogs are given a feed of alfalfa hay and they go to it just the same as steers." This, in substance, is the language of Mr. Charles Gurney, of Red Cloud, Nebraska, who was a caller at The Journal office vesterday afternoon.

Mr. Gurney is a big feeder of cattle and hogs in Webster county where he has a large farm. A short talk with him was all that was needed to establish the fact that he is an alfalfa enthusiast, On his big farm he has 150 acres of this new leguminous plant that in the space of a few years has worked a complete metamorphosis over the entire length and breadth of the arid and semi-arid domain of Uncle Sam, from Manitoba, to the Gulf of Mexico.

"The development of alfalfa has already been the biggest thing that has ever happened to the western farmer." said he. "It will make cattle and hogs without any grain and in combination with corn there is nothing on earth that will beat it for results. I cut four crops of hay from my alfalfa fields last year and that alone would pay a big income from the land if sold in the hay, but I'm not raising hay for sale. The products of my farms go to market on the hoof. We have not gone into the alfalfa meal business vet, but results obtained from grinding corn and alfalfa together for a combination ration, clearly show that there is nothing chimerical about the proposition to put a falfa meal on the market as a ecmmercial product. It will certainly enlarge the demand and call for an increased acreage. In the form of a meal, that would reduce bulk and facilitate handling, we would not be able to meet the increased demand until every acre of alfalfa land in this country is utilized."





SLAYER IS ALEXANDER GADD. Senator Johnson, Procurer of the

Finnish Senate, Was Regarded as a Wise Official.

Helsingfors, Finland, Feb. 7.-Senator Johnsson, procurator of the Finnish senate and procurator general of Finland, was assassinated in his own residence at 11 o'clock yesterday morning. The murderer, who was disguised-as an officer of the army, sent in a card bearing the name of Alexan der Gadd and was at once admitted After entering the room he faced the procurator general, drew a revolver and fired four shots in quick succession. Each shot took effect and Johnsson fell and died almost immediately. Johnsson's son, hearing the firing, came to his father's assistance and the murderer fired at him, wounding him slightly. The assassin was at once arrested.

Johnsson was born in 1856 and practiced at the Finnish bar. He was highly esteemed and had held various government appointments, including that of provincial judge. Johnsson was regarded as a wise and patriotic official. It is understood that it was at his initiative that the Finns exiled by Gov. Gen. Perikoff were allowed to return to Finland.

## A FORTUNE FOR HIS LEGS.

Richard Dorr, a Former Missouri Pacific Brakeman, Awarded Damages of \$35,000 at Wichita.

Wichita, Kan., Feb. 7.-Richard Dorr was allowed judgment for \$35,000 Railroad company at the termination of the trial of his suit for \$50,000 damages. This verdiet is the largest amount ever allowed in Kansas for a personal injury claim against a railroad. While working for the company as a brakeman last March Dorr fell beneath his train at Freeport, Kan., and both of his legs were cut off. He alleged that the step on the engine was in bad order and caused his fall. The attorneys for the defense have filed a petition for a new trial.

Acquitted Man Charges Perjury. Bedford, Ind., Feb. 7 .-- Frank Evans, asquitted in court of a charge of complicity in the murder of Sarah C. Shaler after a hearing jointly with Elmer Browning, who was bound over to the grand jury, has filed affidavits for the arrest of George W. Riley, the newspaper man who was active in bringing about the arrest and prosecution of Evans and Browning. Riley is charged by Evans with perjury.



PARTY LINES DRAWN.

Only One Democrat and Two Republicans Deserted Their Colors on Railroad Rate Vote.

Washington, Feb. 7. - Following veeks of hearings and consideration by the committee on interstate and foreign commerce, as well as urgent recommendations of the president on the subject, the house of representatives yesterday began debating the proposed legislation looking to the regulation of railway freight rates. This action was taken only after determined opposition by democratic members led by John Sharp Williams, O of Mississippi, the minority leader, to the adoption of a rule which would shut out opportunity to amend the bill. Two republicans, Southwick and Vreeland, of New York, voted against the rule and one democrat, Gaines, of Tennessee, voted for it. Otherwise party lines were tightly drawn.

Baltimore, Md., Feb. 7 .- The Baltimore American yesterday occupied its new 16-story building from which it issued a 28-page paper to-day as a memorial of the great fire which occurred in Baltimore, February 7, 1904. The American is the first Baltimore newspaper to erect and move into a new building in the burned district.


