The live stock trade is still under the not been much attempt made in the country to get stock to shipping stations and the movement of railroad trains is still greatly hampered. Today's light supply reported came straggling in all through the day and made the market a tedious one. Local cattle receipts were cut to less than one-third a Tuesday average and outside supplies were also light. Market for steers opened irregularly higher and supplies were bought up as they were got in and shaped up ready for sale. But the market was not of such a character as to furnish a reliable criterion. Sales ranged strong to 15c higher than on closing days of last week, with a fairly good class of 1,200 lb. steers going around \$4.50@4.60; good fat heavier styles at \$4.75@5.00; with strictly choice heavy ishipping steers quotable at \$5.10@5.40. EXPORTER MUST PAY FREIGHT.

Phase of Export Cattle Trade That Is Not Generally Under stood By Producer and Seller.

In the lobby of the Live Stock exchange yesterday two opposing forces, one on the buying side, the other a se'ler, were discussing the export cattle trade. The seller assumed the position that the big volume of cattle recently tagged for export was prima facie evidence of a strong demand for American beef in the English markets. On the tage of the number of cattle tagged for export in Chicago last week and the week previous it would appear that there is a big and profitable English demand for American cattle. The fact of the matter is, British markets for our cattle are not as good as they were a month or six weeks ago and there is no doubt that the same misapprehension of the situation noted by the seller in yesterday's discussion is general with the whole producing and selling side of the cattle trade. The mere statement, in figures, of the volume of export business is taken as conclusive of market condition and demands across the ocean -and this is not an unnatural conclusion. But, the producing and selling end of the live stock trade should take cognizance of the fact that exporters of cattle have had to get into the swim of the commercial times and go to dealing in futures. For the last two or three years the steamship space of every cattle and sheep carrying boat that sails the Atlantic ocean between American and British ports has been contracted six months ahead, and when the sailing date for any cattle carrying boat arrives the exporter is obliged to pay for the cattle space on that boat whether he loads a hoof or not. The result is that it is not altogether the imm diate demand for beef in the English markets that fills the boat sailing this week. The exporter must load the boat whether the market is to his liking or not. At least he has obligated himself to pay for the boat's space and rather than let h s.il away in ballast he ships a cargo of cattle and takes his chance on the London and Liverpool markets of two weeks hence.

Yesterday's British cables quoted American cattle at 12c per pount, dead weight, in London and 11e in Liverpool. These prices are right at 1 1-2 to 25 lower than que tions on the same markets on December 19 last, just about two months ago and the exporter who contracted steamboat space on a basis of those December prices has nothing to do but donate to the steamboat owners, or load the boat, pay the freight and take his medicine on the other side -- unless he buys the cattle correspondingly lower here.

I then strain them through a cloth which is sufficiently thick to leave the juice free from the least particle of seed, or pulp, or skin. 1 put the juice back on the fire and add a little sugar. The quantity of sugar depends on the kind of grapes used. If the grapes are very sweet, perhaps no sugar at all will be required. I let the juice boil a few minutes. The sugar will cause a scum to form on the juice, which should be carefully skimmed off, and while the juice is yet hot pour it into bottley or fruit jars and seal. Made in this way it will keep all winter without spolling.
