enough to sell above \$3.60, with bulk years ago at \$6.90@7.10, three years ago Experimental Stations To Be Established in Irrigation Districts as Aid to Development.

> Experimental farms are to be established under government supervision in irrigation districts. A Washington dispatch says: Secretary Wilson has submitted a plan to congress and has requested an appropriation of \$15,000 to put it

It is proposed that the interior department put aside one farm unit for experimental uses on each reclamation project now under way, namely: Gunnison, Colo.; Pathfinder and Shoshone, Wyo.; Yuma, Ariz.; Minidako, Idaho, and Truckee, Nev. Work on the farms will be performed by employes of the department of agriculture, in connection with the state experimental stations, and the reclamation service will furnish a permanent water supply for irrigation.

State experimental stations will be expected to construct farm buildings and make other permanent improvements and supply necessary live stock. The department of agriculture will pay running expenses, furnish seeds, trees and plants. The products will be sold to create a fund for payment of the cost of buildings, livestock and other expenditures.

If necessary to discontinue the work the state experimental stations will have the option of taking over all rights of the department of agriculture, and if not wishing to do this the property shall revert to the reclamation service and be sold for the benefit of the irrigation fund.

It is proposed by the secretary of agriculture that the experimental farms shall be conducted with a view to assisting settlers under various irrigation projects be conducted with a view to assisting plants and trees so as to determine the best varieties for use in the respective localities. These farms will be object lessons to prospective settlers and it is the intention to make them self-supporting.






