

May 20 — Camp Wood is established on the east ank of Texas' Nueces River and used for about four years (1857).


### LOCAL WEATHER

### Duo at state track meet leads off MHS award week

With school about over, Muleshoe students continue to excel. For Muleshoe High School students Stacy Locker and Kyle Atwood, the past few days have been about as good as it gets.

On Saturday, the pair were in Austin to run in the state Class AAA track meet. Both placed — Atwood second in both the 800-meter and 1,600meter runs and Locker fifth in the 800 meters.

They came home and both joined about 180 other Muleshoe students Monday night in receiving academic awards in the high school auditorium.

In Austin, Atwood—a sophomore—finished less than a second off the winning pace in the boys' 800 meters. His time was 1:55.14 compared to a first-place 1:54.24 posted by Manuel Esparza of Crane.

His 4:27.65 in the 1,600 meters came in behind Tyler Stanfield of Crockett at 4:25.24.

Locker's time in the girls' 800 meters was 2:22.74 as compared to a winning 2:17.60 by Denisha Goldsmith of New Boston.

Monday's awards program was capped by the introduction of the valedictorian and salutatorian of the Class of 2000 - Leonard Joyner and Kamal Bhakta, respectively.

Other honor graduates (those with at least a 3.8 grade-point average over the past four years on the Advanced with Honors Graduation Plan) are James Barrett, Bobbie Benham, Rosario Flores, Blake Gartin, Chris Gatewood, Lela Hancock, Ryan Hodge, April Kelley, Rhett Kerby, Stacy Locker, Mitch Mason, Eric Posadas, Tyson Purdy, Leisha Wallace and Brandy Whitt.

A similar list gained the President's Award for Educational Excellence, presented by former school board President Cindy Purdy, for maintaining at least a 3.5 grade-point average and scoring at the 85th percentile on a college entrance exam. Those recipients were Randy Bohler, Amber Futch, Joyner, Bhakta, Barrett, Gartin, Gatewood, Hancock, Kerby, Locker, Mason, Posadas and Purdy.


