The number of hogs in sight today was not large enough to create any particular change in values, and the quality of the local supply was much inferior to yesterday, there being a scarcity of good to choice and heavy mixed which predominated in the supply of yesterday. Buyers were inclined to take a very bearish view, however, at the opening which resulted in very little being done throughout the greater portion of the forenoon as sellers were steadfastly holding for a little higher figure than yesterday. South St. Joseph Built Up This Big Sheep Market By

South St. Joseph as a sheep market came in for a touch of attention from the hot corner bunch last night. "Of course, this market don't handle as many sheep as Chicago," said the sheep man, "but it is the best sheep market in this country today. There is no smart financiering displayed in the market here .- no buying one man's sheep at a high price, then getting over into the next pen and buying exactly the same kind of stock 15(235c lower. Sheep and lambs that are unloaded here are bought strictly on their merits and a man is not abused if he is dissatisfied with bids made for his offerings here and decides to ship them on. There is nothing smart about 'setting a seller up' and live stock markets are not built by that kind of tactics. Furthermore, if a bunch of sheep is worth be per pound at 9 c'clock in the morning the same bunch is worth just as much, or a litt'e more, to the packer at 3 o'clock in the afternoon. This thing of 'setting men up' is simply koocking against the market and the buyer who does it is making an enemy to the market every time he makes a bid for stock and then refuses to take



Colorado Republicans Hopelessly Split Over the Gubernatorial Contest-Peabodyites to Force a Vote.

Denver, Col., March 10 .- The republican majority in the general assembly seems to be hopelessly split over the proposition to make James H. Peabody's contest for the office of governor in place of Gov. Alva Adams. The legislature consists of 97 members, 66 republicans and 31 democrats, the republicans having a majority of 35 on joint ballot. Twenty-two republicans, it is commonly reported have decided in conference that Peabody has failed to prove his election but many of them would not agree to vote to sustain the democratic governor. These republicans, it is said, have united in support of the report of Senator Morton Alexander, a member of the joint contest committee, which declared that the election for governor was null and vold, there being fraud on both sides,

should succeed to the governorship. The Peabodyites declare that this method of settling the contest is unconstitutional and impracticable. Lieut. Gov. J. A. McDonald has publicly announced to the members of the general assembly that he has been legally advised that it would be a wrongful and illegal act to seat him as governor as a compromise or makeshift in deciding the contest. Before the joint convention met this morning the Peabody leaders announced their purpose, to force the issue to a final vote. Should the Alexander report be voted on first and defeated the anti-Peabody republicans will endeavor to defeat the other three reports from the contest commit tee. If this plan should succeed a deadlock would be created and Alva Adams would remain as governor.

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
