Kansas Farmer Says Size of Country is Lost Sight of in Making Estimates of Hog Supply.

A party of stockmen called at The Journal office yesterday afternoon for a short visit and to see how the machine down stairs can print and fold papers faster than the average man can count. Among the party was J. G. Howard, who is a farmer on a large scale at Hiawatha, Kansas. He talked hogs, cattle, general farming and railroading for an hour. It was soon found that he looks for a see-saw hog market with a high June finish, his argument being that hogs that have been running behind cattle will be moved freely within the next few wacks and there will be enough of them to force prices off considerably. "In a general way," said he, "I do not think there is a big crop of mature hoge in the country aside from those that have been following cattle and I think the market will get light supplies after the cattle hogs have been moved. However, there is one thing that we farmers are short on, and that is propensity to extend our vision and draw conclusions as to supply of any commedity from beyond our own school district. We kek around over the district, do not find many hogs, and at once conclude that hogs are all gone. We forget, absolutely, that this is a great big country and that it does not require more than a few hogs to each farm to make a big total supply when they are concentrated at the markets.

"Here is an instance in point," said Mr. Howard. "In my own neighborhoot I have been looking around, have not noted many mature hogs, naturally am a bull on the market and readily conclude that there is but a small supply of hogs available. Never stop to consider that in my own feed lots there are enough hogs to make a pretty good neighborhood supply if distributed around in small bunches. I guess that is the way most of the farmers figure, and that is the reason they get fooled so often. But, just the same, I am looking for a see-saw hog market with a pyrotechnic display along in June."

Bowen's Instructious Washington, March 22.-In calling upon President Castro for an answer to his proposition to submit to arbitration the issues between the United Sates and Venezuela Minister Bowen is acting in accordance with specific instructions from the state department which have recently been placed\_in his hands. Mr. Bowen made a proposition of this kind to the Venezuelan for. eign office several months ago and there was an exchange of notes on the was cut off by the abrupt departures from the capital of President Castro, at a moment when his own decision was required. The Venezuelan government at that stage had made a counter propettion to Mr. Bowen looking to the arbitration of the dispute by the Hague tribunal, but with the important qualification that the tribunal should arbitrate as a preliminary the question as to whether or not the right under the international law to intervene at all as under the Venezuean government and American concessionaires for their protection. This

was construed here as an attempt to bring into play the old Calvo doctrine, which the United States has resolutely and repeatedly refused to accept in its negotiations with the southern re publics. So Mr. Bowen reported to the state department the fact of President Castro's departure and asked for in structions. These were prepared with great care and after Attorney General Moody had, upon call from the president, as the highest legal authority in the executive branch of the government, furnished an opinion to the effect that the proceedings in the Venczuelan cours involving the asphalt company's properties were so irregular as to amount practically to a denial of justice. Therefore, Mr. Bowen was told to renew his proposition for a free arbitration of the issues between Venezuela and the United States at the first opportune moment and this it appears he has now done. Beside the New York and Bermudez Asphalt case there are three other matters which are suggested as proper subjects for arbitration, namely, the Critchfield claim (also based on an asphalt conession); the claim of the Orinoco Steam Navigation company, based on a violated franchise and the claim of

expulsion from Venezuela. If President Castro rejects this last offer of Minister Bowen to arbitrate these cases it is expected that he will promptly report that fact to the state department and it will be determined what course to pursue. The minister's presentment of this matter, therefore, is not an actual ultimatum for the way is still open for further negotiations if the department decides that the time has not yet arrved to withdraw its minister and adopt some coercive measures.


