### CATTLE.

Trade Quiet This Morning Withou Quotable Change in Prices.

Trade was quiet in the cattle yards number to attract healthy competition and the few trades in steers were at unsatisfactory prices. But, while the few small lots of steers did not attract competition and sold at mean looking prices compared with earlier in the week, the days' trade did not afford any criterion as to general market conditions. For the week the supplies have been moderate but have shown quite liberal proportion of well fattened steers with a few loads of fully finished beeves of good to choice quality. The market showed an easier turn during latter half of the week and, aside from the strictly choice kinds, prices are around a dime lower than during first half of the week. The market for the week is closing quiet on a basis of around \$5.25@5.75 for good to choice, medium to heavy steers with fair to good kinds of same weight at \$4.60@ 5.25; good fat light killing steers, around and under 1,100 pounds, sell at \$4.40/24.85, common killers \$4.00/24.80.


