A reduction in supplies of hogs at most generally considered 10@15c higher points today caused a better tone to prevail in the hog market and trading was more lively at prices generally strong to 5c higher than yesterday, most grades showing the advance. RIVALS DAVID RANKIN.

Irwin D. Smith, of South Dakota, Earns Over Million Dollars By Farming In Northwest.

Madison, S. D., March 29 .- This little town boasts the richest exclusive farmer in the United States and perhaps the wealthiest person in South Dakota, Irwin D. Smith. He has answered the question of whether a man may become a millionaire honestly. In the last fourteen years he has added nearly a million and a half dollars to his fortune, and every dollar has come from the soil.

Some have lately claimed that Harris Franklin, of Deadwood, who made his fortune out of the cattle business, has more money. But even this would leave Mr. Smith the second in South Dakota.

To this man and to his wife the philosophy of life is simple. To them the possession of a million delears brings no question of travel in a patted land; no lavish expenditures for uncomfortable toggery; no risking of limbs in automobile racers; not even the burden of maintaining a place in society. Their only diversion is giving \$8,000 farms to worthy tenants.

Not a day passes that Mr. Smith is not asked by some one, "How did you make your money?"

"I made it by making it, not spending it," is the substance of Mr. Smith's answer to this question.

And it is true. When he began life, it was with a few hundred dollars. With this sum he made a payment on an Illinois farm and then earned the money from the farm to pay off the debt. Then he bought another farm some years after, and earned the money with two to pay off the second debt. Ever declaring that his profit consisted of the difference between the money received and the money he paid out, Mr. Smith proved himself a homely master in this true economy, not alone by keeping his expenses down, but with equal intelligence keeping his receipts at a large figure.

"How did I do it?" Mr. Smith repeats. "I earned my money by working, and then when I made it I put it where it wouldn't be spend foolishly." And this is the "system" by which Mr. Smith made himself the wealthiest of farmers.

From his appearance and his unpretentions manners, Mr. Smith is the last person who would be taken for a millionaire, and, though much talked about on account of his business success, it creates no impression upon him. He lives just outside the city, in a commodious farm house and has an office in the city, equally unpretentious, which he visits every day the weather permits.

Mr. Smith was born in Litchfield, N. Y., in 1826, and, after receiving his education, caught the gold fever in 1850, left New York with a party, crossed the Panama isthmus on foot, and then went on to California, where he prospected without success. Then he returned to his New York home, received his inheritance, married his first wife, Jane Champion, and left for Illinois with \$2,000. This he invested judiciously and reinvested and later went to Iowa and did the same thing.

In 1891 Mr. Smith came to Lake county with his family. He rented a house and began buying land. As fast as he made money he bought more land. This prairie country was not yet fully tamed by the plow and the secret of its crop wealth had not been unearthed. Mr. Smith guessed it, and, guessing right, found his land rapidly increasing in value. Making every farm produce the utmost, he has now come to be worth \$1,600,000, for besides stock in bank and other real estate, he has ninety-four magnificent farms in central South Dakota and 3,000 acres in Iowa. "A third of my money I earned with my hands; the remaining twothirds with my head," is Mr. Smith's summary.
