CATTLE.

Trade for the Week Very Active and Highest of the Season.

The trade in beef cattle this week has been the most active and nighest for the eason. Receipts were not large on any day, but the quality, as a rule, was very desirable and with an exceptionally keen packing demand which was supplemented by a strong inquiry on eastern shipping account, sellers had no difficulty in making clearances at a substantial advance each day, resulting in the market closing the week 15 25c higher than the close of the previous week. Heavy, well finished steers of export and shipping qualities sold from \$5.50 to \$5.85. while the good 1,100 to 1,300 pound export kinds and plain 1,300 to 1,450 pound teers have sold from \$5.00(a5.40. Although the buying end were not quoting any appreciable advance on the light weight short-fed steers and those of the "dogy" order, sellers generally considered that they were selling to just as good advantage as the better grades and quoted fully as high a gain in prices in some instances with exceptional cases full 35c higher.

In a general way the few sales today indicated that the week closed at the extreme high point and the concensus of opinion among traders was for a continuation next week of the present healthy condition of the trade and they Hunter & H. Clarksdale 1 are urging their customers to make their consignments earlier in the week to obtain the best results.

As compared with other markets prices here are relatively the highest in the country on all grades, and this should cause a considerable enlargement of supplies next week.

cause of the nominal supplies. Trade Nebraska Expects Higher Prices Next Few Years For Finished Beeves.

> Lincoln, Neb., March 31 .- The Star says: "Many careful observers expect higher prices for cattle, The prices have been ruling low for some time in comparison with the average for several years preceding. All the markets show response in the quotations for stockers to the prospect of an early spring. With a good showing for early grass this kind of cattle will almost certainly bring fair prices for all who have them to sell, while the general outlook seems to warrant better prices in the fall for 'eeders. This, of course, implies better expectations for those wlo fat an the animals. It is not unlikely that the next two or three years vil be generally a period of higher remuneration for those who finich cartle for market

> "It is by ro means true, notwithstanding the lower prices, that cattle have been fed at a loss the last year. Thousands of farmers have made some profits-that is to say, a net profit, on feeding, over and above a good price for the corn that was fed. It has been a market in which the rooking feeder, the plunger, took grave chances and in many cases cuffered 1534. The price of corn has been abnormal. But the cautious I rmer, the skillful feeder, the conservative observer, has in many cases succeeded in doing fairly well by feeding his corn, in spite of the precarious condition of the market. So far as the average Nebraskan or western farmer is concerned, the cattle market has been by no means fatal or even dangerous to his prosperity. For he had his corn anyhow, and he has marketed it at a good profit as grain if not in the form of meat on the hoof. Thousands have preferred that sure profit to the chances of the cattle market.

> "The cycles from a low to a high market ordinarily extend over a longer period for cattle than for hogs or sheep, the former being of slower growth than the latter. But the forces which operate to correct extremes in cattle as well as in all other commodities are external. Just when the turn in the general cattle market will come strongly cannot of course be foretold with certainty, but many of the most competent judges believe it will be very soon, and that it is beginning even now.'

******************************* MORE CATTLE ARE WANTED

The fact that supplies of all kinds of cattle this week were totally insufficient to meet the demands of the trade resulted in the most active trading and the highest prices of the season on practically all desirable offerings. Considering the quality of the offerings prices here were relatively the highest in the country and should have attracted more and better cattle than arrived. Beef steers generally showed a 15@25c advance and desirable cows and heifers advanced 10@15c and the week closed at practically the high point, and everything indicates a healthy tone to the trade next week.

In view of these facts shippers should see that their stock is billed to South St. Joseph and that they arrive as early in the week as possible to get the best re-


