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The Forest Congress.

"Never before in this country, nor, so far as I know, in any other country, has a body of men representing such great and varied interests come together to discuss, temperately and foresightedly, the policy and the methods under which the highest permanent usefulness of the forest can be maintained." So said Secretary Wilson in welcoming the delegates to the American forest congress, which gathered recently in Washington. Secretary Wilson's statement emphasized the scope and importance of the congress; it also summarized the purposes of the gathering. Where there are conflicting interests in the country, there would be no forestry problem; but, naturally, the lumberman's aim is to harvest all the timber he can in the shortest time; that of the mineowner is to cut the props for the roof of his mine in the nearest place; of the sheep-raiser to put the largest possible flock on the range; the railroad must have ties; and over against all of these interests are the farmers and manufacturers, who cannot live unless the sources of the water supply are protected. The really significant thing about the congress, then, says Youth's Companion, was its effort to bring all these conflicting interests together, and decide upon plans which will eventually be for the interest of all. What helps one helps every other. The delegates included senators and representatives, editors of lumber and other trade journals, members of the geological survey, the National Irrigation association, lumbermen, stock-raisers, turpentine farmers, railroad officers, pulp manufacturers, professional foresters, boards of trade, and many others, both friends of the forest and reputed enemies of it. The main object of the friends of the forest may be said to be to demonstrate the fact that greater returns can be secured by conservative handling than by promiscuous cutting. The old idea of the forest was that it was a legacy—a windfall, to be enjoyed in the spending. The new idea is that it is invested capital, the interest of which, if we handle it aright, will support ourselves and our children, without the necessity of touching the principal.

The Righteous Flee.

Pigs, goats and bees are the subjects of proposed legislation by the general assembly of North Carolina. In Pitt county, states a southern contemporary, churches appear to have been erected on a plan that puts the floors several feet above the ground, with openings between the pillars. Hogs and goats have sought the convenient shelter of this space until the soil on which the churches stand has become one part sand and two parts feces. In consequence religious services have been broken up and congregations dismissed from worship at very inopportune times with alarming frequency. The nuisance has become so great that the members of the general assembly from Pitt county have introduced bills to require the owners of hogs and goats running at large to fence in the churches, so as to keep these animals from roosting under them.

Many of the congressional families find it hard to enter into the social life because of the lack of what is considered a proper place to receive calls. A group of ladies from one western state have surmounted this obstacle very cleverly for the last several winters by combining and engaging the parlors of a large apartment hotel in which several of them reside. The arrangement proved a most pleasant and desirable one.

SAVES THE PUPPI'S TEETH.

Germany Has Dental Clinics for Schools in Every One of the Larger Cities.

The dental statistics gathered in many European cities have revealed such an alarming condition of affairs that Germany, at least, has decided to adopt combative measures. In all large towns dental clinics have been founded, consisting, as a rule, of specially fitted-up rooms in one of the central schools. Fully qualified dentists are appointed, who devote their whole time to their duties, but in Stuttgart the work is done voluntarily by the local dentists. That such a movement is necessary can scarcely be doubted when one learns that of many thousands of boys and girls examined from the ages of eight to 13 only two per cent. had a perfectly healthy set of teeth. To give an idea of the amount of work done in a year at Darmstadt schools it is necessary to quote the figures of 1903. During the year 1,576 children were examined and 1,561 teeth were filled, while 1,871 were extracted. In Strassburg 2,666 children were examined, 699 teeth were filled and 2,912 were extracted. Another interesting fact is that 49 per cent. of all teeth examined were bad. The method of work is simple; the teacher takes his class to the dentist, who examines each mouth quickly and marks on the card which each child has brought with it whether treatment is necessary. If so the child must come again on a Saturday. Russia is also joining in the movement, and has already fitted up nine such institutions in St. Petersburg alone, while Moscow has also several.

BRIDGE HAS LONGEST SPAN

Structure Going Up at Quebec to Have Central Reach of 1,500 Feet—Greatest on Record.

There is now under construction across the St. Lawrence at Quebec a cantilever bridge which when completed will contain the longest span of any bridge yet erected, not even excluding the great cantilevers of the Forth bridge in Scotland. The structure is of the cantilever type, and consists of two approach spans of 210 feet each, two shore arms, each 500 feet in length, and a great central span, 1,500 feet in length. The total length of the bridge is 4,220 feet, and although in extreme dimensions it does not compare with the Forth of Forth bridge, which is about one mile in total length, it has the distinction of having the longest span in the world by 90 feet, the two cantilevers of the Forth bridge being each 1,710 feet in length. The total width of the Forth is 39 feet, and provision is made for a double-tracked railway, two roadways for vehicles and two sidewalks. In a cantilever of this magnitude the individual members are necessarily of huge proportions, the main posts, for instance, being 325 feet in length, and each weighing 750 tons.

BRING DEER FROM SIBERIA.

New Industry of Importing Animals Into Alaska Has in Late Years Greatly Developed.

That scheme for importing reindeer into Alaska from Siberia, which met with criticism and even with ridicule when first suggested a few years ago by Sheldon Jackson, is now proving the salvation of the Alaskan Eskimos, says Outing. While the original thought was only to repair the rapidly lessening food supply of the natives, yet it has developed into a veritable reindeer industry. So successfully has the plan worked, in fact, that not only do it furnish the natives with food, clothing and means of transportation, holds out the prospect of putting Alaska in a few years in the position of supplying deer meat to an outside market. Reindeer does are prolific, and an excellent cheese is made of their milk. As carriers they have already supplanted dogs for the United States mail, and may be ridden, or will carry easily a pack of 150 pounds, in fact, the reindeer industry is already a very important one, with widening significance.

ENTERTAIN THE ENGLISH.

This American Family Could Think of Nothing Save the "Tub" Which Proves Undoing.

The two pretty American girls had met two delightful Englishmen on the way across, says a writer in Lippincott, and had given a cordial month, warmly welcomed by their mother, to Sir Charles and his friend to visit them at their country home. One day a message came saying the two men would arrive that afternoon. The family was thrown into a fever of excitement, and many plans of entertainment for their guests were suggested and abandoned. It was finally decided that as Englishmen are notoriously fond of a "tub," and their guests were coming directly from the train they should first be invited to take a bath. After that the hostess would rely on the inspiration of the moment. The young men arrived promptly, and after some demurring were hurried off to the bathroom. In about an hour they emerged and went immediately to their hostess, saying, "We are sorry to leave so soon, but we only came to make a call, and our train leaves in 15 minutes."

INSTRUCTS DAWSON.
Secretary Taft Sends Message Stat-
ing Terms Under Which Collec-
tors Will go to Santo Domingo.
Washington, April 4.—Secretary
Taft of the War department and Acting
Secretary Loomis of the State depart-
ment, had a consultation yesterday
and decided to send a cable message
to Minister Dawson giving the terms
on which the men nominated by the
United States to collect the revenues of
the Dominican government would go
to Santo Domingo with the request
that Mr. Dawson ascertain if these
terms would be satisfactory to the
Dominican government. The terms are
that all expenses of the men designated
going and returning from Santo
Domingo and while in the island shall
be paid by the Dominican government,
that Mr. Colton, the chief of the col-
lectors shall receive a salary of \$500
a month and the other collectors sal-
aries to be agreed on by Mr. Colton and
Mr. Morales.
In addition to C. R. Colton and J. H.
Edwards heretofore announced as col-
lectors the following names were give-
n out at the War department yester-
day as proposed employees in the Do-
minican customs service: Warren
Smith, Washington, D. C., formerly
treasurer of a province in the Philip-
pines; H. F. Worley of the insular
bureau and for five years connected
with the Cuban customs service; B. F.
Morris, a soldier and newspaper man
in the Philippines and custom house
department, United States treasury;
Richard J. Leopold of Maryland, fi-
nancial expert; E. M. Drew Carroll,
statistician of the insular bureau; H. F.
Smith of the Philippine service.

CLAIMS HARDSHIPS.
Charles H. Moyer Brings Action
Against Colorado Officials—Wants
\$500,000 Damages.
Denver, Col., April 4.—John H. Mur-
phy as attorney for Charles H. Moyer,
president of the Western Federation of
Miners, filed a complaint to day in the
United States circuit court against
James H. Peabody, former governor
of Colorado, Sherman M. Bell former
adjutant general and Captain Bulkeley
Wells now adjutant general who was
military commander in Telluride when
that city was under martial law.
The complaint states that the plain-
tiff was subjected to hardships humiliations
and disgrace by the defendants
without probable cause and also with-
out legal process. He was also de-
prived of the complaint adds of having a
public and speedy trial by an impar-
tial jury in the district in which the
offense is alleged to have been com-
mitted.
The confinement it is alleged, greatly
impaired the plaintiff's health by
the reason of the extreme dampness
and unwholesomeness of the jail.

Found Buried Coins.
Mount Pleasant, Tex., April 5.—T. A.
Ledbetter has dug up a pot contain-
ing nearly \$2,000 in gold coin, twenty
miles north of here. The coin is all
United States money except one or two
pieces which are either Spanish or
Mexican. Years ago an old Indian
said that some kind of treasure had
been buried near the spot and search
was made for it at that time, but with-
out success.

Mr. Chadwick Asks Stay.
Cincinnati, April 5.—Judge Francis
J. Wing, counsel for Mrs. Cassie L.
Chadwick of Cleveland, appeared be-
fore Judges Lurton, Severens and
Richards in the United States circuit
court of appeals in this city yesterday
and moved that her sentence be stayed
until the United States circuit court of
appeals shall have heard her appeal,
or until final judgment be rendered in
the court of last resort. The court
promised to render an opinion this
morning.

To Remove Pike's Body.
Colorado Springs, Colo., April 5.—A
movement has been started here
through the local chamber of com-
merce to have the remains of Lieut.
Zebulon Montgomery Pike, the discov-
erer of Pike's Peak, removed to Colo-
rado and either reinterred in this city
or on the summit of the great eminence
which bears his name. The body of
Lieut. Pike is buried at Lawrenceburg,
Ind., where it lies in a practically neg-
lected grave.

To Separate Church and State.
Paris, April 5.—During the discus-
sion in the chamber of deputies on the
bill for the separation of church and
state, M. Marin, minister of public
worship, stated that the opposition's
demand for an amicable arrangement
between church and state was impos-
sible of realization, the church not desir-
ing separation, whilst the country
thought it indispensable.

Bank Cashier Suicides.
Wellington, Kan., April 5.—Glen
Lombourough aged 27, cashier of the
First National Bank of Mt. Sterling
Ohio committed suicide here yester-
day by shooting himself through the
head. The body was found in a shallow
slough. Despondency over ill
health is supposed to have caused the
act.

New Cable Opened.
Paris, April 5.—The inauguration of
the government cable between Brazil
and Dakar, Senegal, is important owing
to the Venezuelan troubles. From
Dakar the line connects with Pernam-
buco, bringing South America into
communication with France.

A Prince Arrested.
Rome, April 5.—While Prince and
Princess Brocchi were riding in a motor
car at the speed of 45 miles an hour
their car ran over and killed a woman.
The prince was arrested.

Are Still Ex-Senators.
San Francisco, April 4.—The state
supreme court yesterday denied an
application for a writ of mandamus to
compel the restoration to office of State
Senators Bunkers, French Wright and
Emmons who were recently expelled
from the state senate for accepting
bribes to influence their votes in re-
gard to legislation affecting building
and loan associations.

Connect Russia and America.
St. Petersburg, April 5.—Baron
Lofek DeLobel, representing the French
group which is engineering the pro-
ject of connecting the railroad systems
of Russia and America by means of
a railroad and tunnel under Bering
strait, has presented the matter to
Minister of railroads Hilkooff and Min-
ister of Finance Kokovoff. Although
the proposition is regarded as being
a good deal in the nature of a "jules
Verne" dream, the ministers agreed
to consider it and a commission of
both ministries has been formed to
examine the plans and report on them.

Good Roads Special.
Chicago, April 5.—Arrangements
have been completed between the Na-
tional Good Roads Association and the
officials of the Burlington and North-
ern Pacific roads for the Good Roads
special over these systems, which is to
leave Chicago Wednesday, May 3. It
is to be known as the Burlington and
Northern Pacific-Lewis and Clark Good
Roads Special, and will cover an itin-
erary of 45 to 50 of the principal cities
of the systems, from Chicago to the Pa-
cific coast.

Paroled Officer Returns.
Valejo, Cal., April 5.—Sub. Lieut. An-
drea Kara Drjanin, the third of the Rus-
sian officers who broke their parole
and returned to Russia, has reached
Marine Island. He reported to Rear Ad-
miral Bowman H. McColla. He was
accompanied to the commandant's of-
fice by his commanding officer, Captain
A. Berlinsky. In his interview with
the admiral, which was brief, he re-
newed his personal parole. This was
the course pursued with the other two
officers.

Will Be Heard at May Term.
Topeka, Kan., April 5.—Chief Justice
Johnston of the supreme court has
issued an alternative writ of manda-
mus requiring T. T. Kelly, state treas-
urer, and E. B. Jewett, warden of the
penitentiary, to appear in court April
17 and show cause why they should not
issue bonds provided for in the state
oil refinery law. Justice Johnston says
that the case will be set for hearing
on the first day of the May term. A
decision of the validity of the law will
be rendered at that session of the
court.

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Paris, April 5.—During the discus-
sion in the chamber of deputies on the
bill for the separation of church and
state, M. Marin, minister of public
worship, stated that the opposition's
demand for an amicable arrangement
between church and state was impos-
sible of realization, the church not desir-
ing separation, whilst the country
thought it indispensable.

Bank Cashier Suicides.
Wellington, Kan., April 5.—Glen
Lombourough aged 27, cashier of the
First National Bank of Mt. Sterling
Ohio committed suicide here yester-
day by shooting himself through the
head. The body was found in a shallow
slough. Despondency over ill
health is supposed to have caused the
act.

New Cable Opened.
Paris, April 5.—The inauguration of
the government cable between Brazil
and Dakar, Senegal, is important owing
to the Venezuelan troubles. From
Dakar the line connects with Pernam-
buco, bringing South America into
communication with France.

A Prince Arrested.
Rome, April 5.—While Prince and
Princess Brocchi were riding in a motor
car at the speed of 45 miles an hour
their car ran over and killed a woman.
The prince was arrested.

Are Still Ex-Senators.
San Francisco, April 4.—The state
supreme court yesterday denied an
application for a writ of mandamus to
compel the restoration to office of State
Senators Bunkers, French Wright and
Emmons who were recently expelled
from the state senate for accepting
bribes to influence their votes in re-
gard to legislation affecting building
and loan associations.

Germany Has Dental Clinics for Schools in Every One of the Larger Cities.

The dental statistics gathered in many European cities have revealed such an alarming condition of affairs that Germany, at least, has decided to adopt combative measures. In all large towns dental clinics have been founded, consisting, as a rule, of specially fitted-up rooms in one of the central schools. Fully qualified dentists are appointed, who devote their whole time to their duties, but in Stuttgart the work is done voluntarily by the local dentists. That such a movement is necessary can scarcely be doubted when one learns that of many thousands of boys and girls examined from the ages of eight to 13 only two per cent. had a perfectly healthy set of teeth.

BRIDGE HAS LONGEST SPAN

Structure Going Up at Quebec to Have Central Reach of 1,800 Feet—Greatest on Record.

There is now under construction across the St. Lawrence at Quebec a cantilever bridge which when completed will contain the longest span of any bridge yet erected, not even excluding the great cantilevers of the Forth bridge in Scotland. The structure is of the cantilever type, and consists of two approach spans of 210 feet each, two shore arms, each 500 feet in length, and a great central span, 1,800 feet in length. The total length of the bridge is 4,220 feet, and although in extreme dimensions it does not compare with the Forth of Forth bridge, which is about one mile in total length, it has the distinction of having the longest span in the world by 90 feet, the two cantilevers of the Forth bridge being each 1,710 feet in length. The total width of the floor is 89 feet, and provision is made for a double-tracked railway, two roadways for vehicles and two sidewalks. In a cantilever of this magnitude the individual members are necessarily of huge proportions, the main posts, for instance, being 325 feet in length, and each weighing 750 tons.

BRING DEER FROM SIBERIA.

New Industry of Importing Animals Into Alaska Has in Late Years Greatly Developed.

That scheme for importing reindeer into Alaska from Siberia, which met with criticism and even with ridicule when first suggested a few years ago by Sheldon Jackson, is now proving the salvation of the Alaskan Eskimos says Outing. While the original thought was only to repair the rapidly lessening food supply of the natives, yet it has developed into a veritable reindeer industry. So successfully has the plan worked, in fact, that not only does it furnish the natives with food, clothing and means of transportation, holds out the prospect of putting Alaska in a few years in the position of supplying deer meat to an outside market. Reindeer does are profitable, and an excellent cheese is made of their milk. As carriers they have already supplanted dogs for the United States mail, and may be ridden, or will carry easily a pack of 150 pounds. In fact, the reindeer industry is already a very important one, with widening significance.

ENTERTAIN THE ENGLISH.

This American Family Could Think of Nothing Save the "Tub" Which Proves Undoing.

The two pretty American girls had met two delightful Englishmen on the way across, says a writer in Lippincott's, and had given a cordial invitation, warmly seconded by their mother, to Sir Charles and his friend to visit them at their country home. One day a message came saying the two men would arrive that afternoon. The family was thrown into a fever of excitement, and many plans of entertainment for their guests were suggested and abandoned. It was finally decided that as Englishmen are notoriously fond of a "tub," and their guests were coming directly from the train they should first be invited to take a bath. After that the hostess would rely on the inspiration of the moment. The young men arrived promptly, and after some demurring were hurried off to the bathroom. In about an hour they emerged and went immediately to their hostess, saying, "We are sorry to leave so soon, but we only came to make a call, and our train leaves in 15 minutes."

INSTRUCTS DAWSON.

Secretary Taft Sends Message Stating Terms Under Which Collectors Will Go to Santo Domingo.

Washington, April 4.—Secretary Taft of the War department and Acting Secretary Loomis of the State department, had a consultation yesterday and decided to send a cable message to Minister Dawson giving the terms on which the men nominated by the United States to collect the revenues of the Dominican government would go to Santo Domingo with the request that Mr. Dawson ascertain if these terms would be satisfactory to the Dominican government. The terms are that all expenses of the men designated going and returning from Santo Domingo and while in the island shall be paid by the Dominican government, that Mr. Colton, the chief of the collectors shall receive a salary of \$500 a month and the other collectors salaries to be agreed on by Mr. Colton and Mr. Morales.

In addition to C. R. Colton and J. H. Edwards heretofore announced as collectors the following names were given out at the War department yesterday as proposed services: Warren Smith, Washington D. C., formerly treasurer of a province in the Philippines; H. P. Worley of the Insular bureau and for five years connected with the Cuban customs service; B. F. Morris, a soldier and newspaper man in the Philippines and custom house department, United States treasury; Richard J. Leupold of Maryland, financial expert; E. M. Drew Carroll, statistician of the Insular bureau; H. P. Smith of the Philippine service.

CLAIMS HARSHIPS.

Charles H. Meyer Brings Action Against Colorado Officials—Wants \$300,000 Damages.

Denver, Col., April 4.—John H. Murphy as attorney for Charles H. Meyer, president of the Western Federation of Miners, filed a complaint to day in the United States circuit court against James H. Peabody, former governor of Colorado, Sherman M. Bell former adjutant general and Captain Bulkeley Wells now adjutant general who was military commander in Telluride when that city was under martial law.

The complaint states that the plaintiff was subjected to hardships, humiliations and disgrace by the defendants without probable cause and also without legal process. He was also deprived the complaint adds of having a public and speedy trial by an impartial jury in the district in which the offense is alleged to have been committed.

The confinement it is alleged, greatly impaired the plaintiff's health by the reason of the extreme dampness and unwholesomeness of the jail. The complaint asserts that the defendants were guilty of malice and that they should be imprisoned according to law.

Meyer was held as a military prisoner. Damages in the sum of \$300,000 are demanded from each of the defendants.

To Investigate Pike's Equitable.

New York, April 4.—The most important development in the Equitable Life Assurance Society's affairs yesterday was announcement by Governor Higgins at Albany and by President James W. Alexander of the society in this city, that the state superintendent of insurance, Francis Hendricks, had begun an investigation of the company's affairs.

This was followed by the introduction in the state senate of a resolution providing for a legislative investigation of the Equitable. The resolution was presented by Senator Brackett.

Emperor William Shocks France.

Paris, April 4.—The Morocco incident in daily making a deeper impression and while calmness continues to prevail there is a growing sense of the rudeness of the shock which Emperor William's visits to Tangier and his declarations give to French policy. However, for the present it is evident that the purpose is to adopt a passive attitude and await the development of events.

Shot an Attorney.

Dallas, Tex., April 4.—Frank J. Bell, prominent attorney of this city and grand chancellor of the Knights of Pythias of Texas, was shot yesterday by R. B. Parker, chief deputy district clerk and died in the afternoon. The shooting occurred at the district clerk's office in the courthouse and was the result of a previous quarrel over fees. Parker was taken into custody.

Are Still Ex-Senators.

San Francisco, April 4.—The state supreme court yesterday denied an application for a writ of mandamus to compel the restoration to office of State Senators Bunkers, French Wright and Emmons who were recently expelled from the state senate for accepting bribes to influence their votes in regard to legislation affecting building and loan associations.

For Good Roads.

Washington, April 4.—President Moore of the National Good Roads association, secured a promise from Secretary Wilson to be a member of a party which will travel from Chicago to Portland, Ore., and diffuse good roads literature on the way.

Gets Another Place.

Washington, April 4.—C. E. Grunsky, who last Saturday tendered his resignation as one of the isthmian canal commissioners, has been appointed a consulting engineer in the irrigation reclamation service.

Connect Russia and America.

St. Petersburg, April 5.—Darcz Loloq DeLobel, representing the French group which is engineering the project of connecting the railroad systems of Russia and America by means of a railroad and tunnel under Bering strait, has presented the matter to Minister of railroads Hilkooff and Minister of Finance Kolovsoff. Although the proposition is regarded as being a good deal in the nature of a "Jules Verne dream" the ministers agreed to consider it and a commission of both ministries has been formed to examine the plans and report on them.

Good Roads Special.

Chicago, April 5.—Arrangements have been completed between the National Good Roads Association and the officials of the Burlington and Northern Pacific roads for the Good Roads special over these systems, which is to leave Chicago Wednesday, May 8. It is to be known as the Burlington and Northern Pacific Lewis and Clark Good Roads Special, and will cover an itinerary of 45 to 50 of the principal cities of the systems, from Chicago to the Pacific coast.

Paroled Officer Returns.

Valejo, Cal., April 5.—Sub. Lieut. Andre Kara Dnylan, the third of the Russian officers who broke their parole and returned to Russia, has reached Mare Island. He reported to Rear Admiral Bowman H. McCalla. He was accompanied by the commandant's office by his commanding officer, Captain A. Borlinsky. In his interview with the admiral, which was brief, he renewed his personal parole. This was the course pursued with the other two officers.

Will Be Heard at May Term.

Topeka, Kan., April 5.—Chief Justice Johnston of the supreme court has issued an alternative writ of mandamus requiring T. T. Kelly, state treasurer, and E. B. Jewett, warden of the penitentiary, to appear in court April 17 and show cause why they should not issue bonds provided for in the state oil refinery law. Justice Johnston says that the case will be set for hearing on the first day of the May term. A decision of the validity of the law will be rendered at that session of the court.

Found Buried Coin.

Mount Pleasant, Tex., April 5.—T. A. Ledbetter has dug up a pot containing nearly \$2,000 in gold coin, twenty miles north of here. The coin is all United States money except one or two pieces which are either Spanish or Mexican. Years ago an old Indian said that some kind of treasure had been buried near the spot and search was made for it at that time, but without success.

Mrs. Chadwick Asks Stay.

Cincinnati, April 5.—Judge Francis J. Wing, counsel for Mrs. Cassie L. Chadwick of Cleveland, appeared before Judges Lorton, Severens and Richards in the United States circuit court of appeals in this city yesterday and moved that her sentence be stayed until the United States circuit court of appeals shall have heard her appeal, or until final judgement be rendered in the court of last resort. The court promised to render an opinion this morning.

To Remove Pike's Body.

Colorado Springs, Colo., April 5.—A movement has been started here through the local chamber of commerce to have the remains of Lieut. Zebulon Montgomery Pike, the discoverer of Pike's Peak, removed to Colorado and either reinterred in this city or on the summit of the great entrance which bears his name. The body of Lieut. Pike is buried at Lawrenceburg, Ind., where it lies in a practically neglected grave.

To Separate Church and State.

Paris, April 5.—During the discussion in the chamber of deputies on the bill for the separation of church and state, M. Martin, minister of public worship, stated that the opposition's demand for an amicable arrangement between church and state was impossible of realization, the church not desiring separation, whilst the country thought it indispensable.

Bank Cashier Suicides.

Wellington, Kan., April 5.—Gleen Loufhourow aged 27, cashier of the First National Bank of Mt. Sterling Ohio committed suicide here yesterday by shooting himself through the head. The body was found in a shallow slough. Despondency over ill health is supposed to have caused the act.

New Cable Opened.

Paris, April 5.—The inauguration of the government cable between Brest and Dakar, Senegal, is important owing to the Venezuelan troubles. From Dakar the line connects with Pernambuco, bringing South America into communication with France.

A Prince Arrested.

Rome, April 5.—While Prince and Princess Brog were riding in a motor car at the speed of 45 miles an hour their car ran over and killed a woman. The prince was arrested.
