BEEVES SOLD AT \$6.20.

Ex-Senator J. C. Morrow, of Washington, Kan., was on the market today with 30 head of 1,414 pound steers that he brought in from his feed lots at Haddam, which sold as soon as ready to be shown at \$6.20, the top price of the day. These cattle were very good but not considered as good as the 1,444 to 1,466 pound steers that sold here Monday at \$5.90. The steers were of Shorthorn and Hereford breeding and had been fed corn and alfalfa for the past six months and made a gain of about 400 pounds per head. Included in the shipment were 4 head of 1,390 pound cows that sold at \$5.25. Mr. Morrow says fat sceers are exceedingly scarce in Kansas and that very few will be contributed to the general supplies from the Sunflower state for some months to come.

W. V. Williemson, another prominent feeder of Haddam, Kan., also marketed a car of steers that were good enough to sell at \$6.20. They averaged 1,340 pounds and has also been fed about six months on corn and alfalfa.
