PURSUIT OF PACKERS.

Chicago Tribune Editorially Takes Sensible View of the Situation.

Against the indictment of T. J. Connors, one of the chiefs of Armour & Co., the Chicago Tribune editorially takes the following sensible view of the situation: "The public is beginning to inquire whether there is a purpose on the part of representatives of the government to 'railroad' some of the packers to indictment.

"It does look as if there was an effort to make political capital for some restless persons here or in Washington, and as if the idea were erroneously entertained that an officer of the law may make a great reputation by indicting the packers, even though the evidence shall be insufficient for their conviction."

"The bringing in of as many as 300 witnesses before the grand jury is itself evidence that the case against the packers is incomplete. If there were sufficient evidence in the possession of the government it would not be necessary to throw out a dragnet and haul in all the minnows as well as all the whales, in the hope of catching something that may be useful to a diligent fisherman.

"Nobody wishes to shield the packers. If they are guilty they should be indicted and punished, but if they are innocent the people of this community are not going to see them prosecuted or persecuted for the purpose of making a professional or political reputation of any man or set of men, however high they may be in the confidence of the administration."

"The laches or overt acts of the men who offend against the Sherman anti-trust law in the east seem to be viewed with comparative indulgence in Washington, but nothing can be more strenuous than the policy pursued of late against the western men who are associated with the packers in their various enterprises.

"The principle of the law and its method of application should be embodied in two maxims: 'Let no guilty man escape,' and 'Let no innocent man be punished.'"

REPORTS WERE COLORED.

Russian Correspondents Say Battle of Mukden Not Overwhelming Disaster.

St. Petersburg, April 6.--Russian newspaper correspondents in Manchuria having received papers containing accounts of the battle of Mukden are wiring protests against its consideration as an "overwhelming disaster and unprecedented defeat and destruction of the Manchurian army." The correspondents complain bitterly of the censorship which forbade the transmission of true accounts of the battle from the Russian side, permitting the papers and the public to derive their impressions from telegrams colored by the Japanese view. The correspondents admit the loss of many stores and attribute defeat to the successful strategy, numerical superiority and exact knowledge of Russian numbers and positions which enabled the Japanese to work out their turning movements. One correspondent declares that the extreme mobility of the Japanese made it necessary to have a whole army in reserve but that this had already been sent to the fighting line eastward when the real stroke developed. In this correspondent's opinion Gen. Kuropatkin should have commenced his retreat at that moment.

THE GERMAN POSITION.

German Ambassador Presents to the War Department Statement Regarding Moroccan Policy.

Washington, April 6.--Germany has outlined to the United States in clear and emphatic terms the position claimed by the Berlin government in Morocco. Upon the receipt of instructions from Berlin, the German ambassador called at the War department upon Secretary Taft whom the president before leaving designated as the cabinet officer with whom the ambassadors should confer and in the name of the German emperor, left with the secretary a brief memorandum setting forth the Moroccan policy which Germany has all along pursued and from which she does not propose to be swayed. In substance the memorandum which is couched in the most explicit language announces that: "Germany stands for the 'open door' in Morocco no less firmly than in the far east for the preservation of the Moroccan status quo and for the safeguarding and protection of the commercial and trade interests in Morocco not only of Germany, but of all the trading nations of the world."

AS RUSSIANS SEE US.

Queer Ideas of American Life Are Sent Out by Correspondents.

St. Petersburg, April 6.--Queer ideas of American life are being disseminated by American correspondents of Russian papers. A correspondent of the Journal de St. Petersburg draws a rare picture of the dishonesty which he says pervades the highest circles, including men, women and children. He describes the precautions taken by social leaders to prevent their guests from being robbed by each other and tells of the consternation produced at a White House reception by a sudden failure of the lights, the re-illumination showing the ladies had hastily divested themselves of their jewels and concealed them, the men holding their pocketbooks for fear of being pounced upon and robbed by neighbors.

Belgians Want Installments.

San Domingo, April 6.--The Belgian creditors of Santo Domingo have presented a proposition to President Morales and American Minister Dawson for the monthly payment of \$25,000 to the Belgians intimating that then they would favor the debt arrangement being concluded. It is expected that the situation will remain unaltered until the United States takes final action regarding the pending convention.

John A. Talty Will Contest.

St. Louis, Mo., April 6.--Judge John A. Talty, Republican candidate for mayor, who was defeated on the unofficial count in the election Tuesday by a plurality of 1,425, has made a statement announcing that he will contest the re-election of Mayor Wells. Democrat, Judge Talty bases his claim for the mayoralty on allegations that frauds were committed in certain down-town wards.

Smith Hearing Again Postponed.

Cincinnati, April 6.--The habeas corpus hearing of J. Morgan Smith and wife arrested here last week and held under a New York indictment for conspiracy with Nan Patterson to extort money from "Cesars" Young, the bookmaker, was to have been had yesterday afternoon before Judge Spindel of the common pleas court, but on request of counsel was again adjourned until next Monday afternoon.

"Baby Farms" Must Go.

Minneapolis, April 6.--"Baby Farms" in Minneapolis are doomed. An investigation of this system which has been described by those who have investigated it as illicit traffic in human life was begun by officers of the Humane Society and now has been taken up by the grand jury at least four indictments charging the gravest crimes have resulted.

Old Directors Re-elected.

Dallas, Tex., April 6.--The annual meeting of the Missouri, Kansas & Texas Railroad company of Texas was held in this city yesterday. The stockholders re-elected the old board of directors.

The total vote for mayor stands: Wells, democrat, 44,897; John A. Talty, republican, 42,342; William M. Brandt, socialist, 7,124; Les Meriwether, independent, 3,668 votes, grand total, 97,369 votes.

The Largest Telescope.

Cambridge, Mass., April 6.--A new 66-inch reflecting telescope, made in England in 1888 by the late A. A. Common and purchased by Harvard university, is being set up at the astronomical observatory. In point of aperture the new instrument is the largest telescope in the world. The present plan is to use it for measuring the relative intensity of the light of different stars.

Bank Under New Control.

New York, April 5.--Formal announcement of the purchase of control of the Phoenix National bank of this city by J. P. Morgan & company, August Belmont & company, E. F. Swinney of the First National bank of Kansas City and F. E. Marshall of the National bank of Commerce of St. Louis, was made yesterday.

England Follows Our Example.

London, April 6.--Following the example of the United States department of agriculture the British board of agriculture is experimenting with the view of ascertaining the value of nitrogen producing bacteria.

Stock Transfer Tax.

Albany, April 6.--The assembly, after an all-day continuous debate passed practically by party vote, the stock transfer tax and mortgage tax bills with the penal code amendment prescribing penalties for forging or counterfeiting the stock revenue tax stamps.
