CARE OF THE HANDS

PERSISTENT ATTENTION NECESSARY TO KEEP IN BEST CONDITION.

NEED NOT BE DIMINUTIVE.

Their Beauty Conditioned on Appearance of Usefulness—Constant Fastidious Care Required—Bringing Out the "Lunula"—How to Remove Warts—Daily Routine for Hands.

It is by constant, assiduous, not intermittent, attention to the hand that it is kept in proper order.

All disgusting growths, such as warts, should be removed. One of the most common treatments for warts is to shave the surface until they bleed.

The simplest and, perhaps most satisfactory of all methods, is to paint the wart or mole lightly with glacial acetic acid.

There are many refinements and remedies for beautifying the hands which most people would find impossible to follow.

In the days of our grandmothers, it was a common thing to find a bag of bran upon the wash-stand.

A pleasing design for a standing circular frame of water color paper is a group of three or four vials, bunched together.

A plain brown or green wall paper makes an ideal background for pictures, and the absence of pattern on walls adds immensely to the apparent size of the room.

A piece of smooth pumice stone is most useful for the removal of calluses, or hard parts on the palm of the hand.

FOR HOT-WATER BOTTLE.

A Crochet Cover for One of These Household Necessaries Adds to Invalid's Comfort Materially.

About eight ounces of white double Berita wool and thick bone hook. Work a chain of about 12 inches or a little more than the width of the bottle for which the cover is required.

crochet through both threads of each stitch of preceding row, join round.

Repeat these two last rows until the work is about 17 inches in depth.

For the string wind the wool six times round the hook and two fingers secure with chain stitch (or tassel).

Every housekeeper should possess a knowledge of simple remedies for the slight ailments of the household.

For burns, lathered oil, glycerin and borax water, mixed together and freely applied, will be found efficacious.

For a black eye a cloth wrung out of warm water and applied frequently will prevent soreness and discoloring of the skin.

For toothache, mix equal parts of alum and powdered borax.

For sprains, wrap the parts in flannel cloth wrung out of boiling water, cover with a dry bandage and give the parts absolute rest for several days.
