CATTLE.

Steer Market Was Slow and Unevenly Lower than Yesterday.

There was a large proportion of beef steers in the receipts today and trading was slow and unevenly lower on all grades. The fact that this market was steady to strong yesterday, and in some instances a little higher, while the Chi-cago market ruled lower, put values considerably out of line, and buyers endeavored to equalize by taking off about 10c on the best class of steers offered and 10@15c on the general run of fair to good light and medium grades of dressed beef and shipping steers, which predominated in the receipts. While sellers were disposed to concede the decline, it was not until they had exhausted every resource to better their bids, and this had the effect of creating a rather slow trade and it was later than usual before a clearance was made. The export and shipping steers sold largely at \$5.75@ 6.15, while the well-fattened weighty steers, suitable, for the eastern dressed beef trade sold from \$8.20 @6.40, but there was nothing offered that was on the fancy order. The light and medium were liberal at the lower range of prices and supplies were pretty well absorbed

Receipts ran largely to fair to medium qualitied offer ngs that met a very good demand a prices generally weak to 10c lower, bu on some of the most desirable kinds there was no perceptible change in values from yesterday and some of the sellers got out nearly steady on some of the fair t medium holdings. Most of the buyer had good orders for good fat bulls and stags and this was stimulated to some extent by a limited demand from order buyers which [kept values fully steady and in some instances a shade stronger. There was a good supply of veals and buying orders were sufficiently strong to advance prices about 25c per hundred weight on all grades, and a few fancy oferings sold up to \$6.50.

Receipts of 7,000 were to buy very freely on the early holdings. one week ago and the quality was only fair-not as good as it has been running selling at \$7.40 was considered steady, for the past week. Top quality of butcher and heavy weight was not lacking though in smaller proportion classes, while common to mediums would than for some days past and there was a big showing of mixed droves carrying \$7,55. long packer tops, so that in a general 326 Col-Mex lambs way the quality for the day could only be called fair. Total hogs in sight a outside points fell several thousand short of the showing of one week ago today. THEY WANT TIME EXTENDED

Washington, D. C., April 18 .- A delegation of stock yards men are here for a onference with Secretary Wilson, of the department of agriculture, with a view to having the rule governing the time during which live stock in transit can be kept in confinement in cars modified. The present rule allows the shipper and railroad 28 hours during which cattle can be kept in the cars continuously. It is sought to have this time extended to 32 hours. According to the East St. Louis stock yards representatives, few of the railroads have accommodations large enough along their lines for cattle from a full train. They maintain that the practice of taking the cattle out of the cars for a rest subjects them to more cruelty than an additional four hours' continement would. By extending the time, it is claimed, nearly all cattle markets could be reached without unloading en route.

Russian Warships Were Taking on Supplies in Kamranh Bay.

THE FRENCH ARE FURNISHING AID.

Saigon, April 18 .- The Japanese recently captured a large number of colliers off the coast of Cochin-China. A number of Russian warships are anchored in Kamranh bay where they are revictualling. The steamer Eridan which was purchased by a local French firm sailed Sunday evening with a fuil cargo of provisions for the squadron. The health of the Russians is remarkably good. & Only eight deaths from disease have occurrred since their departure from Europe, out of an effective total of 18,000 men.

A Russian officer suffering from beriberi is in the hospital here. The other sick men who were brought here by the Russian hospital ship Orel include Prince Cantacuzene but the reports that the Orel has wounded men on board are unfounded as there had been no fighting up to the time of her ar-

London, April 18.-In the absence of further information regarding the position of the Russian and Japanese fleets, the London morning papers are keenly discussing the neutrality question, for the most part in a strong pro-Japanese tone. The Morning Post takes the milder view that Kamranh bay is a mere fishing port and unable to provide coal or other supplies to the Russian squadron, which probably took shelter there to replenish from its own colliers and that, though technical breach of neutrality has been committed, the French authorities could hardly be held responsible unless it can be proven that they had previous knowledge of Rojestvensky's
