WEDNESDAY'S BUSINESS CATTLE.

With supplies in Chicago today overrunning estimates and prices sharply lower, the trade here broke in sympathy but was quite active at the lower range of prices.

Traders had various experiences as some of the sellers who got out to good advantage yesterday considered the market worse than it really was.

Considering the number of cattle on sale, the supply of butcher stock was very limited, being confined to only a few straight load lots of good cows and heifers including none that were choice to fancy.
