## BEAR RAID ON MAY WHEAT

Death Blow to the Predicted Humanity Astonisher by Gates Clique in the May Wheat Deal.

Chicago, April 21.- The celebrated deal in May wheat attributed to John W. Gates received seemingly its death blow yesterday. Possibly as much as 5,000, 000 bushels for May delivery was dumped on the market. As a result, there was a break of 5c a bushel in the price, the quotations for May falling from \$1.131/4 to \$1.081/4. Some operators professed an opinion that the slump was due to heavy Eastern holders of May wheat unloading because of notable unrest in the stock market, the alleged purpose of the sellers being to get free to protect securities in Wall street. A much more prevalent belief, however, was that Gates, tiring of the bruden, had shifted the May wheat deal to Armour and others. One thing was said to the certain, that Gates had sold tremendous quantities today through at least one house here. When the price of May fell under \$1.10, commission people poured wheat out on stop-loss selling orders. This caused a breath-catching slide sheer to \$1.08%. The total sales of May were estimated all the way from 3,000,-

While the bear turn was on in May the Armour people were supporting July wheat against selling drives caused by general rains. It was argued that Armour's enormous buying for July was for the Gates crowd, either covering heavy short sales, made from \$1.01 down, or possibly going long for the Wall street dealer. At the close of the session May jumped back to \$1.10, leaving the net declines for the day 3%c. July closed less than %c off, at 87%c@87%c.

### THE JOLT AT CHICAGO.

In reviewing the Chicago cattle market for the week, the Live Stock World

says:

Keavy cattle were the subject of sharp discrimination. Nice handy stuff has Heavy cattle were the subject of sharp discrimination. Nice handy stuff has not suffered as much. The market was generally 15@25 cents lower than Monday, and in cases more. Compared with late last week it was 25@35 cents lower, and 40@50 cents under the high spot. Very few have escaped a 25-cent decline since Monday, exceptions being the handy finished stuff weighing around 1,200 lbs. Sales at \$5.75 today looked like the \$5.90 kind on Monday, but plenty of \$5.80@5.90 stuff is a quarter lower than the opening. Cattle weighing around 1,450 lbs, worth \$6.50 on the recent high spot, are now in the \$6.00@6.10 classification. There was considerable unevenness on the break. Plain heavy cattle have been affected most, and the bulk of supply has been on this order.

Compared with the recent high spots, the whole market looked 40@50 cents per cwt. lawer, but this comparison involves consideration not only of the high days but the high minutes. Cattle now selling at \$5.75@5.80 were recently in the \$6.15@6.35 class, and plenty of cattle sold yesterdayl and today at \$5.90 m of 00 that showed the full decline. Another week of heavy receipts must, however, put the market on a still lower basis. There is good consumption of beef at present and trade sentiment is that there is none too many cattle available for the next 90 days, but judicious marketing will be required to avert declines. Trying to get them in all at once will only accelerate declines.
