Hamburg-American Steamer Arrives in New York Harbor With 3.080 Passengers on Board.

New York, April 22 .- When the Hamburg-American line steamer Pennsylvania arrived here Friday from Hamburg she had on board the largest number of passengers ever brought to this port on a single steamer. The whole number, including cabin and steerage was 3,086. Of these 2,880 were in the steerage. Only once in the past has this number of steerage passengers been exceeded. That was about two years ago when the steamer Bulgaria of the same line brought in 2,899 passengers in her third class quarters.
