They were deprived of this right after the insurrection of 1863, the land tenure of Poles being limited to land acquired by direct inheritance.

LOOKS MORE SERIOUS

Chicago Strike Situation Again Becomes Critical.

ALL UNION DRIVERS MAY GO OUT.

Unless Present Differences Are Adjusted Before Tuesday Morning Trouble May Spread Beyond and Become Most Serious.

Chicago, May 15.—Unless compromises are offered by all the opposing interests in the fight now in progress in Chicago, between capital and labor, the teamsters strike will spread manifold during the next 48 hours. The refusal of the teamsters' joint council, representing 35,000 union drivers, to accede to the demands of the Chicago Team Owners' Association, to handle merchandise for all business houses having contracts with the members of the owners organization, without discriminating against the firms involved in the present strike, has brought the controversy to a point where a speedy settlement will have to be made to prevent an extension of the trouble.

There is a probability, however, that the whole trouble may be satisfactorily adjusted without resorting to such drastic measures. After receiving the announcement of the Teamsters' joint council, refusing to obey the ultimatum of the Team Owners' Association, a meeting of the latter organization was held, and it was decided to give the teamsters more time to consider the proposition. At first it was the intention of the team owners to put their ultimatum into effect Monday morning, but believing that the teamsters could be induced to change their minds, they were given until Tuesday to make final answer to the proposition. Information which the team owners say they received Sunday, that the teamsters' joint council was not a unit, in its determination to fight the owners, was given by the owners as the reason for the postponement of the enforcement of the ultimatum until Tuesday. That Saturday night's decision of the teamsters will be reconsidered, was evinced when a call was sent out for another meeting of the teamsters' joint council for Monday night. In addition to this meeting of the officials of the teamsters' union another call was issued for a meeting on Tuesday of the executive committee of the International Brotherhood of Teamsters. This committee is the controlling body of the teamsters organization, and it is this body of officials that orders, or has the final word, in the settlement of a strike of their members.

The Chicago joint inventory's association has become involved in the trouble and a strike of the 2,000 drivers employed by this organization is imminent. The trouble was brought about by the union carriage drivers refusing to carry patrons of the association to the strike bound department stores. A statement was given out by the association Sunday night that commencing Monday night the men would be compelled to carry all patrons to their destination and that a refusal meant immediate discharge. The officials of the cab drivers' union declared that their men would all be ordered on strike if but even one member of their union was discharged for refusing to obey the command of the association. Should this strike be called it will involve the horse drivers and it was said would necessitate the use of mounted guards to escort funerals to outlying cemeteries should it be necessary to use non-union drivers.

TRAIN WAS WRECKED

Was Fourth Attempt to Derail Cars at That Point.

SPIKES DRAWN AND PLATES REMOVED

Six Persons Were Injured. Two Perhaps Fatally—Toots' Found Near Wreck—No Clue to the Perpetrators.

Emporia, Kan., May 15.—Santa Fe passenger train No. 17 was derailed by train wreckers a mile east of town at 2:30 Sunday morning. Six passengers were injured and two will probably die. This is the fourth attempt in the last four months to wreck passenger trains in the same place. Previous attempts were made by piling ties on the track and without serious results. The wreck Sunday morning was caused by removing the spikes and fishplates of two rails on the inside of a curve. The engine on No. 17, in charge of Engineer Tom Grady and Fireman Grover, passed over the loose rails safely, but the mail car left the track and was dragged a hundred yards along the embankment before the train was stopped. The next five cars, two express and baggage cars, smoker and two day coaches, went into the ditch across the right-of-way fence, and lodged in a zigzag line. The end of the baggage car went up in the air high enough to ground four telegraph wires. Two Pullman sleepers remained on the track. The passengers were asleep when the wreck occurred and were greatly excited. The passengers soon formed a wrecking crew and went to the relief of the men in the overturned baggage car. A window was broken and of seven men in the car six were found injured. Strochers were made from car doors and wounded carried to a nearby field where a hospital was improvised. An hour after the wreck a relief train arrived from Emporia and the injured were taken to Emporia. A hundred workmen were put to work on the track and it was cleared for use again Sunday afternoon. There is no clue to the wreckers, although it is evidently the work of amateurs. Three were seen Saturday night near Howard branch section house. Sunday morning a track wrench and claw bar were missing and were found in a pool of water near the wreck Sunday. It is believed it must have been the work of a gang as passenger train No. 18 passed over the rails less than 24 minutes before the wreck and the wreck of Lang, five miles away.

HE WAS LAST SURVIVOR.

Hiram Cronk the Last Veteran of War of 1812 Died at Remarkable Age of 105.

New York, May 15.—Hiram Cronk, the last survivor of the war of 1812, died at his home near Dunn Brook, N. J., at the remarkable age of 105 years. Besides bearing the distinction of being the last of a host of 200,000 soldiers of the war of 1812 to pass to the great beyond, Hiram Cronk had the added prestige of being among few men living whose funeral honors were arranged in advance of his death by the city of New York or any other municipality. The board of aldermen of this city, by unanimous vote, some time ago arranged for the funeral in this city of the war survivor and planned an elaborate programme. State officials at Albany took coincident action, with the result that an imposing funeral will be held in this city; where the body of the old soldier will lie in state. If the relatives agree to details, the body will lie in state in the city hall for 24 hours; and Dr. Morgan Dix of Trinity church will officiate at the funeral services. The burial will be at Mount Victory, in Cypress hills cemetery, where 60 veterans of the war of 1812 already lie.

WILL PROSECUTE MOB.

Gov. Folk Has Directed Attorney General to Investigate Lynching of Witherspoon.

Jefferson City, Mo., May 15.—Gov. Folk has directed the attorney general, Mr. Hadley, to investigate the lynching of the negro, Witherspoon, in Belmont Friday, and to assist in prosecuting attorney in prosecuting those participating in the crime. The governor has said: "No matter how deserving the death of the negro may have been, nor how dastardly the crime, it was murder for the mob to hang him. It is just as much an offense in the eye of the law for the mob to kill a guilty person as it would be to lynch an innocent one. We have government by law, and not by mobs, and those who take part in such lawlessness do so at their peril. The attorney general has been directed to investigate the matter and assist the prosecuting attorney of the county in bringing justice to those participating in this crime."

WAS DAY OF STORMS.

Incipient Tornadoes Cause Damage at Many Points Saturday.

BUT SMALL LOSS OF LIFE REPORTED

Disturbed Atmospheric Conditions Extended Over a Large Area—Narrow Escape of Golden State Limited.

Hobart, Ok., May 15.—Oulstee, a small town on the Frisco railroad, 20 miles west of Snyder, was struck by a tornado at 8 o'clock Saturday morning and almost wiped out. No deaths have been reported, but many are badly bruised. Houses were demolished, and many of the inhabitants of the village are homeless.

A TEXAS TORNADO.

Port Worth, Texas, May 15.—A special to the Record from Mount Pleasant, Texas, says: "A terrific tornado passed two and a half miles southeast of here Saturday afternoon. One person was killed and many were injured. The path of the tornado was half mile wide, and the country for three miles was cleared of every residence, barn and fence."

Houses Washed Away.

Cleburne, Texas, May 15.—Twenty-five houses were partially or totally washed away here at noon Saturday by a water-spout. The city is situated between East and West Buffalo creeks. These were transformed into rivers. Houses floated away and were rammed against wooden and steel bridges, to the destruction of both.

The Valley Falls Damage.

Valley Falls, Kan., May 15.—A tornado here at 5:30 o'clock Saturday afternoon did much damage to property. Nobody was badly injured. The German Evangelic church, five dwellings and many farm buildings were destroyed.

Train's Narrow Escape.

Alta Vista, Kan., May 15.—A tornado Saturday afternoon here unroofed several houses and did much other damage. The storm crossed the Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific track only a few hundred feet ahead of the Golden State limited, which was going at full speed. Many telegraph poles were blown down.

Demolished School House.

Mayetta, Kan., May 15.—A schoolhouse was demolished and ten farmhouses more or less damaged by a tornado that visited this place Saturday afternoon. The telephone lines were broken by the wind and no particulars can be obtained of damage north of here. The tornado lifted a mile north of this city and went northeast, tearing off the tops of trees.

Skipped Part of Lindbergh.

Lindsborg, Kan., May 15.—A tornado passed over the western portion of this city Saturday at 1 o'clock. It tore down many outhouses and rooted up trees. A new barn of E. Nelson, living one mile west of town, was torn to pieces. The storm passed in a north easterly direction and damaged several houses in Bridgeport, six miles distant. No one was injured.

Destroys Farm Buildings.

Council Grove, Kan., May 15.—A tornado struck the northern part of Morris county at 5 o'clock Saturday afternoon. The greatest damage occurred at the home of A. D. McGuire, two miles north of Dwight. The house, barn and granaries were entirely destroyed on the McGuire farm.

Tornado Near Poplar Bluff, Mo.

Poplar Bluff, Mo., May 15.—A tornado raged about two miles south of Poplar Bluff at 6 o'clock Saturday afternoon. The house of Luther Derrington was unroofed and blown from the foundations. The barn and outbuildings on the Derrington farm were entirely demolished. The storm hewed a path through the woods and public roads were blocked by falling timber for nearly two miles.

Iowa First, Kansas Second.

Milwaukee, May 15.—Iowa captured first honors in the interstate normal oratorical contest at the Milwaukee Normal school, May Campbell of the Cedar Falls normal winning the gold medal and \$50 in gold with his oration on the "City and System in American Politics." Second honors were won by Kansas, the judges awarding the silver medal and \$30 in gold to Leo R. Light of Emporia, who spoke on "Civic Honesty."

Congress Coming Home.

San Francisco, Cal., May 15.—E. H. Conger, former American minister to China arrived here from the Orient on the steamer Siberia. Mr. Conger is accompanied by his wife. After a brief stay in this city Mr. Conger will proceed almost immediately to the city of Mexico, while Mrs. Conger will go to her former home in Iowa before joining Mr. Conger in Mexico.

Archbishop Glenn Gets Insignia.

St. Louis, Mo., May 15.—In the presence of one of the most notable gatherings of Catholic church dignitaries in the history of St. Louis, the pallium, the official insignia of an archbishop, was Sunday bestowed upon John Joseph Glenn, archbishop of the archdiocese of St. Louis.


Case Against Miners Dismissed.


Senator Clark Buys Foundry.

JAPAN HAS PROOF.

Gives Details of Way in Which Russian Squadron Has Been Using French Waters.

Tokio, May 15.--Detailed confirmation: Information concerning Vice Admiral Rojestsvensky's use of Indo-China waters has reached the Japanese government from a variety of sources, both official and private. A high Japanese official Sunday sketched to the Associated press the important acts of the Russian fleet since France was first moved to preserve neutrality. He said:

"The governor general of Indo-China officially reported that the Russian fleet had entirely departed from Kamranh bay on April 22, but on April 23 there still remained in the bay one cruiser, one torpedo boat destroyer, and 15 transports of the Russian fleet. On April 24 the entire Russian fleet reentered Kamranh Bay and rode at anchor until April 26, when a majority of the warships sailed, leaving behind four converted cruisers and one torpedo boat destroyer. These latter vessels took supplies of coal and provisions. On April 26, toward evening, these vessels stopped and examined the German steamer Loo Sok and the Norwegian steamer Providence, which passed outside of the bay. On April 27 more than 30 Russian vessels were anchored at Honghohe and at 5 o'clock in the afternoon they stopped and examined the British steamer Stettin, which was passing.

"According to the French official report Vice Admiral Rojestsvensky promised Admiral De Jonguiere that he would leave Honghohe May 3. It is evident, however, that the Russians were anchored at Honghohe on May 3.

"The latest telegrams from Indo-China indicate the presence at Honghohe on May 12 of seven Russian battleships, seven cruisers, two torpedo boat destroyers and four converted cruisers.

"Since the appearance of the Russian fleet in the far east Saigon has become a base for the transportation of military supplies for Vice Admiral Rojestsvensky's fleet. The number of vessels furnishing supplies to the Russians is so great that those which were anchored at Saigon May 5 were countable by tens."

PAUL MORTON WILL RETIRE.

Secretary of Navy States His Intention of Resigning From the Cabinet.

Washington, May 15.--Paul Morton, secretary of the navy, will retire from the cabinet this fall. The secretary made the announcement Saturday afternoon to a group of newspaper men he met in the corridors of the state war and navy building. The exact date of his retirement he did not reveal and it probably has not been definitely determined, but the inference was clear that Mr. Morton would not be a cabinet member when congress met in extra session October 18.

Secretary Morton made the statement just after he had returned from a visit to the White house. Mr. Morton stated that he and the president were in accord and there had been no friction of any kind. The announcement that Mr. Morton is to retire will not surprise his friends. He has told friends for months past that he did not intend to remain in the cabinet longer than a year.

PACKING PLANT TO OPEN.

National Packing Company to Again Resume Business at Hutchinson, Kan.

Hutchinson, Kan., May 15.--S. A. McClean, president, and Edward Tilden, vice president of the National Packing company, of Chicago, who are here, say the local plant of the company, which has been closed down for years, will be opened by the first of July. One thousand hogs and 200 cattle will be killed daily and 400 men will have employment. Refrigerator lines will be established

CONDITIONS SHOULD GOVERN.

International Railway Congress Favors Elastic Freight Rates But Opposes Arbitrary Discrimination.

Washington, May 15.--The conclusions adopted by the international railway congress which closed its seventh session here Saturday were officially announced Sunday. The most interesting of the conclusions related to railway rates on which, after a prolonged discussion in which every country in which railways are operated, was represented, the congress unanimously expressed its conclusions as follows:

"Tariffs should be based on commercial principles, taking into account the special conditions which bear upon the commercial value of the services rendered. With the reservation that rates shall be charged without arbitrary discrimination to all shippers alike under like conditions, the making of rates, should as far as possible have all the elasticity necessary to permit the development of the traffic and to produce the greatest results to the public and to the railroads themselves."

These conclusions were ratified at the close of the session after President Roosevelt's speeches had been a topic of discussion and two days after Secretary Taft's address on freight rates at the banquet of the congress.
