

HORSE MARKET

While there were nothing like the number of horses here that were offered in the initial auction in the new horse and mule barns two weeks ago, there were enough to make a creditable showing for the season of year. And, too, the offerings included some very attractive animals of driving, draft and general purpose types.

While there is the usual season dullness in the country the market demand for good horses has held up remarkably well and double the number offered today could have been handled to good advantage. The eastern demand is remarkable for this season, several dealers were here from eastern points and local men had more buying orders for outside points than they were able to fill.

Bidding in the auction ring was comparatively as spirited as it was during the big sale of two weeks ago and all offerings of merit made good prices with competition especially strong for attractive roadsters and big rugged farm horses.

The big government contract for army mules, to be sent to the Philippines, that is to be let soon is stirring up some interest in that line and whether the actual contract comes here or not it is felt that its effect will be felt here and should stimulate the country into getting some mules ready for that trade.

HORSE NOTES.

During the past two weeks the work of completing the new barns has been going on rapidly and the sales pavilion is now practically completed.

In addition to the regular program of speed events, the Iowa State Fair this fall will have a decided novelty in racing. It will be a twenty mile relay race between three expert women riders, who will have eighteen fast horses at their command. Four miles of the relay will be run each day of the fair. In this ride the riders will have to change mounts every half mile, adding much excitement to the contest, for the new mounts will be stationed at fixed points and the riders must use much skill in order to change horses with the least loss of time. The woman riders and the horses come from the Pacific coast, where they created much excitement last year with their sensational racing. Two of the women are regular "broncho busters," and will be brought into the ring for them.

NEW INNOVATION.

Bureau of Information to be Established on Fair Grounds.

Des Moines, Ia., May 26.—Secretary J. C. Simpson of the Iowa State Fair has decided on an innovation for this fall that will be of special interest to newspaper men, and will likewise prove advantageous to the general public. It is a press bureau for the State Fair. The chief duty of this bureau will be to gather information of all the prize awards each day of the fair and prepare the lists for publication. This will admit of the public announcement of the awards every day, and is expected to add much interest to the contests. It will take a good sized staff to secure the routine news of the fair, but Secretary Simpson will endeavor to make a success of the press bureau and thus give the busy editors and reporters time to take a general survey of the fair, relying on the press bureau to prepare the prize lists. The press bureau will have headquarters on the grounds, August 23 to September 1, and will furnish any information that may be desired during the fair.

T., May 26.—In disregard of orders issued by Secretary Hitchcock and the subsequent opinion of the attorney general to the effect that all deeds to Indian allotments must be approved by the interior department, Gov. McCurtan, of the Choctaw nation, Thursday resumed distribution of patents to Choctaw allottees. It is expected that the government will join the tribal governors, who express a desire for a legal hearing of the issue.

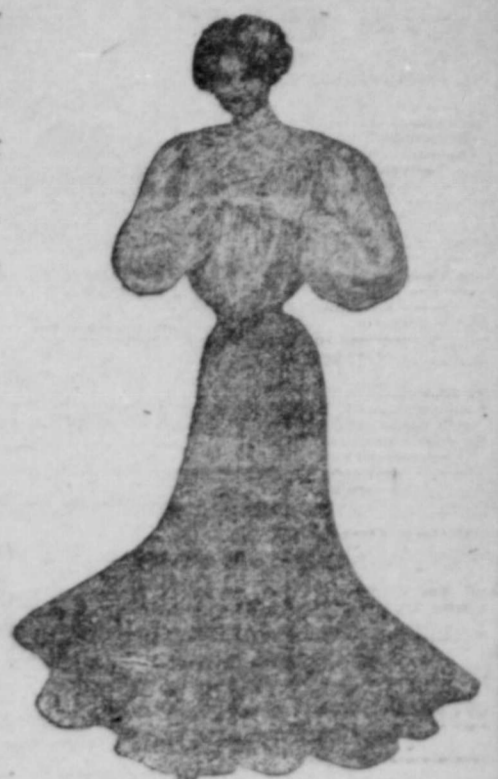

RIOTING IN WARSAW

Jewish Socialists Attempt to Cleanse Hebrew District.

EIGHT PERSONS KILLED 100 WOUNDED

Mob Armed with Axes Raid Disorderly Places and Destroy Furniture--No Interference from Police.

Warsaw, May 26.--The Jewish disorders here have arisen from an attempt of the Jewish Socialist organization called the Bund to purge the Hebrew district of Warsaw of all disreputable persons. The Bundists with the view of expelling their undesirable co-religionists commenced to wreck disorderly houses, cafes and other resorts. The fighting spread to the surrounding streets, continuing until midnight and re-commencing Thursday morning and continued all day and were still in progress late Thursday night. Eight persons have already been killed and 100 wounded, 19 seriously. The damage to property has been considerable. There has been no pillage, by the destruction of the furniture in the various houses has been absolute.

The mob armed with axes smashed the doors and windows and brought the furniture out on the streets where they broke it into small pieces. The owners of the furniture in attempting to defend their belongings were attacked and even killed. Knives and revolvers were used freely and many persons were terribly injured.

The authorities took no steps to prevent the riots until late Thursday night when the Cossacks fired on the crowds at two points, wounding four persons.

The correspondent of the Associated Press spent several hours in the disturbed district but did not see a single active policeman. During the day patrols occasionally appeared, but they witnessed the proceedings merely as spectators.

The character of the disturbances is unprecedented. The whole affair is a conflict between the respectable Jewish specialist classes and the disreputable Jewish settlement. There are conflicting stories as to the origin of the trouble. One report is to the effect that the respectable Jews, tired of hearing the members of their race

called keepers of disorderly houses, thieves and usurers and other opprobrious names, as the police were receiving bribes for protecting disreputable houses and persons, to take the matter into their own hands. Another report has it that Jewish roughs in the guise of members of the Bund, were laying blackmail upon shopkeepers, thus engaging the Socialists. In any case the Socialists seemingly determined on a crusade against the undesirable persons of their own race. With the result that crowds of men and boys are now systematically ruining the disreputable houses.

Extraordinary scenes were witnessed late Thursday night when the crowds visited the better section of the city and demolished apartment filled with costly effects. Wardrobes, pianos and mirrors were thrown out of the windows. The mob in the streets left open spaces for the falling articles and then completed the work of destruction. In one place a quantity of valuable jewelry was taken out and deliberately smashed with stones.

The whole affair was carefully organized. The leaders were supplied with the addresses of the owners of disreputable houses and scarcely a single resort in Warsaw escaped destruction.

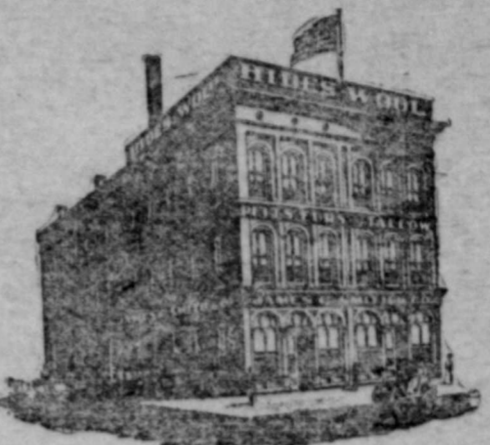

BIG KANSAS RANCH SOLD.
Junction City, Kan., May 24.--This week the biggest real estate deal made in this part of the state in many years was closed when the place known as the old Sullivant ranch, in the northern part of Morris county changed hands.
