HE MICHIGAN SIVAM Disastrous Flood Visited That Section of Country-

Excessive Rainfall Has Nearly Suspended Railroad Operations and Caused Great Loss in Cities and in Country.

Detroit, Mich., June 7 .- Further reports Tuesday from the state say that the wind and rain storm which was general over the lower part of Michigan Monday afternoon and night, was appealed to the deputies not to press the most severe in many years. In their interpelltion regarding Morocco, addition to the loss of life reported in Sanilac and Tuscola counties, heavy the fullest exercise of patriotism. property loss is reported in all directions. Streams are dooded and out of their hanks and in western Michigan railroad service is seriously delayed. Thirty washouts were reported fuesday on the Pere Marqueite system and the Grand Trunk reported 11.

At Grand Rapids the rainfall was almost a cloudburst. On the west side districts whe flooded that were not affected by the great flood of 1904. Water ran through some west side streets four feet deep, flooding many houses. About 500 homes were surrounded by water. A number of manufacturing plants were compelled to close for the day, their first floors being two and three fect under water.

The storm damage in western Michigan is estimated at \$500,000. The loss in Gran dRapids and immediate vicinity alone will reach \$100,600.

Grand Rapids, Mich., June 7 .- The flood situation in western Michigan, as a result of the torrential rains of the past 24 hours, shows no improvemont Tuesday night in the watershed of Grand river and railway traffic east, west and north from this city is at a standstill. The fall of 4.60 inches of rain last night at Lansing, 3.56 inches in this city and vicinity and three inches in the west and north part of the state has swollen all streams and a flood equal in extent to that of 1904 is feared.




