Columbia, Mo., June 12 .- The Missouri state board of agriculture has made a trial of agriculture as a part of the regular high school course in Missouri, and has found that it is a success. Editors Got All the Thrilling Sensations They Contracted For.

Knights of Pencil a Lifetime.

GRAND STAND GAVE AWAY

And Snorting Buffalo Charged the Crowd-Nineteen People Were Injured-Wild West Show Full of Thrilling Sensation From Start to Finish-Wild Steers and Bucking Bronchos Mingle With Stampeded Crowd.

Bliss, Ok., June 12 .- A series of unlooked for events at Miller Brothers '101" ranch entertainment before the National Editorial Association Sunday made the Wild West show the most thrilling, spectacular and largest attended of its kind ever witnessed. The estimated attendance was from 50,000 to 70,000. On two different occasions while the spectators were applauding acts, especially pleasing, long sections of the grandstand gave way, injuring

19 persons, some of them seriously, Twenty-five head of buffalo, in making a charge into the arena, nearly, broke into the crowd. Four times wild steers broke loose among the spectators, who had forced themselves into the arena after the grandstand away, and the chase of the cowboys among the people and the scramble of the people to get out of the way were thrilling. The crowd was many times larger than any ever assembled in Ok-

lahoma before. While the estimates vary, it is be-

numbered about 50,000. Joe Miller said the attendance would run over 50,000. Twenty-four excursion trains were run into Bliss. On one of these trains there were 1,800 persons. The ampitheater was a mile and a quarter long and and the 25-foot enlosure in front of it failed to accommodate the visitors. The grandstand had a seating capacity of 30,000, and was overcrowded. People unable to find standing room forced themselves into the arena. Soldiers and deputy

sheriffs were powerless. The second number of the programme was the buffalo chase. Three of the largest animals and a buffale calf were turned loose and chased once around the arena by Indians. The, a herd of 25 were turned into the narrow chutes, leading from the pen into the arena. The herd made a charge with surprising force and with such rapidity that the gateman was unable

to release the gate. Twenty-five buffalo piled upon each other in front of the stand occupied by the invited guests of Miller Bros. and the press. For two minutes there was a struggling mass of buffalo. The air was filled with the hair torn from the bodies of the frightened animads.

It looked as though none of them could escape being killed. The sides of the chute partially gave way, and it seemed for a time as though the herd would break loose into the crowd which would have meant the probable death of scores of people.

The buffaloes were piled high on top of each other, and the wonder is they did not jump over the chute and into the crowd. Col.Zach Mulhall finally rode up to the gate, and with great effort sprung the latch.

They dashed out of the chute like rabbits and around the mile and a quarter area at a horse speed and put through into an opening and then into their pasture. It was a rare sight and was cheered by 50,000 people.

The editors ate barbecued buffalo meat on their arrival at the ranch. Almost without exception they attended the event. They thought the crowd on the prairie the most remarkable thing they had seen on their travels and a fitting close to the tribal rela-

RUSSIA IS WAITING.

Peace Negotiations Are Now an Assured Fact.

MEETING PLACE NOT YET DETERMINED

Plenipotentingies Will Be Appointed by Both Russia and Japan-An Armistice In Likely in the Meantime.

New York, June 12 .- The Associated Press has definite knowledge that both the Russian and Papanese govpruments have accepted President Roosevelt's suggestions that a meeting of representatives of the two contending powers is assured.

Japan is Willing. Tokio, June 12 .- Japan has agreed to President Roosevelt's suggestion to appoint plenipotentiaries to meet Russian plenipotentiaries.

Russin is Ready.

St. Petersburg, June 12.—It was stated at the foreigneoffice Saturday afternoon that Russia is ready to appoint representatives to hear the Japanese proposals on being informed that Japan is nominating representatives for this purpose.

Will Meet in Washington. Washington, June 12 .- From an au-Charltative source it is learned Saturtay that it has been practically datermined that the pienipotentiaries of Japan and Russia for the determina tion of peace terms will hold their Ressions in Washington.

St. Petersburg, June 12.-1f Russia finds that terms for a basis are such that negotiations can proceed, regular plenipotentiaries will be appointed the number being decided by the bel ligerents themselves, and then it is not impossible that the negotiations might be transferred to Manchuria, as President Roesevelt is believed to have suggested.

It is stated at the foreign office that the question of plenipotentiaries has not yet been officially considered, but it is regarded as almost certain that Baron Rosen, the ambassador to the United States, on account of his long and intimate acquaintance with Far Eastern affairs, besides his familiarity with Japan will be selected.

President Roosevelt also might be of service in arranging these preliminaries, but Russia would be disposed to respect his advice to settle all questions after the first mosting directly

The statement in these dispatches last week that Emperor William warmly supported President Roosevelt's effort is confirmed and information now in the possession of the Associated Press Indicates that the German emperor not only heartily approves the president's course, but may have his share in it.

President Roosevelt, through Ambassador Meyer, has sent a persona message of thanks to Emperor Nichclas for the reception of his appeal. There is an infinite amount of gosrip here about Japan's terms, but it is almost altogether irresponsible, the best informed members of the diplomatic corps, even the British embassy, being convinced that while the main outlines are matters of common knowledge in America and in the chancellories of Europe, Japan has not revealed her exact terms even to her ally. Russia is not likely to prove recalcitrant. According to the hest opinion she is prepared to alandon the whole of her Manchurian adventure and give guarantees. The rub will come upon the objection of an indemnity which it is the concensus in diplematic circles Japan will exact, but if It should be made moderate and sugar-coated so that it could be liquidated by the sale of the Chiness eastern railroa! and the cession of Russian property and leases in the Kwantung penirsula, it might be overcome. Russia will probably insist on holding the railroad to Vladivostok through Northern Manchurla and will never submit to the humiliation of disarma-ment in her only port in the Pacific nor to the inhibition against naving warships in those waters.
