MOROCCAN POSITION.

Germany Does Not Recognize French Predominance in Morocco Nor the Angle-French

Germany has demanded that France the United Confederate Veterans, that M. Delcasse, when foreign miniser, signed a secret offensive and defensive alliance with Great Britain.

These reports are dismissed in authoritative quarters as fanciful enlargements of the situation and an editorial in the semi-official Temps Friday night gives warning against what it terms "nervous paroxysms."

At the same time the diplomatic strain between France and Germany is undeniably serious. The chief cause of this is the inability thus far of each party to propose a remedy acceptable to the other. France is tenacious to uphold her predominant position in Morocco without subjecting it to inspection and revision by the international congress proposed by Germany. On the other hand Germany does not recognize French predomin ance in Morocco or the Anglo-French agreement on which this predominance is based. 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
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
