The Week's Trade in Good Healthy Condition.

Friday receipts were of meager volume at this point, and included very few steers. In fact, there were no load lots that were at all attractive to the killers. A few odd head were found in mixed lots and these were snapped up quickly at full steady to strong prices. The best here sold at \$5.00, but the bulk were little above feeder grades and sold at feeder prices. A much larger supply would have found ready outlet to the local

For the week receipts will total out 10,000 at this point against last week and 43,000 a year ago. against 107,000 last week and 176,000 a year ago. In a general way the market for the week has been a satisfactory one to the selling interests. Early in the week there was a slight reduction in prices but this has all been regained and the market closes in good strong healthy condition.

There has been a larger proportion comparatively liberal contingents of of steers here than for sometime past, and some improvement in quality has been noted. However, there have not been enough good thick fat cattle to sufficiently lively to prevent the piling up of supplies in the stocker division and the call is for more cattle, irrespective of weight if quality is not lacking. Under the active inquiry prices have advanced 10@15c on all useful classes of stocker and feeder cattle over the close of last week. A pretty decent class of feeders, weighing around 1.000 lbs., has sold this week at \$4.00@4.25. Lighter weights week sold at \$5.50 and there was not a load of them, but they served to indicate where such cattle would sell if they were sent to this market. There have been one or two instances of split shipments between this market and Kansas City in which the shipper lost money by sending to the down river market. Quite a contingent fairly fat medium to strong weight beeves have been on offer that sold between \$5.00 @5.25 and such cattle have been picked up very readily.

In around 1.000 lbs., has sold this week at \$4.00 @4.25. Lighter weights sold largely at \$3.40 @3.85 and quality was common where anything sold under \$3.25. The market appears in good healthy condition and in shape to absorb fairly liberal receipts of the right kinds of thin steers.

Market Opened 10 Cents Lower, Showed Further Weakening.

Receipts of hogs at this point this week will come close to, if they do not break all former records on this strong; cows firm; feeders is chiefly due to the opening, early in market. The total to date this week is 61,500 and there appears to be another big run in sight for tomorrow. The record week at this market was for the week ending July 27, 1901, when the total arrived was 75,259. At five markets the total for five days is 631,000 against 360,000

After discussing the point the court reversed the judgment against Mayor constituting a crime had been proved against him. Abe Ruef who pleaded French restaurants is therefore equal-

The decision wipes out the French restaurant cases and pending charges of extortion against Schmitz and Ruef must be dismissed. Both are now entitled to release on bail. If they obtain the necessary bondsmen they can remain at liberty until such time as a jury finds them guilty on one of the indictments charging them with receiving bribes from corporations. Owing to the number of cases against them the bail, figured at \$10,000 a case, would reach an enormous figure. The judges of the court which rendered the decision in favor of Schmitz and Ruef are J. A. Cooper, Frank H. Kerrigan and Samuel P. Hall

District Attorney Langdon said Schmitz and Ruef will be prosecuted on other indictments that are public offenses. Langdon and Heney were in consultation Thursday afternoon to decide upon some line of action.

The decision wil have the effect of invalidating the other four indictments charging Schmitz as well as Ruef with extortion and renders void the plea of guilty-made by Ruef, as the appellate court held that no crime was committed. By this reversal it is feared that the prosecution has lost its hold upon Ruef and it was freely predicted that the former political boss would now refuse all over tures for immunity, wholly or in part, to testify in the bribery graft cases and fight every indictment.

It Shook St. Louis.

St. Louis, Jan. 10.-A terrific explosion, which rocked buildings in St. Louis, East St. Louis and Belleville. occurred about 11 o'clock Thursday night at Edgemont, Ill., nine miles south of East St. Louis at the Phoenix Powder company's mills. Despite the tremendous force, which was evidenced by the breaking of plate glass windows here, no one was killed or injured, according to telephonic reports. About a dozen families lived in the vicinity and that no one was hurt is considered remarkable.


