# BRISTOW'S REPORT

The Kansan Finds Conditions Not at All Pleasing on the Pacific Coast.

### CANAL TRAFFIC DIVERTED

Pacific Mail Steamship Company Was Denied Exclusive Contract With Panama Railroad-May Operate Western Line

Washington, Jan. 21.-Secretary Taft Monday transmitted to the senate committee on inter-oceanic canals the report of J. L. Bristow, who was sent by the war department to investigate the relations existing between the Panama Railroad company and the steamship lines operating on the Pacific coast with a view to ascertaining whether the government ought to engage in the steamship business on the Pacific coast in order to preserve the business of the Panama route and furnish traffic for the government steamers plying north on the Atlantic side.

The report contains interesting data gathered by Mr. Bristow and recommendations which may give the canal committee some important legislative points to consider in connection with the building of the canal. It is shown that the government is facing a rather serious condition of affairs in that the traffic over the Panama railroad from west to east is dwindling at a rate which will practically mean the extinction of trade between San Francisco and New York by steamer route by the time the canal is built. The business at the Pacific terminal of the railroad has been reduced one-half since the government took charge. Last year but 15,000 tons of freight were transported over the railroad from Panama to Colon. At the present time most of the steamers operated by the government on the Atlantic ocean are compelled to return north in bal-

The traffic depression is mainly due to action of the Pacific Mail Steamship company, which has been refused an exclusive contract with the Panama railroad.
