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#### Local Receipts Increase, But Demand For Steers Quite Good.

While local receipts of cattle for the half week show a small increase the total marketing at five points is a trifle short of first three days of last week. Furthermore the whole total is not larger than should warrant a good active demand, although the Lenten season begins today and this is usually regarded as not favoring a strong demand for fresh beef.

# DRIVE "REDS" OUT RAILRUAD RETRENCHMENT



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

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

Prof. Alger defended the American navy as to the criticism made by Commander Sims that poor marksmanship wass hown at Santiago. He declared that American gunnery was as good as that of any navy at that time and that at the present time there was no navy in the world tht would surpass the American in straight shooting.

Lleut. Commander Joseph Straus testified in regard to government pow der manufacture

Prof. P. R. Alger, instructor mathematics at the naval academy, but formerly for four years attached to the bureau of ordnance also testified as to the excellence of American turret construction. 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guns, which were adopted from the British. He said the guns were alright at Santiago, but the men had not learned how to shoot them. He asserted, however, that at that time no other navy knew how to shoot and that no navy could shoot better than the American navy at the present time.

The finding of foreign substances in sacks of powder, put up as charges, was explained by Prof. Alger who said that "such gross carelessness" was not possible now because since the appointment of Admiral Converse as chief of the bureau of ordnance, a system of inspection had been inaugurated. The discovery of scraps of iron, fragments of good, and in one case, a loaded revolver cartridge was due to the practice of having officers on board ship weigh loads of powder. He had heard of only three instances out of thousands of sacks of powder where foreign matter had been found.

Lieut, Commander Jos, Straus on duty at the proving ground at Indian Head, testified as to the cost of government manufacture of powder. The plant of Indian Head turns out 3,500 pounds of powder a day at a cost of about forty-five cents a pound. The government pays for powder manufactured at private plauts 69 cents a pound

#### Excavation Well Begun.

Washington, Mar. 4 .- Up to March 1, 28,414,934 cubic yards of excavation had been taken from the Panama canal route. This is just one-fifth of the entire amount that was estimated May 1, 1904, that would be required to be excavaled to complete the waterway, viz: 142,000,000 cubic yards in round numbers. Should the work proceed at the present rate, it is estimated the remaining excavation would be completed in three years. However, it is understood that the work of excavation will not be pushed to completion. but that meanwhile construction of the locks will proceed, the intention of the commission being to finish all parts of the canal construction at about the same time.

She Says Newspapers Are to Blame.
