Vapor of Mercury.

Every mirror is made at the cost silvering of the glass by applying a layer of tinfoil alloyed with mercury involves so much risk of poisoning, the work people constantly breathing the mercury vapor, that numerous attempts have been made to use an

other metal for the purpose. It was shown by Liebig that a fine adherent deposit of metallic silver could be applied to glass by reducing a solution of a silver salt with milk sugar, so this method has been employed as a commercial process. There have been partly successful attempts to get a like deposit of copper.

The mirror often tacks brilliance and is usually disfigured with stains. But it has been found by one F. D. hattaway of England that solutions of copper salts can produce brilliant reddish films of metallic copper which are as perfect reflectors as silver mir ors. His method of coating glass with a layer of copper, it is thought, will probably be used extensively in making mirrors and other glassware articles

BOMB IN NEW YORK

IT WAS INTENDED FOR THE PO LICE BUT A SHORT FUSE SAVED THEM.

EXPLODED PREMATURELY

While Yet in Hand of Thrower Report Came Killing One Man and Fatally Injuring Assassin.

Bailey was last seen alive at Strong City. At Peabody some one opened the car door just enough to throw out a package of waybills and then closed it quickly.

The custom of the messenger has been to go to sleep soon after leaving Florence and it is probable that he did this Sunday morning. 

HAYWOOD TO SOCIALISTS.

Chicago, Mar. 30 .- W. D. Haywood, former secretary of the Western Federation of Miners, denounced President other public officials at a mass meeting of Socialists held here Sunday afternoon. At the close of the meeting resolutions were adopted protesting against the use of troops in the strike of miners in Alaska. He predicted the defeat at the polls next fall of the Republican and Democratic parties and said it was time to change the country from a political junkshop to an industrial workshop." 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
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
