Fair Supply of Fat Steers Met Slow Reception From Buyers.

Supplies of cattle are still running light at leading points, total for the week at five markets reaching only 100,000 against 133,000 for the same time last week. But the light supply still continues to be met with a dull and indifferent demand and the tendency in prices is toward a lower level except for the very best grades. This condition that would hardly be looked for at this season, and perhaps would not exist were it not for the curtailment of meat consumption quent upon sensational publica tion of increased cost of meats to the consumer.






