There has been some disappointment to the selling interest in the cattle trade this week. This has been general, and not confined to any one market. Supplies have been lighter at all points, the local falling off amounting to 8,000, while at five points the aggregate total of 105,600 is 34,000 less than for the previous week. Locally the market for strictly ripe steers has not shown any material change as to prices, but the demand as been indifferent and aside from the best qualities any change in prices has been toward a lower level. This has created a spreading out in the range in prices that can not be expected to narrow down materially. Curtailed consumption of beef due to high prices can be charged with the unfavorable turn in cattle prices. Receipts are below normal for the season of year at all leading points, but the consuming public will have to become re-educated to higher priced meats before the markets can become normal.
