No Improvement in Demand For Fat Steers, Trade Dull.

And still there is no improvement

big proportion of steers, but the demand was very slack and buyers went ste to the yards declaring they would buy steers lower or let them alone. Bids from the start were on a basis of lower prices, but sellers could not see where a lower market was necessary under the light run and were slow to entertain lower bids. Late in the forenoon the opposing traders began to get together on a basis of price. steady to a shade lower than Monday and a good clearance was made or

Offerings did not include anything prime or fancy in the fat steer line although a few leads of good medium to strong weights were offered. Th best here sold at \$6.65 and were about steady compared with sales of same kinds on Monday, the bulk of steers were of light to medium weights that sold at \$5,75@6.50 with common light weights at \$5.00@5.60.

The situation is not a buoyant one from a feeder and producer standpoint and yet it should be considered that prices for fat beeves are well on a profit-making level compared with cost of feeds. Furthermore, it is only a matter of time until fat dry-lot cattle must come into more active demaund unless there is decided enlargement in receipts.

Light Supplies All Week, But Demand Not An Active One.

Less than 1,500 cattle were reported there not being enough offerings to \$4.92 ½ @ 5.00. develop a regular trade. The situation at the close of the week does not suggest the advisability of having liberal receipts at markets next week It is admitted on all hands that available supplies of fat cattle for the next few months are not large, but for the preent the demand is not equal to liberal receipts.

There has been some disappointment to the selling interest in the cattle trade this week. This has been general, and not confined to any one market. Supplies have been lighter at all points, the local falling off amounting to 8,000, while at five points the aggreagte total of 106,400 is 35,000 less than for the previous week. Locally the market for strictly ripe steers has not shown any material change as to prices, but the demand has been indifferent and aside from the best qualities any change in prices has been toward a lower level. This has created a spreading out in the range in prices that can not be expected to narrow down materially. Curtailed consumption of beef due to high prices can be charged with the unfavorable turn in cattle prices. Receipts are below normal for the season of year at all leading points. but the consuming public will have become re-educated to higher priced meats before the markets can become normal.

Prices for fat beeves are on a fairly profitable level at present and there is nothing in sight to cause slumping markets ,as it is generally admitted that cattle have been pretty closely marketed. However, there A Week of Sharp Declines in Live will be no narrowing down in the range of prices, as killers will be on the lookout from now on for cattle that show up grassy and will not pay dry lot prices for cattle that are green and washy.

New York, April 13 .- Another record breaking year for ocean travel is ahead if present prospects continue. While steamship agents at the beginning of the year were dubious of the outlook, their attitude during the last few weeks has changed and they themselves were greatly surprised when the statistics for the first three months of the year were computed Instead of the cabin passenger

traffic westward having decreased by thousands, as many persons had supposed, the figures show a decrease of only 365 from last year in the first cabin, while the number of second cabin passengers traveling in that direction was 5,279 greater than last year. The travel for the week ending last Friday was a record breaker for this time of the year, for the various steamships leaving took out 110 more first cabin passengers than vessels carried in the corresponding week of ast year. 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


