CATTLE. Demand For Fat Steers Shows Better Tone, Prices Stronger.

The fat beef cattle trade shows an improved tone over last week and prices are on a higher turn. The best part of the improvement, however, is shown in the movement of buyers. Last week they took cattle as though they were just doing it to accomodate the selling interest; today they took hold as though they really wanted them. Supplies are still running very light




SOY BEANS FOR PIGS.

Valuable Crop to Go With Corn For Maturing Pork.

Columbia, Mo .- As a grain crop to ise in connection with corn for crowding the spring crop of pigs to market, the soy bean is a very valuable crop. It is essentially a grain plant, very rich in protein, and while the hogs are running on soy All of the old amusement places will actually yield less than 150? Then better William H. Taft and William J. Bryan beans they should have access to corn to balance the ration. While the corn does not contain enough protein for the best results, soy beans contain more than is profitable to feed, and building: the combination of the two grains is therefore much better. The soy bean matures about the same time as a nedium early corn, like Reid's Yellow Dent, and the two crops could be grown in the same field so that the hogs could have access to both with out further labor. If this easible, the corn should be thrown to the hogs every day. The early rellow variety is recommended, sown in drills about thirty or forty inches apart, using about three pecks to the acre, and cultivate shallow until the plants completly shade the ground. The hogs should be turned in when


