Risk too great for MISD land detachment

"No education or financial benefit."

Such was the finding of the Muleshoe Independent School District's board of directors concerning the proposal to hand over 106 square miles of land to the Springlake-Earth Independent School District.

After months of paperwork and planning, it was decided Monday that the proposed detachment of land from MISD, and its annexation by SEISD was too risky a venture.

For one thing, the process of regaining the land would be the reverse of the process that the districts were currently studying, and the requirement that the voters in the area would be willing to present a petition that requesting the detachment and annexation.

If the property taxes on the land were similar to the present situation, with MISD being more than 30 cents higher than SEISD, Sheets admitted there was a strong chance the voters wouldn't support another petition.


Several fund raising events have been set for the next few weeks to benefit the Bailey County Relay for Life.

The talent show begins at 6 p.m., in the Kerry Moore Auditorium, and it will feature students from DeShazo, Watson Junior High, and MHS.







The holiday of Cinco De Mayo, the 5th of May, commemorates the victory of the Mexicans over the French army at the Battle of Puebla in 1862. 
Sudan Correspondent The Sudan High School tennis mixed doubles team competed at the Regional Tennis Tournament


