> While the receipts of hogs are showing a sharp falling off compared with one week ago the market is no as yet responding in any radical re action in prices. It is altogethe likely that packing interests consider this shrinkage in receipts as of only temporary duration and look for an early return to liberal marketing. It is also likely that storage room in packing houses is still carrying large supplies of fresh pork made from the liberal receipts of hogs during the past two weeks. At any rate the packers are not showing any anxiety or fear of not getting all the hogs they want in the near future. Today with only 46,000 reported in sight at five markets and a total of 96,000 for two days against 153,000 at same points for the like period last week the buyers went in to fill orders on a lower basis and would not concede anything better than steady prices. The trees in the low and bottom ands of Missouri suffered about 60 per cent loss, but this is made up for y the condition of the fruit in the The apples, peaches, lums, cherries and pears were the most injured, the first two named suffering the greatest injury.

The strawberries were the only species of the berry crop which was ourt by the late frosts to any extent. and they were only sligthly damaged. Iowa Homestead: In seasons inclined to dryness the value of mulching should Texas will not reach its full measure distance of 93 yards. The damage, it not be underestimated. The local supply has continued to run largely to fed steers of good quality. although there has been some increase in offerings that lack weight and finish and show up more or less grassy. That the supply has been about up to the capacity of demand is evidenced by the fact that prices have shown a breaking tendency. The strictly good classes of fat steers have not declined much; in fact, while finding slow outlet on final days, the best grades of beeves are not more than a dime lower for the week, but below cattle good enough to sell around \$6.50 a week ago there has been an uneven decline of 15@25 cents with the most severe depression falling on half-fat grades of steers that begin to show the effect of running on grass. The decline of the week is a natural one, especially on the grades of steers that got the big end of the depression as it is a season of year when a large proportion of offerings do not kill out as well as same weights did a month ago and packers are on the lookout for them. Another factor against higher prices for the general run of beef cattle may be found in the enormous run of hogs that has been pouring into markets this week.
