Old Order Bars Typewriter. Discovery has been made of a war department order, still in effect, which was issued in 1883, before typewriters came into general use. It directed that the typewriter may not be employed in writing out sentences of general courts martial. Since that time the typewriter has come into such general use that those who have occasion to compile the records of courts martial have overlooked the old order. Steps have been taken to revoke the order and to substitute therefor a circular authorizing the use of the typewriter in writing out the findings and sentences, provided that the judges advocate certify that the typewritten findings and sentences were correct.
