### CATTLE.

Good Fat Steers.

Increased arrivals of cattle did not develop any turn against the selling interest so far as good and attractive beeves Moderate receipts of stock heifers we were concerned today. While the local receipts are running much larger tha last week it is found by comparison the leading outside points are not receiving as many cattle as last week. The tot for two expired days of the week at for markets, Kansas City still being flooded is 6,000 less than were received at san points last week and 13,000 less than fo the same time a year ago.

Local offerings included a liberal proportion of steers with quite large show ing of really good fat full fed beeve although nothing on strictly prime fancy order. In addition to the regul buyers there were several outside orde buyers again here. These all wanted cattle and afforded plenty of competition out of which the selling interest was able to establish an early market with prices full stendy to around a dime higher for attractive and useful fed steers. Half fat, green stock, however, did not attract favorable attention from the killer buyers and prices were not more than steady with
