TAFT MEN SEATED

CONTESTS OF 62 DELEGATES DE-CIDED IN FAVOR OF SEC-RETARY OF WAR.

COMMITTEE WORKING FAST

Action of National Committee Sustained in Every Instance by Committee on Credentials at the Chicago Convention.

Chicago, June 17.-At midnight Tuesday the committee on credentials was still in session with every intention of finishing its work before adjournment. Six states involving 62 delegates had been called up to that time and in every instance the decision of the committee had been in favor of the Taft factions and sustained the action taken last week by the national committee.

The contests heard were those in Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky and Mississippi. The bitter fight in the state of Louisiana was settled without coming mefore the crecommittee. 
