IS LONG ON FRUIT

Continued from Page One.

The shipping now begun indicates that this will be the heaviest year that section has known. Increased acreage has much to do with it, but improvements made year by year enhance the yield and quality of each succeeding season.

The interesting thing about this country to the readers of this paper lies in the fact that there are thousands upon thousands of acres of land, just as good as that now being improved, that can be bought at a low figure and developed into fine orchards.

Another thing about this section is that it lies on the south slope of the Ozark hills, thus giving it protection from the cold blasts of the north and adding the splendid richness of all the fruit and nuts of spring and summer.

Added to the fruit lands are large areas of valley farms that are exceptional for general farming and live stock growing. The soil there is darker and heavier than that on the slopes and heavy crops have been made the rule where the effort has been made.

It is rather hard on boys to work under father's orders all week without any assurance that they will really be sharers in the profits. Therefore it would be well to make the boys partners in the deal. Just what kind of a partnership it should be depends altogether on the father, on the boy, and on the farm; but we are satisfied a good many farmers would be ahead in the end if they would say to their boys that they could have a certain share in the proceeds from every bushel of corn over thirty, forty or fifty bushels per acre, as the case may be.

The climate on this south slope of the Ozarks is exceptionally attractive. The elevation of from 1,000 to 1,500 feet keeps the summer temperature below the degree practically all the time, and the sheltering ridge to the north gives such protection against winter that the mercury rarely ever touches zero.

While Mr. Nett's farm is not considered a wheat farm, being best adapted to alfalfa, a goodly amount of which Mr. Nett has been cutting all summer, yet one must admit that even for wheat it is not bad.

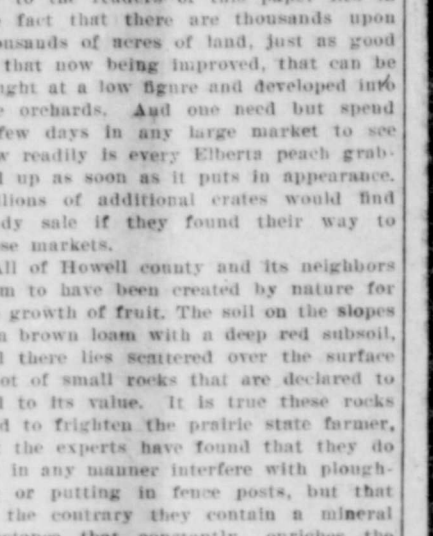
WINTER BARLEY.

WHEAT TO HAVE PEDIGREE.

Fort Collins, Colo., Aug. 30.—Wheat with a pedigree is the latest development along scientific lines by W. H. Olin, agronomist at the Agricultural college. Like the horse, dog and other blooded animals, Olin's regenerated defiance wheat, which has been handled like a tender flower and developed into a high grade product by the experiment station here since 1879, is to have its full pedigree mapped, the ground work having just been laid.

A WARM GREETING

AMERICAN BATTLESHIP FLEET GIVEN A HEARTY WELCOME AT AUCKLAND.

PRESENTS FOR AMERICANS

An Album for President Roosevelt and Souvenirs for Admiral Sperry—Unbounded Enthusiasm Prevailed.

Auckland, N. Z., Aug. 10.—Cloudy weather greeted the landing Sunday of Admiral Sperry, commander-in-chief of the United States Atlantic fleet and his officers to receive official welcome to Australasian waters at the hands of Prime Minister Sir Joseph George Ward on behalf of the government.

The landing was made at the newly erected quay at the foot of Queen street, the city's principal thoroughfare, at the shore end of which an elaborately decorated stand had been erected for the reception.

It was a great reception and unbounded enthusiasm prevailed. In his address Sir Joseph eulogized President Roosevelt as representing the best traditions of the common blood of civilization.

After the ceremonies of welcoming by the government, a procession was formed, the route being through Queen street to Drill hall, where Arthur Myers, the mayor, accorded Rear Admiral Sperry a civic welcome.

In an interview Sunday Admiral Sperry said the cruise of the fleet from San Francisco had effected a great improvement in the active work of the men.

THAW'S LAWYERS' BIG FEES

STANFORD WHITE'S SLAYER HAS PAID OUT \$417,500.

One Firm Got \$105,000—Attorney Delmas Was Paid \$50,000 for His Services.

Poughkeepsie, N. Y., Aug. 10.—From his cell in the county jail here Harry K. Thaw Sunday night gave out the following statement concerning the claims filed against him by various lawyers which, he asserts, forced him into bankruptcy.

FRENCH PRAISE FOR WRIGHTS.

Americans Demonstrate Their Ability to Fly in the Air.

Paris, Aug. 10.—The French press unites in spontaneous and enthusiastic praise of Wilbur Wright's performance with his aeroplane Saturday at Lemans, and unhesitatingly expresses the opinion that even in this short flight it was indubitably proven that the Wright brothers are the leaders in aerial navigation.

The average opinion is perhaps best summed up by the Figaro, which declares that it was not a success, but a triumph, adding: "This decisive victory creates a revolution in the scientific world."

Mr. Wright told the Associated press Sunday that he was even embarrassed Saturday by an absence of wind. On this point Mr. Bleriot said: "Mr. Wright's aeroplane will fly in the wind at the beck and will of the operator."

GOV. DENEEN AND SENATOR HOPKINS APPARENTLY WINNERS IN SATURDAY'S PRIMARY.

ADLAI E. STEVENSON NAMED

Democrats Choose Former Vice President as Their Candidate for Governor—Republicans Fight for Senatorship.

Chicago, Aug. 10.—At one o'clock Sunday night the indications were that Gov. Charles S. Deneen had received the Republican nomination for governor and that Senator Albert J. Hopkins had obtained the Republican indorsement for United States senator.

The returns available at one o'clock consisted of the vote in 87 out of 102 counties in the state for senator, and in 62 counties for governor.

The friends of Gov. Deneen confidently predict that he will secure the nomination by a majority of at least 10,000 over Yates and the Yates managers make about the same prediction for their man.

Senators Hopkins declared late Sunday night that he believed that he would be indorsed for the senatorship by a plurality of 25,000 to 27,000.

H. Hanford of the federal court here.

STRIKERS FIRE ON A TRAIN

THREE KILLED AND 11 WOUNDED IN ALABAMA.

Miners Waylay Train Bearing Non-Union Men and Riddle It With Bullets.

Birmingham, Ala., Aug. 10.—Three men were instantly killed and 11 injured, two of whom will probably die when striking miners fired into a passenger train on the Birmingham Mineral railroad at Blocton, Sunday morning about two o'clock.

The train was a special bearing non-union men to the Blocton mines under guard of soldiers and deputies. On the outskirts of the town the engineer suddenly saw a fire flare up on the track and at once a fastidate was fired into the train.
