On today's market only a few loads of fed steers and none of these choice were offered, while the showing of rangers, both in and out of quarantine, was fairly liberal. At five markets the aggregate total was again above demands of the trade, the total for two days being 96,000 against 85,000 for the same time las week and 91,000 a year ago.
