CATTLE

Week Brought Out Liberal Receipts But Mostly From Ranges.

Practically no cattle arrived in the local yards today and the total at five points was less than 2,000 head.

The market was only nominal and prices quotable at the close remain steady compared with middle days of the week.

Liberal receipts have been the rule all week at this point and fully two-thirds of the arrivals have come from the ranges of the west and southwest.

The outlook appears to favor continued liberal receipts of range cattle, but not many natives.

The small amount of business transacted in cows and heifers today was on an unchanged basis of prices.

There has been no great amount of change in the market for cows and heifers this week.

The market has been alternately weak and strong on the general run of stock but at the week's close prices are practically unchanged compared with a week ago.

The run of calves has been heavy. Prices broke 25¢ early in the week, but closed somewhat stronger.

Business in the stock cattle line today was confined to the speculative division, fresh receipts being all.

Increasing volume of receipts has marked this week's trade in stocker and feeder cattle.
