## Local ladies take bi-district trophy

It was the bottom of the seventh inning and the Childress Lady Cats had the tying run on third and the winning run at the plate with two out.

Marissa Cortez started Rachel Kessler off with a pitch high and outside for a ball with darkness closing in on the Bi-District game held on Lockney's new field.

There were no lights on the field and the

wind was blowing hard from first base toward home plate. Kessler had blasted a two-run home run over the left field fence to tie the game at 5-5 in the sixth inning. Now she was back at the plate in the bottom of the seventh.

M. Cortez next pitch was over the plate and high in the strike zone. Kessler missed the sweet spot on the ball and lofted a towering pop fly toward short left field. Val Olivas battled

the wind, the blowing dirt and the darkness to track down the fly ball and make the catch in shallow left center for the final out and secure the 7-6 win for the Lady Mules.

The win gave the Lady Mules their first golden glove of the season and they will advance to the Area round of the Texas State Playoffs.

The Alpine Lady Bucks won District 4-2A and received a bye in the first round. They will enter

the game with the Lady Mules with a record of 6-0, 27-7.

The Lady Mules first three batters went down on strikes in the top of the first inning.

M. Cortez returned the favor by striking out the first three Lady Cats. She then singled up the middle to start a two out rally in the top of the second.

Alondra Villareal drew a walk before Daniella Mendoza shot a ground ball between the legs of the first baseman to score M. Cortez.

Villareal went home on a throwing error by

the catcher attempting to pick her off third base. The Lady Mules led 2-0 after one and half innings.

Heather Gutierrez managed to continue to move under a high fly to left as it continued to drift with the wind for the first out of the bottom of the second inning.

An infield hit, an error and a base hit to left scored the Lady Cats first run of the game. Gutierrez sacked up a second fly ball for the second out and M. Cortez fanned the final batter in the order for the third out.

he Lady Mules led 2-0 after two innings.

Linda Sanchez drew a walk to lead off the third inning and stole second base. Tori Alvarado lined a double to left center to score Sanchez.

An error on the first baseman allow M. Cortez to reach first and Alvarado scooted home for the Lady Mule's fourth run.

Cortez threw a fast ball past the Childress lead off batter in the bottom of the third for a called third strike.

## Park View survey, response discussed by MAHD board

Members of the public met with the Muleshoe Area Hospital District's board of directors and the staff of Park View Nursing Care Center Monday to discuss the issues raised in the state's recent unfavorable survey.

While several members of the public voiced support of the nursing home and its staff in their efforts to care for the residents of the facility, it was admitted by members of the hospital board and the staff that the survey contained issues that needed to be addressed at the facility.

"We're going to take these on, and make this a better place," board president Bill Liles said during the open forum that preceded the item by item discussion of the survey.

In all, the state and federal officials who inspected the nursing home listed a total of 20 violations, including five that were described as being serious enough to place residents in "immediate jeopardy" regarding their health or safety.

However, listening to the explanations presented by Maegan Chisholm, administrator of Park View, suggests that either the state and federal officials were overzealous in the work, or the local issues and responses were being trivialized.

Chisholm worked down the list Monday, in many cases giving at least a partial description of the situation that lead

At issue was whether the nurse in question should have administered chest compressions on the resident until the arrival of emergency medical personnel.

According to Chisholm's statement, chest compressions wouldn't have changed the situation, but should have been started because the resident didn't have a "do not resuscitate" or DNR in place.

to the "tag" or deficiency mark against the nursing home, along with a brief statement about how the nursing home intended to correct the problem.

The citations noted in the survey, and Park View's response include:

**F156 (Notice of rights, rules, services and charges)** — According to Chisholm, the cited issue involved a decision made by a nurse, who was later dismissed, who "made a decision she was not qualified to make."

"We feel that this was a nursing error, and not a problem with the facility," Chisholm said. Because of this, she said no correction plan of correction needed to be made concerning it.

**F164 (Personal privacy confidentiality of records)** — Chisholm explained that the "tag" resulted from the care of an incontinent resident, and that during her care the curtain around her bed wasn't closed completely. The planned

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## Agreement reached over dialysis unit's back rent

A new agreement was reached between the Muleshoe Area Hospital District and AccessCare Dialysis, which includes forgiving the \$20,000 in back rent owed, during Thursday's regular meeting.

In a meeting that was, if nothing else, less volatile than a similar meeting in March, the MAHD board on April 27 agreed to

the proposal presented by John Hedrick of AccessCare Dialysis.

This latest agreement, which unlike the initial agreement between the two entities that reportedly hadn't been approved by the hospital district's attorney, recognizes that the dialysis unit housed in a wing of Park View Nursing Care Center

would only be at its present location for a few more years.

During Thursday's meeting, Hedrick misquoted last month's

Journal story about the dialysis unit, stating that the newspaper said the unit was closing down. In actuality, the *Muleshoe Journal* reported that

the "dialysis unit's time at the nursing home is limited."

The newspaper reported that according to information that came to light after the hospital district re-issued the bond against the nursing home, and through the bond counsel associated with that re-issuance, the hospital district was prohibited from renting

out or leasing any portion of the nursing home to a "for-profit" entity such as AccessCare.

Because of this, the unit's lease of space from the hospital district couldn't continue past February 2015. At Thursday's meeting, comments made by Hedrick suggested that since the dialysis unit

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## Trading places with God is a serious mistake

I rarely write sequels to these columns, but last week I wrote about the trouble with perfectionism, and I can't quit thinking about it. The best way to unburden myself of such thoughts is to burden you with them, so brace yourself for Round 2.

A friend and pastoral colleague reading my column remarked that over the years he has worked with many people beset by this kind of perfectionism and has discovered both it and its attendant shame at the bottom of their alcoholism. Evidently, serious perfectionists don't just drive others to excessive drink.

Genuine perfectionists try to trade places with God (and such gods are hard to live with). Some even try to back up their idolatry with Scripture, such as Matthew 5:48 — "Be perfect, therefore, as your heavenly Father is perfect."

Here Jesus is indeed calling us to a high standard, specifically telling us to strive for God's "perfection" (the word

means "completeness," "wholeness,") in loving even our enemies. Luke, in his parallel passage (6:36) writes, "Be merciful, as your Father in heaven is merciful." Complete love and mercy constitute a tall order, but God wants his children to grow up to look like him.

But do I need to tell you that we'll never reach that "completeness" here, and that the power to get it done is God's? This is not a "pull yourself up by your own bootstraps" sort of thing. If it were, Jesus might as reasonably have said, "Be ye spotted toads," and expected us to reach that goal; instead Christ urges us to trust our Father and his power to mold us.

Some perfectionists point to the Apostle Paul's admonition to Christian slaves: "Whatever you do, work at it with all your heart, as working for the Lord, not for

men" (Colossians 3:23). It surely is no stretch to hear the apostle urging, "Do a good job in your work, and thus honor the Lord." The problem, again, is that as we work as "for the Lord," we must not confuse ourselves with God and become control freaks seeking to sanctify our disease with Scripture.

The difference between productive, godly contentment and idolatrous perfectionism is vast. The former does not produce stagnation, it produces beautiful fruit, while the latter leads

to fear, paralysis, and despair. It's the difference between working joyfully for the Father, secure in his love, as opposed to working your fingers to the bone as a parley for paltry pseudo-love.

It's the difference between living a balanced life honoring the Lord, and a slavish life in which you live to work and forget to really live, to go home, or to look upward.

It's the difference between inner peace and slavery, between grace and law. It's the

The City of Muleshoe encouraged this incident in return for a meager \$14 a day!

I have lived and worked in Muleshoe for five years and have observed my employer (and sister), along with other fine retailers struggle to keep their doors open, doing everything within their means to pay taxes and support this town.

Is it asking too much of the city manager and the city council to show a semblance of support and cooperation with those who are supporting them? Just why, after the council voted earlier in the year on this issue was it changed?

I hope Mr. Brunson is good at budgeting because it's going to take some very "creative financing" to fund his renovation projects, the new police station, the new swimming pool,

and basic community services on \$14 a day itinerant vendor fees once all the legitimate businesses have forever locked their doors.

wouldn't be closing down, it would most likely need to move to another location after February 2015.

In the proposal presented by Hedrick, and approved by the board, the previously accrued rent owed by the dialysis unit — a total of \$20,000, would be forgiven because of the

cost of the improvements AccessCare made to the building.

"We have spent a lot of money on this facility," Hedrick said, adding "We're not going to close that facility down."

He said if his company had known about the prohibition in the bond covenant, they would have taken the \$300,000

plus, not including the equipment, and placed it in a building elsewhere in Muleshoe.

"I'd be happy to pay the back rent if you'd pay for the building improvements," Hedrick said. "I think I'm making a fair proposal."

During the discussion, board president Bill Liles asked whether it would

benefit the community or the nursing home if the hospital district sued the dialysis unit for the back rent owed, resulting in the unit closing down.

In his response to Liles' question, Hedrick assured the board that if legal action is brought as a result of the back rent owed, his company would be bringing action against the hospital district as well.

"Our damages are significantly higher than that..." Hedrick said, referring to the 20,000 rent owed the hospital district.

"I don't want it to come to that..." Hedrick said. "I don't want to litigate it. But, quite frankly, I don't think we were treated right."

In other business, the hospital district board:

- Appointed Deborah Nobel and Bob Graves as

the election judges for the May 14 general election, at the recommendation of LeAnn Gallman, Muleshoe city secretary, who is coordinating the election.

Early voting is

currently under way at Muleshoe City Hall, and will continue until May 10 in the annual hospital district election.

Extended voting hours are set for May 3 and 10, from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m.

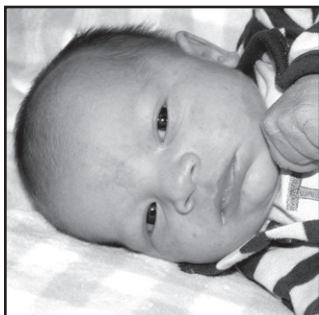

## Mules celebrate 'Senior Night' with win over Abernathy

The Mules wrapped up their baseball season Friday evening with Senior Night.

They capped a four-game winning streak by defeating the Abernathy Antelopes 11-10.

Muleshoe senior, Dameon Snell, laced a walk-off two-RBI single to left field to end the game.

The Mules entered the bottom of the seventh inning trailing the Lopes 10-9.

The Mules had lost their lead in the top of the sixth. Just four Mules went to the plate in the bottom of the seventh.

Each Mule fell behind

in the count 0-2 before three of them drew walks to load the bases.

Isaac Baca, Joey Ramirez and Matthew Ambriz fouled off the good pitches and took the bad ones for balls until they load the bases.

Saul Elizalde went down on strikes before Snell came to the plate.

The fast ball was on the inside part of the plate and Snell pulled it to left field to score Baca as the tying run and Ramirez as the winning run.

The game winning hit came on Snell's final at bat of his senior season. He had played four years on the Mule varsity squad.

The Mules finished the regular season with a

district record of 7-5 to tie the Floydada Whirlwinds for third place.

Floydada owned the tie breaker over the Mules and will advance into the playoffs.

"We went in to today's game knowing it was our final game of the season," said Mule coach Lee Fletcher.

"We had no chance to advance but were playing for pride and the guys brought it today," he added.

Ryan DeLeon pitched a complete game to finish the season with a record of 4-4 and an era of 3.18.

correction involves staff training.

**F224 (Prohibit mistreatment, neglect, misappropriation)**—This issue centered around properly restraining residents on the nursing home's bus. While the staff has been securing the wheelchairs on the bus, the residents themselves were not.

"We're very glad they found it and pointed it out," Liles said about this particular issue. Reportedly, the staff has already received the training necessary to correct this issue. Chisholm also noted that while this has apparently been going on for several years, none of the nursing home's residents have been injured in transport.

**F226 (Develop, implement abuse, neglect policies)**—According to Chisholm, this issue is related to F224, and how the nursing home's written policies inadequately handled the situation. She said many of Park View's policies haven't been updated since the 1980s, indicating it was something that would be done as time is available.

**F241 (Dignity and respect of individuals)**—Chisholm said this infraction included issues that may seem frivolous or humorous. She explained that it resulted from staff members speaking Spanish in the presence of residents who only spoke English, the use of "terms of endearment" rather than the resident's name, and feeding a resident while standing.

The "terms of endearment" are considered slang that could be used to demean a resident, and as such are considered a "big no no" in the industry.

Chisholm said this issue should be addressed through training.

**F257 (Comfortable and safe temperature levels)**—Dealt with the nursing home's failure to maintain the temperature requirements, and that part of the reason the temperature wasn't being properly regulated at the time was the ceiling repairs that were under way at Park View. New thermostats have been ordered to help with the situation.

**F258 (Maintenance of comfortable sound levels)**—According to Chisholm, the construction of the facility precluded good sound control, but that the staff would be working to keep the noise down at the nurses' station and in the halls.

**F309 (Provide care, services for highest well being)**—The situation resulting in this tag was failure of the staff to follow the written instructions regarding the placement of a pillow that restricts the movement of a combative resident after hip surgery, or request authorization from the attending physician to discontinue use of the pillow.

**F312 (ADL care provided for dependent residents)**—The state and federal officials conducting the survey had noticed that several of the residents were in need of podiatrist services. Since the survey, Chisholm said the services are now being provided by a podiatrist from Lubbock.

**F323 (Free of accident hazards, supervision, devices)**—The problem with bed and chair alarms has been addressed through training, according to Chisholm.

**F329 (Drug regimen is free from unnecessary**

drugs)—Thenursinghome has been "challenged" in its efforts to provide psychiatric services, according to Chisholm. It was explained that the state officials hadn't found adequate documentation in place describing how other options were utilized prior to the decision to medicate was made.

It was noted that the nursing home was in the process of correcting the situation through additional training and documentation.

**F332 (Free medication error rates of five percent or more)**—The citation issued regarding the drugs dispensed at the nursing home resulted from inadequate documentation, and included instances in which the nurses hadn't observed the resident "fully ingest" their medication.

"This was the only thing there I was concerned about," Liles said.

As with many other issues, the need for training and documentation would be included in its action plan.

**F364 (Nutritive value, appearance, palatable, preferred temperatures)**—"This is a tough tag to take," Chisholm said, referring to the temperature and palatability of the food prepared for the residents, and some of the nourishment-related issues that she said would be taken care of through the purchase of additional equipment.

**F371 (Food procurement, storage, preparation, service)**—Chisholm said this issue would be addressed through training, and noted that an employee had left some food on a counter rather than

refrigerating it.

**F425 (Pharmaceutical services, accurate procedures)**—"We actually disagree with a large portion of this tag," Chisholm said. In the explanation of the citation at Monday's meeting, it was said it referred to minor documentation errors by the staff that will be addressed by in-service training.

**F441 (Infection control, prevention, spreading)**—Park View's administrator said she was embarrassed by this listed deficiency, which she described as resulting from a patient with an open wound that was apparently aggravated by improper cleaning in a restroom area.

"We did fall short here," Chisholm said. She added that this situation has been resolved, and noted that the nursing home doesn't have a lot of wound care problems.

**F465 (Safe, functional, sanitary, comfortable environment)**—According to Chisholm, this deficiency concerned wheelchairs at the facility that needed repair, and other maintenance issues that needed to be addressed.

**F490 (Effective**

administration, resident well being)—Chisholm indicated this was a cumulative deficiency related to all of the others, and noted that anytime a nursing home is cited, the administrator's license is called into question.

**F502 (Provide and obtain laboratory services... quality, timely)**—It was explained that the glucometers at the nursing

home wasn't calibrated and was reading low. "This is not something that we feel endangered the residents in any way," Chisholm said. New glucometers have since been ordered.

**K027-NFPA 101 (No propping of smoke barrier doors)**—A device that automatically pulls a door shut to create a smoke barrier has been replaced.
